






- Annual Turnover = Average # of persons served per bed in year

#### Emergency Shelter: Length of Stay during report year




• In 2011 and 2012, over 50% of individuals in Seattle & King County ES programs stayed for one month or less. Less than 10% stayed over six months.

#### Emergency Shelter: Length of Stay during report year




• The majority of families stayed in shelter between 1 and 6 months in 2012. Families stayed in shelter slightly longer in 2012 than in 2011.

#### Transitional Housing: Length of Stay during report year




• In 2012, 62% of individuals in Seattle TH programs & 57% in King County TH programs were served for 6 months or less.

#### Transitional Housing: Length of Stay during report year



• Families in transitional housing stayed longer in 2012 than 2011. In 2012, nearly half of families in Seattle TH programs stayed for 9 months or longer.

#### Permanent Supportive Housing: Total Length of Stay




• In 2012, length of stay increased for individuals in PSH programs. Over half of individuals in Seattle and King County have been in PSH for 2 or more years.

### Permanent Supportive Housing: Retention

- 13% of individuals in King County PSH programs exited during the 2012 AHAR year
- 15% of individuals in Seattle PSH programs exited during the 2012 AHAR year
- 13% of persons in families in King County PSH programs exited during the 2012 AHAR year

#### Permanent Supportive Housing: Destination at Exit



• 40% of individuals in King County programs and 26% in Seattle programs exited to a permanent housing situation
