37	PREAMBLE:
38	The existing code on revenue and fiscal regulation, K.C.C. Title 4, was
39	created for the most part in the 1970s and 1980s, though some provisions
40	date back to at least the 1940s. Since the creation of K.C.C. Title 4, the
41	title has been subject to many amendments each year. The cumulative
42	effect of these amendments has been to create ambiguities and conflicts

43	within the title, which make it difficult to apply the code effectively and
44	predictably. The council determines that a new title on revenue and fiscal
45	regulation, K.C.C. Title 4A, should be created, and material related to
46	revenue and fiscal matters be codified in that title, and all other material in
47	K.C.C. Title 4 that is not appropriate to be codified K.C.C. Title 4A
48	should be codified in the appropriate titles. In this case, the material in
49	K.C.C. chapters 4.18 and 4.19 should be codified in K.C.C. Title 2.
50	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
51	SECTION 1. K.C.C. 4.19.010, as recodified by this ordinance, K.C.C. 4.19.020,
52	as recodified by this ordinance, K.C.C. 4.19.030, as recodified by this ordinance, K.C.C.
53	4.19.050, as recodified by this ordinance, K.C.C. 4.19.040, as recodified by this
54	ordinance, K.C.C. 4.19.060, as recodified by this ordinance, K.C.C. 4.19.070, as
55	recodified by this ordinance, section 16 of this ordinance, section 17 of this ordinance,

57	ordinance, K.C.C. 4.18.170, as recodified by this ordinance, and K.C.C. 4.19.100, as
58	recodified by this ordinance, should constitute a new chapter in K.C.C. Title 2.
59	SECTION 2. K.C.C. 4.19.010, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby
60	recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.
61	SECTION 3. Ordinance 13983, Section 1, as amended, and K.C.C. 4.19.010 are
62	each hereby amended to read as follows:
63	The executive shall implement the ((King-County)) contracting opportunities
64	program ((under which the county and its contractors have an incentive to make)) to

65	promote the use of small contractors and suppliers as prime contractors, subcontractors
66	and suppliers on county contracts.
67	SECTION 4. K.C.C. 4.19.020, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby
68	recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.
69	SECTION 5. Ordinance 13983, Section 2, as amended, and K.C.C. 4.19.020 are
70	each hereby amended to read as follows:
71	The ((King County contracting opportunities)) program shall apply to ((county
72	public works, consulting and procurement)) contracts subject to K.C.C. chapter 2.93.
73	SECTION 6. K.C.C. 4.19.030, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby
74	recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.
75	SECTION 7. Ordinance 13983, Section 3, as amended, and K.C.C. 4.19.030 are
76	each hereby amended to read as follows:
77	The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter unless the context
78	clearly requires otherwise.
79	A. "Commercially useful function" means the performance of real and actual
80	services in the discharge of any contractual endeavor, rather than being an uninvolved
81	participant in a transaction, contract or project through which funds are passed to obtain
82	the appearance of small contractor and supplier participation. The small contractor and
83	supplier must be responsible for the execution of the work of the contract or subcontract.
84	as applicable, and carry out its responsibilities by actually performing, managing and
85	supervising the work. To perform a "commercially useful function," the small contractor
86	and supplier must also be responsible for materials and supplies used on the contract or

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87	subcontract, as applicable, for negotiating price, determining quality and quantity,
88	ordering the material, installing, if applicable, and paying for the material.
89	B. "Manager" means manager of the finance and business operations division in
90	the department of executive services.
91	((B.)) C. "The program" means the King County contracting opportunities
92	program.
93	D. "Small business accelerator" means a competitive procurement program that
94	allows certified small contractors and suppliers to ((only)) compete solely against other
95	certified small contractors and suppliers on selected county contracts.
96	((C.)) E. "Small contractor and supplier" means ((that)) a business ((and the
97	person or persons who on and control it are)) certified by the county that is in a financial
98	condition that puts the business at a substantial disadvantage in attempting to compete for
99	public contracts. In assessing ((these)) the financial condition((s)) of the business,
100	including the net worth of the person or persons who own and control it, the
101	((administrator)) manager shall substantially adopt the approach used by the federal
102	Small Business Administration, but the ((administrator)) manager shall adjust the Small
103	Business Administration's maximum revenue standards for various standard business
104	classifications and levels for owners' personal net worth to account for local market
105	conditions. However, the maximum revenue standard for standard business
106	classifications may not be more than fifty percent of the Small Business Administration's
107	thresholds, as now existing or hereafter amended.
108	SECTION 8. K.C.C. 4.19.050, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby
109	recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.

110	SECTION 9. Ordinance 13983, Section 5, as amended, and K.C.C. 4.19.050 are
111	each hereby amended to read as follows:
112	The ((administrator may)) manager shall develop a process for certifying
113	businesses for participation in the ((King County contracting opportunities)) program as
114	small contractors and suppliers. If feasible, the ((administrator)) manager shall arrange or
115	contract for a coordinated certification agency in cooperation with other agencies that
116	may adopt compatible programs.
117	SECTION 10. K.C.C. 4.19.040, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby
118	recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.
119	SECTION 11. Ordinance 13983, Section 4, as amended, and K.C.C. 4.19.040 are
120	each hereby amended to read as follows:
121	To be certified for the ((King County contracting opportunities)) program, a
122	business must be a small contractor or supplier, have a valid business license($(\frac{1}{2})$) and
123	must serve a commercially useful function((, as defined in K.C.C. chapter 4.18)). To
124	maintain its certification, within one year of its certification a small contractor or supplier
125	must have the person or persons who own and control the business complete at least
126	fifteen hours of business-related training in a program approved by the ((administrator))
127	manager. Based on the ((administrator's)) manager's assessment of the small contractor
128	or supplier's need for additional training, the ((administrator)) manager may require a
129	small contractor or supplier to complete up to fifteen additional hours annually of
130	business-related training. The ((administrator)) manager shall evaluate and approve
131	training programs based on one or more of the following ((indications)) indicators of the
132	training program's value: the ((program's relevant)) industry's historical use of the

133	training program; ((affiliation)) the training program's ((has)) affiliation with established
134	schools, if $any((+))$; and accreditation by an established association.
135	SECTION 12. K.C.C. 4.19.060, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby
136	recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.
137	SECTION 13. Ordinance 13983, Section 6, as amended, and K.C.C. 4.19.060 are
138	each hereby amended to read as follows:
139	((To provide significant opportunities and incentives for businesses owned by
140	small contractors and suppliers to prove themselves competitive within the market, t))The
141	certification ((the businesses)) of a small contractor or supplier is ((limited)) effective for
142	to ((five)) three years ((or a specified contract and dollar volume of participation)) if it
143	meets the requirements under this chapter. A business whose certification has expired
144	may reapply for certification. A business that has been denied certification must wait one
145	year from the application denial date before reapplying for certification.
146	SECTION 14. K.C.C. 4.19.070, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby
147	recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.
148	SECTION 15. Ordinance 13983, Section 7, as amended, and K.C.C. 4.19.070 are
149	each hereby amended to read as follows:
150	A. The ((King County contracting opportunities)) program shall use one or more
151	methods to create incentives to ((promote the)) use ((of businesses owned by certified))
152	small contractors and suppliers. These incentives shall be produced either through a
153	bonus system in which the increased participation of certified small contractors and
154	suppliers is a factor in the award of $contracts((\frac{1}{2}))_{1}$ or through a set-aside system under
155	which prime contractors are required to achieve a specified level of participation by

156	((King County contracting opportunities program businesses)) small contractors and
157	suppliers in the performance of the contract. If the bonus system is used, the solicitation
158	document shall state the maximum incentive available for the participation of certified
159	small contractors and suppliers and the possible methods for making use of the incentive.
160	If a set-aside system is used, the solicitation document shall state a required minimum
161	utilization.
162	B. ((As a matter of policy,)) The manager shall identify opportunities for small
163	contractors and suppliers to act as prime contractors ((will be identified)) on an ongoing
164	basis.
165	((C. The specific methods used to provide incentives to small contractors and
166	suppliers and for them to be prime contractors, as opportunities arise, shall be fully
167	addressed in the rule-making process.
168	D.1. The contracting opportunities program is authorized to use a small business
169	accelerator to solicit and award contracts for all county departments and offices in the
170	following areas, as defined in K.C.C. 4.16.010: services, professional services and
171	technical services, except contracts for architecture and engineering services, as well as
172	tangible personal property acquired in furtherance of metropolitan functions. The small
173	business accelerator shall be available for contracts having an estimated value ((of
174	twenty-five thousand dollars or more, where sufficient certified small contractors and
175	suppliers are available, and allow businesses certified as small contractors or suppliers
176	under K.C.C. 4.19.040 to compete against other certified small contractors and suppliers
177	for those county contracts.
178	2. The manager shall ensure the following actions are taken:

179	a. development of specifications or a project description in the form of a
180	request for proposals or invitation to bid in concert with the requesting department or
181	office;
182	b. the conduct by the business development and contract compliance section of
183	an analysis to determine the availability of at least three or more certified small
184	contractors and/or suppliers to provide the goods or services requested; and
185	c. if at least three or more certified small contractors or suppliers, or both are
186	determined to be available, and the manager determines it in the best interest of the those
187	county contracts.
188	2. The manager shall ensure the following actions are taken:
189	a. development of specifications or a project description in the form of a
190	request for proposals or invitation to bid in concert with the requesting department or
191	office;
192	b. the conduct by the business development and contract compliance section of
193	an analysis to determine the availability of at least three or more certified small
194	contractors and/or suppliers to provide the goods or services requested; and
195	county, the solicitation may be conducted under the small business accelerator among the
196	certified small contractors and suppliers;
197	3. The manager shall develop written criteria for use in determining which
198	written proposals or bids the county shall accept as the basis for recommending contract
199	award in consultation with the requesting department or office.
200	4. The manager shall advertise publicly at least once, the purpose, scheduled
201	date, location and time of a preconference, if applicable, or the name of a contact person

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202	from whom the specifications or project description shall be available. The purposes of
203	the notification are to distribute and discuss the specifications in the form of a request for
204	proposal or invitation to bid to certified small contractors and suppliers, and to inform of
205	the time and due date for the submission of proposal or bid.
206	5. If the county does not receive any responsive and responsible proposals or
207	bids from small contractors and suppliers, the manager may cancel the procurement and
208	conduct the solicitation again in accordance with the procedures for tangible personal
209	property, services, professional or technical services, as described in K.C.C. chapter 4.16.
210	6. The manager may reject any or all bids for good cause or request for proposal
211	if it is in the best interest of the county.
212	E. The administrator shall by June 30 of every year, file, [in the form of a paper
213	original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the council, who shall retain the original
214	and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers and the lead staff for the
215	government accountability and oversight committee or its successor,] a report to council
216	on the progress of the King County contracting opportunities program during the
217	previous year, January through December. The report shall include:
218	1. The total amounts awarded by contract category;
219	2. The total amount awarded by contract category for which an incentive was
220	available;
221	3. The total amounts awarded to small contractors and suppliers reported by
222	contract category and by race and gender, to the extent businesses voluntarily provide this
223	race and gender information;

224	4. For goods and services contracts, the total amount awarded to small
225	contractors and suppliers by race and gender to the extent businesses voluntarily provide
226	this race and gender information, for those contractors for which the small contractor or
227	supplier was not the low bidder;
228	5. For goods and services, the total amount paid by the county;
229	6. A listing of all participating small contractors and suppliers by contract
230	category, race and gender to the extent businesses voluntarily provide this race and
231	gender information, their location by city and ZIP code, and the specific contracts
232	including dollar amounts awarded;
233	7. A listing of the number of small contractors and suppliers by race and gender,
234	to the extent businesses voluntarily provide this race and gender information, in each of
235	the following revenue categories that was certified in the program:
236	a. for goods and services:
237	(1) zero to five hundred thousand dollars;
238	(2) five hundred thousand to one million dollars;

258	(1) zero to five hundred thousand dollars;
259	(2) five hundred thousand to one million dollars;
260	(3) one million to two million dollars; and
261	(4) two million dollars to the maximum revenue amount allowed by the
262	program rules;
263	b. for consulting:
264	(1) zero to two hundred fifty thousand dollars;
265	(2) two hundred fifty thousand to five hundred thousand dollars;
266	(3) five hundred thousand to one million dollars;
267	(4) one million dollars to the maximum revenue amount allowed under the
268	program rules;

269	c. for construction:
270	(1) zero to five hundred thousand dollars;
271	(2) five hundred thousand to three million dollars;
272	(3) three million to eight million dollars; and
273	(4) eight million to the maximum revenue amount allowed under the program
274	rules; and
275	9. A listing of the number and firm name of certified small contractors and
276	suppliers by race and gender, to the extent businesses voluntarily provide this race and
277	gender information, awarded contracts through the small business accelerator program
278	under subsection D. of this section, by contract category, their location by city and ZIP
279	code and the specific contracts including dollar amounts awarded.))
280	NEW SECTION. SECTION 16. There is hereby added to the new chapter
281	created under section 1 of this ordinance a new section to read as follows:
282	A. The program is authorized to use a small business accelerator to solicit and
283	award contracts for all county departments and offices in the following areas, as defined
284	in K.C.C. 2.93.030: services, professional services and technical services, except
285	contracts for architecture and engineering services, as well as tangible personal property
286	acquired in furtherance of metropolitan functions. The small business accelerator may
287	only be used for contracts having an estimated value above the formal purchasing
288	threshold as described in RCW 36.32.245, where sufficient certified small contractors
28 9	and suppliers are available.
290	B. The manager may use the small business accelerator for a contract, but only if

291 the following actions are taken:

- 292 1. Development of specifications or a project description in the form of a
 293 request for proposals or invitation to bid in concert with the requesting department or
 294 office;
- 295 2. An analysis by the business development and contract compliance section
 296 determines the availability of at least three small contractors or suppliers to provide the
 297 goods or services requested; and
- 3. The manager determines that it is in the best interest of the county to conductthe solicitation under the small business accelerator.
- C. With the exception that only small contractors and suppliers may apply under this section, the procedures for tangible personal property, services, professional services or technical services, as described in K.C.C. chapter 2.93, apply. However, if the county does not receive any responsive and responsible proposals or bids from small contractors and suppliers, the manager may cancel the procurement and conduct the solicitation again in accordance with the procedures for tangible personal property, services, professional or technical services, as described in K.C.C. chapter 2.93.
- 307 <u>NEW SECTION. SECTION 17.</u> There is hereby added to the new chapter
 308 created in section 1 of this ordinance a new section to read as follows:

355	under K.C.C. 4.19.070.C., as recodified by this ordinance, by contract category, their
356	location by city and ZIP code and the specific contracts including dollar amounts
357	awarded.
358	SECTION 18. K.C.C. 4.19.080, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby
359	recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.

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360 <u>SECTION 19.</u> Ordinance 13983, Section 8, as amended, and K.C.C. 4.19.080 are
 361 each hereby amended to read as follows:

A person who violates this chapter or the rules adopted under this chapter or who 362 fails to comply with representations or commitments made to receive a benefit or qualify 363 364 for an incentive under the King County contracting opportunities program is subject to sanctions including but not limited to: liquidated damages; withholding of funds; a civil 365 fine or penalty; and disgualification from eligibility for bidding on or entering into or 366 participating, as a subcontractor or in any other manner, in a contract with the county for 367 a period not to exceed five years. If imposing sanctions, the ((administrator)) manager 368 369 shall: set forth the sanctions to be imposed and the reasons for the imposition in a written order; promptly furnish a copy of the order to the contract awarding authority or contract 370 administering authority; and mail a copy of the order by certified mail, return receipt 371 372 requested, to the person being sanctioned.

373 <u>SECTION 20.</u> K.C.C. 4.19.090, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby

374 recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.

375 <u>SECTION 21.</u> Ordinance 13983, Section 9, as amended, and K.C.C. 4.19.090 are
376 each hereby amended to read as follows:

A person against whom the ((administrator)) manager under this chapter imposes sanctions may appeal within fifteen days from the date the ((administrator's)) manager's decision is mailed to the person being sanctioned, by filing a notice of appeal with the office of the hearing examiner. Within forty-five days after receiving the notice of appeal, the hearing examiner shall convene the appeal hearing. The hearing examiner shall provide written notice of the hearing date ((given)), location and time to the

383	appellant and to the department of executive services, finance and business operations
384	division, at least thirty days before the hearing. Within thirty days after conclusion of the
385	appeal hearing, the hearing examiner presiding at the hearing shall prepare a written
386	decision and order. The final decision shall be filed by the hearing examiner as a public
387	record with the county clerk, recorder's office, and copies of the final decision mailed to
388	each party of record and to the ((administrator)) manager.
389	SECTION 22. K.C.C. 4.18.170, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby
390	recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.
391	SECTION 23. Ordinance 12026, Section 13, and K.C.C. 4.18.170 are each
392	hereby amended to read as follows:
393	In order to secure financial assistance from federal and state agencies, the
394	((administrator)) manager shall provide for the participation of minority, women and
395	disadvantaged businesses ((pursuant to)) in accordance with regulations and requirements
396	imposed by ((such)) the federal and state agencies. The ((administrator)) manager may
397	((issue)) adopt rules and procedures and take steps necessary to implement and comply
398	with applicable federal and state laws and regulations, including the establishment of
399	annual goals and contract goals for minority, women and disadvantaged businesses.
400	SECTION 24. K.C.C. 4.19.100, as amended by this ordinance, is hereby
401	recodified as a new section in the new chapter created under section 1 of this ordinance.
402	SECTION 25. Ordinance 13983, Section 10, as amended, and K.C.C. 4.19.100
403	are each hereby amended to read as follows:
404	The executive shall adopt rules to implement this chapter, ((the council must
405	approve them before they become effective)) in accordance with K.C.C. chapter 2.98.

406	SECTION 26. Section 27 of this ordinance takes effect one hundred eighty days
