1	AN ORDINANCE assuming governance of the King
2	County ferry district; amending Ordinance 11955, Section
3	11, as amended, and K.C.C. 2.16.140, Ordinance 17527,
4	Section 129, as amended, and K.C.C. 4A.200.420,
5	Ordinance 15739, Section 2, and K.C.C. 2.120.010,
6	Ordinance xxxx, Section 6, and K.C.C. 4A.700.xxx
7	(section 6 of this ordinance) and Ordinance xxxx, Section
8	6, as amended, and K.C.C. 4A.700.xxx (section 6 of this
9	ordinance), adding a new section to K.C.C. chapter 4A.700,
10	adding a new section to K.C.C. chapter 4A.200, adding a
11	new section to K.C.C. chapter 2.120 and repealing
12	Ordinance 15739, Section 3, and K.C.C. 2.120.020.
13	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
14	SECTION 1. Findings:
15	A. On November 10, 2014, the King County council held the public hearing as
16	equired by Ordinance 17908 and RCW 36.150.020.
17	B. After that public hearing council determines that the public interest or welfare
18	would be satisfied by the county assuming the rights, powers, functions and obligations
19	of the King County ferry district and hereby declares that to be the council's intent.

20	SECTION 2. King County hereby assumes all rights, powers, functions and				
21	obligations of the King County ferry district as set forth in chapter 36.54 RCW and the				
22	same are hereby vested in accordance with the executive and legislative responsibilities				
23	defined in the King County Charter. The county is now vested with all the rights,				
24	powers, functions and obligations formerly vested by law in the governing board of the				
25	King County ferry district. In exercising such rights, powers, functions and obligations,				
26	all actions will be taken in the name of the county. Title to all ferry district property or				
27	property rights is vested in the county.				
28	SECTION 3. As required by RCW 36.150.040(2), the ferry district board is				
29	hereby abolished.				
30	SECTION 4. Ordinance 11955, Section 11, as amended, and K.C.C. 2.16.140 is				
31	hereby amended to read as follows:				
32	A. The department of transportation is responsible to manage and be fiscally				
33	accountable for the road services division, transit division, fleet administration division,				
34	airport division and marine division. The department shall perform the metropolitan				
35	public transportation function as authorized in chapter 35.58 RCW, K.C.C. Title 28 and				
36	other applicable laws, regulations and ordinances; provided, that financial planning for				
37	and administration of the public transportation function shall be conducted consistent				
38	with financial policies as may be adopted by the council. The department shall				
39	administer the county roads function as authorized in applicable sections of Titles 36 and				
40	47 RCW and other laws, regulations and ordinances as may apply. The department shall				
41	administer the passenger ferry service function as authorized in chapter 36.54 RCW,				
42	K.C.C. chapter 2.120 and other applicable laws, regulations and ordinances. The				

43	department's functions include, but are not limited to, the activities set forth in				
44	subsections B. through F. of this section for each division, administration of grants and				
45	the coordination of transportation planning activities with other county agencies and				
46	outside entities to integrate transportation planning and land use planning.				
47	B. The road services division is responsible to design, construct, maintain and				
48	operate a comprehensive system of roadways and other transportation facilities and				
49	services to support a variety of transportation modes for the safe and efficient movement				
50	of people and goods and delivery of services. The duties of the division shall include the				
51	following:				
52	1. Designing, constructing and maintaining county roads, bridges and associated				
53	drainage facilities;				
54	2. Designing, installing and maintaining county traffic signs, markings and				
55	signals;				
56	3. Designing, installing and maintaining bicycle and pedestrian facilities;				
57	4. Managing intergovernmental contracts or agreements for services related to				
58	road maintenance and construction and to other transportation programs supporting the				
59	transportation plan;				
60	5. Inspecting utilities during construction and upon completion for compliance				
61	with standards and specifications; assuring that public facilities disturbed due to				
62	construction are restored;				
63					
	6. Performing detailed project development of roads capital improvement				

65	Plan, and coordinating such programming with other county departments and divisions				
66	assigned responsibilities for Comprehensive Plan implementation;				
67	7. Incorporating into the roads capital improvement program those projects				
68	identified in the transportation needs report, community plans, related functional plans				
69	and elsewhere consistent with the county's Comprehensive Plan;				
70	8. Preparing, maintaining and administering the county road standards;				
71	9. Preparing and administering multi-year roads maintenance and capital				
72	construction plans and periodic updates;				
73	10. Administering the transportation concurrency and mitigation payment				
74	programs; and				
75	11.a. Performing the duties of the office of the county road engineer, which is				
76	hereby established as an administrative office of the road services division. The office of				
77	the county road engineer shall be an office of record, supervised by the county road				
78	engineer hired in accordance with RCW 36.80.010 and reporting to the division director				
79	of the road services division. The office of the county road engineer shall be located				
80	within the corporate limits of the county seat.				
81	b. The county road engineer shall carry out all duties assigned to the county				
82	road engineer as prescribed by state statute, except as modified by the county executive				
83	as authorized in subsection B.11.c. of this section.				
84	c. The county executive may assign professional engineering duties of the				
85	county road engineer to someone other than the county road engineer, except as				
86	otherwise assigned by King County Code, and only if the individual assigned those duties				
87	shall be qualified as required under RCW 36.80.020. The executive shall provide to the				

88	county council and the Washington State County Road Administration Board, in writing,				
89	those specific professional engineering duties not assigned to the county road engineer,				
90	the name and position of each person responsible for carrying out those assigned duties,				
91	the specific reporting and working relationships with the county road engineer and the				
92	duration for which those duties have been assigned.				
93	C.1. The transit division is responsible for the operation and maintenance of a				
94	comprehensive system of public transportation services in King County. The duties of the				
95	division shall include the following:				
96	a. providing all necessary customer services including telephone and other				
97	customer information and support systems; managing sales and distribution of fare				
98	media, research, market strategies and marketing functions;				
99	b. implementing programs, policies and strategies for the public transit in King				
100	County; developing and scheduling new products and service and managing contract				
101	services;				
102	c. developing and implementing transportation programs under the Americans				
103	with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) including preparing policy recommendations and				
104	service models and contracting for the delivery of service;				
105	d. delivering and managing transit service in the county including service				
106	quality and service communication functions;				
107	e. managing and maintaining the transit system infrastructure, including trolley				
108	power distribution and overhead systems, bases, customer facilities, and the radio				
109	communication and data system;				

110	f. maintaining transit rolling stock including all revenue vehicle fleets and			
111	those vehicles required to support the operation of the transit system, except such			
112	vehicles as may be included in the motor pool; managing a central stores function, unit			
113	repair facilities and all purchasing activities relative to the procurement of the revenue			
114	vehicle fleet;			
115	g. managing the design, engineering and construction management functions			
116	related to the transit capital program including new facilities development and			
117	maintenance of existing infrastructure; providing support services such as project			
118	management, environmental review, permit and right-of-way acquisitions, schedule and			
119	project control functions;			
120	h. managing rideshare operations functions including vanpool, carpool, and			
121	regional ride matching programs; and			
122	i. preparing and administering public transportation service and supporting			
123	capital facility plans and periodic updates.			
124	2. The council may assign responsibility for services ancillary to and in support			
125	of the operation and maintenance of the metropolitan public transportation system under			
126	chapter 35.58 RCW, including, but not limited to, human resources, accounting,			
127	budgeting, finance, engineering, fleet administration, maintenance, laboratory,			
128	monitoring, inspection and planning, as it determines appropriate.			
129	D. The duties of the fleet administration division shall include the following:			
130	1. Acquiring, maintaining and managing the motor pool and equipment			
131	revolving fund for fleet vehicles and equipment including, but not limited to, vehicles for			
132	the department of natural resources and parks, facilities management division, and			

133	transportation nonrevenue vehicles. Transportation department vehicles determined by				
134	the director to be intricately involved in or related to providing public transportation				
135	services shall not be part of the motor pool;				
136	2. Establishing rates for the rental of equipment and vehicles;				
137	3. Establishing terms and charges for the sale of any material or supplies which				
138	have been purchased, maintained or manufactured with money from the equipment				
139	revolving fund;				
140	4. Managing training programs, stores function and vehicle repair facilities;				
141	5. Administering the county alternative fuel program and take-home assignment				
142	of county vehicles policy; and				
143	6. Inventorying, monitoring losses and disposing of county personal property in				
144	accordance with K.C.C. chapter 4.56.				
145	E. The airport division is responsible for managing the maintenance and				
146	operations of the King County international airport. The duties of the division shall				
147	include the following:				
148	1. Developing and implementing airport programs under state and federal law				
149	including preparing policy recommendations and service models;				
150	2. Managing and maintaining the airport system infrastructure;				
151	3. Managing, or securing services from other divisions, departments or entities				
152	to perform, the design, engineering and construction management functions related to the				
153	airport capital program including new facilities development and maintenance of existing				
154	infrastructure; providing support services such as project management, environmental				
155	review, permit and right-of-way acquisitions, schedule and project control functions; and				

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4. Preparing and administering airport service and supporting capital facilityplans and periodic updates.

F. The marine division is responsible for the administration, maintenance and
operation of passenger ferry service in King County. (on a contract basis for the King
County Ferry District.)) The duties of the division shall include the following:

161 1. Managing, acquiring, constructing and maintaining ((the ferry district's))
 162 King County's marine transportation system infrastructure;

163 2. Managing, or securing services from other divisions, departments or entities,
164 to perform the design, engineering and construction management functions related to the
165 passenger ferry capital program including vessel procurement, new facilities development
166 and maintenance of existing infrastructure;

167 3. Providing ((support services to the ferry-district)) general administration of

168 <u>the passenger ferry service</u>, such as project management, grants management,

169 procurement, labor negotiations, environmental review, permit and real property

170 acquisitions and managing contract services; and

4. Planning, <u>implementing</u>, administering and operating passenger ferry service
((in accordance with agreements between the county and the King County Ferry District))

173 <u>in King County</u>.

174 <u>SECTION 5.</u> A. Section 6 of this ordinance adopts fees for passenger ferries.

215	SECTION 7. Ordinance 17527, Section 129, as amended, and K.C.C.				
216	4A.200.420 are hereby amended to read as follows:				
217	A. There is hereby created the marine services ((division)) operating fund.				
218	B. The fund shall be a first tier fund. It is ((a special revenue)) an enterprise				
219	fund.				
220	C. The director of the department of transportation shall be the manager of the				
221	fund.				
222	D. ((The fund shall provide for the revenues to and expenditures by King County,				
223	on behalf of the King County ferry district, as established in K.C.C. 2.120.010, in				

224	performance of services associated with the operating functions of the district.)) All				
225	proceeds generated by an ad valorem tax levy upon all taxable property in King County				
226	authorized by RCW 36.54.130, all receipts from the operation of the King County marine				
227	division passenger ferry service, proceeds from grants, bonds and other revenues for				
228	passenger ferry services shall be deposited in the fund.				
229	E. All moneys in the fund shall be used for the purpose authorized in chapter				
230	<u>36.54 RCW.</u>				
231	NEW SECTION. SECTION 8. There is hereby added to K.C.C. chapter 4A.200				
232	a new section to read as follows:				
233	A. There is hereby created a marine capital fund.				
234	B. The fund shall be a first tier fund. It is an enterprise capital fund.				
235	C. The director of the department of transportation shall be the manager of the				
236	fund.				
237	D. All receipts from transfers from the marine operating fund and revenues for				
238	marine division passenger ferry capital purposes from bond proceeds, grants and other				
239	sources shall be deposited in the fund.				
240	SECTION 9. Ordinance 15739, Section 2, and K.C.C. 2.120.010 are each hereby				
241	amended to read as follows:				
242	A. A $((new))$ ferry district within King County is hereby established.				
243	B. ((The members of the King-County council, acting ex officio and				
244	independently, shall compose the governing body of the ferry district.)) The voters of the				
245	ferry district must be registered voters residing within the boundaries of the district.				

246	$((C_{\cdot}))$ The county ferry district shall include the entire corporate boundary of the				
247	county.				
248	((D)) <u>C</u> . The ferry district possesses all of the powers ((as provided for in)) that a				
249	ferry district may have under chapter 36.54 RCW ((36.54.110)) and other authorities.				
250	SECTION 10. Ordinance 15739, Section 3, and K.C.C. 2.120.020 are each				
251	hereby repealed.				
252	NEW SECTION. SECTION 11. There is hereby added to K.C.C. chapter 2.120				
253	a new section to read as follows:				
254	A. All resolutions enacted by the board of the King County ferry district and not				
255	expressly repealed by December 31, 2014, that are not inconsistent with the King County				
256	Charter or ordinances are hereby readopted and ratified.				
257	SECTION 12. A. Section 13 of this ordinance adopts fees for passenger ferries.				
258	B. These fees are adopted pursuant to RCW 36.54.010 and RCW 36.54.120.
