


What is the Long Range Plan?

Long Range Plan Element	Role	Example
Strategic Element	Guides the role of Metro in the growing region	 Describes how Metro integrates with ridesharing Describes Metro's contribution to the economy and equity
Service Element2025 Network2040 Network	Guides where Metro adds what kind of service beyond identified near-term needs	 Identifies future Rapid Ride Corridors Incorporates local transit plans/priorities Identifies how Metro service will change around ST expansion
Capital Element	Guides where Metro makes capital investments to support service	 Identifies speed & reliability improvements Identifies park-and-ride improvements Incorporates priorities from Access to Transit
Financial Element	Identifies Metro's long term financial need	 Cost of 2025 and 2040 service and capital plans and other investments



Coordinated Timeline






Progress Update

- Beginning discussion of capital needs




Types of Outreach



- 6,000 online responses
- 3 open houses

- Briefings with local jurisdictions
- 1st community roundtable

LRP Technical Advisory Committee



- Participation from:
 - 25 municipalities participated, reached out to all 39 cities
 - Sound Transit, WSDOT, PSRC, Community Transit, Pierce Transit, Sound Cities Association, Snoqualmie Valley Trans.



TAC & Community Summary Points

- Value all day, frequent service with easy transfers
- Express center-to-center connections
- More connections between centers in the south, east, and north county, not just to downtown Seattle
- Focus on speed and reliability of transit service
- Ensure access to the transit network throughout the county
- Connections to light rail
- Interest in park-and-rides
- Travel needs in rural areas including alternative services



Using Local Input for a Countywide Network

NW

- Densities support frequent service
- Congestion creates need for some express/limited-stop service
- Connections to growth areas in Seattle

SW

- Densities in core areas support frequent services
- Express connections needed to connect distant centers
- Connections to manufacturing/industrial centers needed
- East-West connections needed

NE

- Densities in core areas support frequent services
- Needs local service for neighborhood connections
- Service on SR 522 and I-405
- Connections between Eastside cities

SE

- Express connections needed to connect distant centers
- Local service needed in low density areas
- Connections to Eastside cities



Supporting the Regional Network

- Metro is working closely with Sound Transit to develop a plan that will enhance the value of ST investments
 - Jointly evaluating corridors of shared interest
 - Making sure service connects to the regional network
 - Making transfers seamless
