SUBJECT:

A briefing to provide an overview of future levies and ballot measures in King County.

SUMMARY:

The following is a summary of the anticipated ballot measures for major levy renewals and new levies in King County over the next four years. Staff has not researched all of the anticipated 'smaller' ballot and levy measures, some are noted on a chart along with the major "Potential Ballot Measures" (**Attachment 1**) prepared by the Executive's Office. Staff will attempt to address some of the smaller anticipated city and district measures during a verbal briefing before the committee. The basis for the attached tables is the work of the King County Tax Assessor and additional information provided by the Executive's office. The result is a summary table of h 'Active Voter Approved Property Tax Measures' (**Attachment 2**) that is provided for reference also.

Potential future ballot measures¹

The city of Seattle, King County and Seattle Public Schools all have additional property-tax measures that could be sent to the voters over the next five years.

BACKGROUND:

The following is a brief synopsis of some of the anticipated ballot measures – whether renewals or new. Limited information is available at this time.

Radio Replacement Project (2015)

The emergency radio system in King County allows public safety communications for police, fire, emergency medical, public schools, and public hospital agencies within King County. It is also important for day to day business, such as school communications and county landfill operations. The emergency radio system in King County is jointly owned and operated by King County, City of Seattle, and Eastside Public Safety Communications Agency (EPSCA), and Valley Communications Center (ValleyCom).

The existing system needs replacing because the current system is reaching the end of its useful life. The equipment vendor for King County's system has begun withdrawing support for equipment, including selling new parts and repairing broken parts.

Current estimates for replacement of the system in King County are \$251.4 million to \$277.7 million, but there are remaining policy and operational decisions yet to be made.

Best Start for Kids (2015?)

At his budget address in September 2014 to the King County Council, Executive Constantine announced a new initiative "Best Start for Kids". The website for Best Start describes the effort as follows: With Best Starts for Kids, Executive Constantine has pledged to work with the King County Council and community leaders to develop a proposal that will focus on three areas:

Pregnancy and early childhood:

- Healthier moms deliver healthier babies.
- Families are supported to form close bonds and play active roles in early childhood development.
- Babies and toddlers have a healthy start in life and strong foundation for brain growth, and preschoolers are set on a pathway to success.

School-age children and youth:

- Children and youth engage in meaningful social and family relationships and progress toward a healthy, safe, academically and vocationally successful life.
- Physical and behavioral health issues are prevented outright or identified and treated early to prevent future crises.

Communities of Opportunity Fund:

- The places where we live, work, learn, and plan are supported to create safe, welcoming, and healthy neighborhoods.
- Communities are in the driver's seat and have the capacity to address issues they care about most.

Executive Constantine is anticipated to convene a leadership circle with membership from King County's Health and Human Services Transformation Plan and Youth Action Plan Task Force, to assist in developing the specifics of this proposal and a community engagement plan. Timing for a potential ballot measure to fund this initiative is unknown at the time Council staff were writing this report.

Seattle "Bridging the Gap" Transportation Levy (2015)

In November 2006, Seattle voters approved a 9-year, \$365 million levy for transportation needs throughout the city. Funds are being used for maintenance and enhancements. Approximately 65% of funding is scheduled to be used for maintenance/repair of roads, bridges, sidewalks, and more. Nearly 25% of funding to be used for improvements for bikes, pedestrians and safety, and enhanced transit services. Around 10% of funding to be used for system enhancements, including Spokane St. viaduct, Lander St. overpass, Mercer corridor, and King St. station. The Neighborhood Street Fund was anticipated to receive \$1.5 million per year from the levy. Renewal of this levy is anticipated in the fourth quarter or November 2015 ballot.

Seattle City School District Operations and Capital levies (2016)

It is anticipated that the Seattle School District will be placing levies on the ballot in 2016. The first, an Operations Levy, will fund approximately 30% of the District's operating budget (based on past levies). The second, a Capital Levy is anticipated to be proposed to fund building and infrastructure projects, including technology investments.

Seattle Housing Levy (2016)

Since 1981, Seattle voters approved on bond and three levies to create and preserve affordable housing. Seattle has now funded 10,000 affordable apartments for seniors, formerly homeless individuals and families, and low- to moderate-wage workers, plus provided loans to more than 600 first-time homebuyers and rental assistance to over 4,000 households.

The current levy will raise approximately \$145 million from 2010 – 2016 and is expected to produce or preserve 1,850 affordable homes and assist 3,420 households.

Mental Illness and Drug Dependency (MIDD) funding renewal (2016) – currently Councilmanic approved sales tax. Renewal anticipated in 2016 – with development of a plan for investments, etc. to be developed in 2015. Noted here, in the event this is converted to a voter approved funding plan.

Veterans and Human Services Levy (2017)

The first Veterans and Human Services Levy was passed by the voters of King County in November 2005 to generate funding to help veterans, military personnel and their families, and other individuals and families in need across the county through a variety of housing and supportive services. In August 2011, the voters of King County voted overwhelmingly to renew the Veterans and Human Services Levy for another six years. The renewal levy preserves the 50:50 split of proceeds, with half of the revenues dedicated to helping veterans, military personnel and their families and the other half dedicated to helping other individuals and families in need.

A new Service Improvement Plan (SIP) was developed and approved by the King County Executive and the Metropolitan King County Council to guide levy investments from 2012 through 2017. The levy implementation ordinance required a new SIP to detail how the county will expend levy funds to provide services and supports for those in need. Renewal of the levy would be anticipated in 2017 with new funding starting in 2018.

Automated Fingerprint Information Systems 'AFIS' (November 2018)

The Regional Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS) Program provides the technology, equipment, and staff to recover and process fingerprints from major crime scenes. AFIS Program was supported by a six-year property tax levy that expired in 2012. However there was sufficient funding in reserves to delay the renewal of the levy until 2013, with new

funding that started in 2014. The next levy renewal would be anticipated in 2018, based upon the current financial plan for AFIS.

Seattle Families and Education Levy (2018)

The current Families and Education Levy is a property tax levy approved by Seattle voters in 2011, with funding awarded from school year 2012-13 through 2018-19. It is administered by the City's Office for Education — distinct from, but in collaboration with, the Seattle School District. Levy oversight is accomplished by a community Levy Oversight Committee and the Seattle City Council. The current levy was built on previous levies approved in 1990, 1997, and 2004.

The Levy provides supplemental support to Seattle public schools to increase students' success in school. Funds are awarded on a competitive basis to schools and community-based organizations to achieve the following:

- Early Learning - to reduce the achievement gap that exists even before children enter kindergarten
- Elementary, Middle and High Schools - to provide multi-level support for students and families
- Student Health - to improve students' physical and mental health so they can feel and work better at school

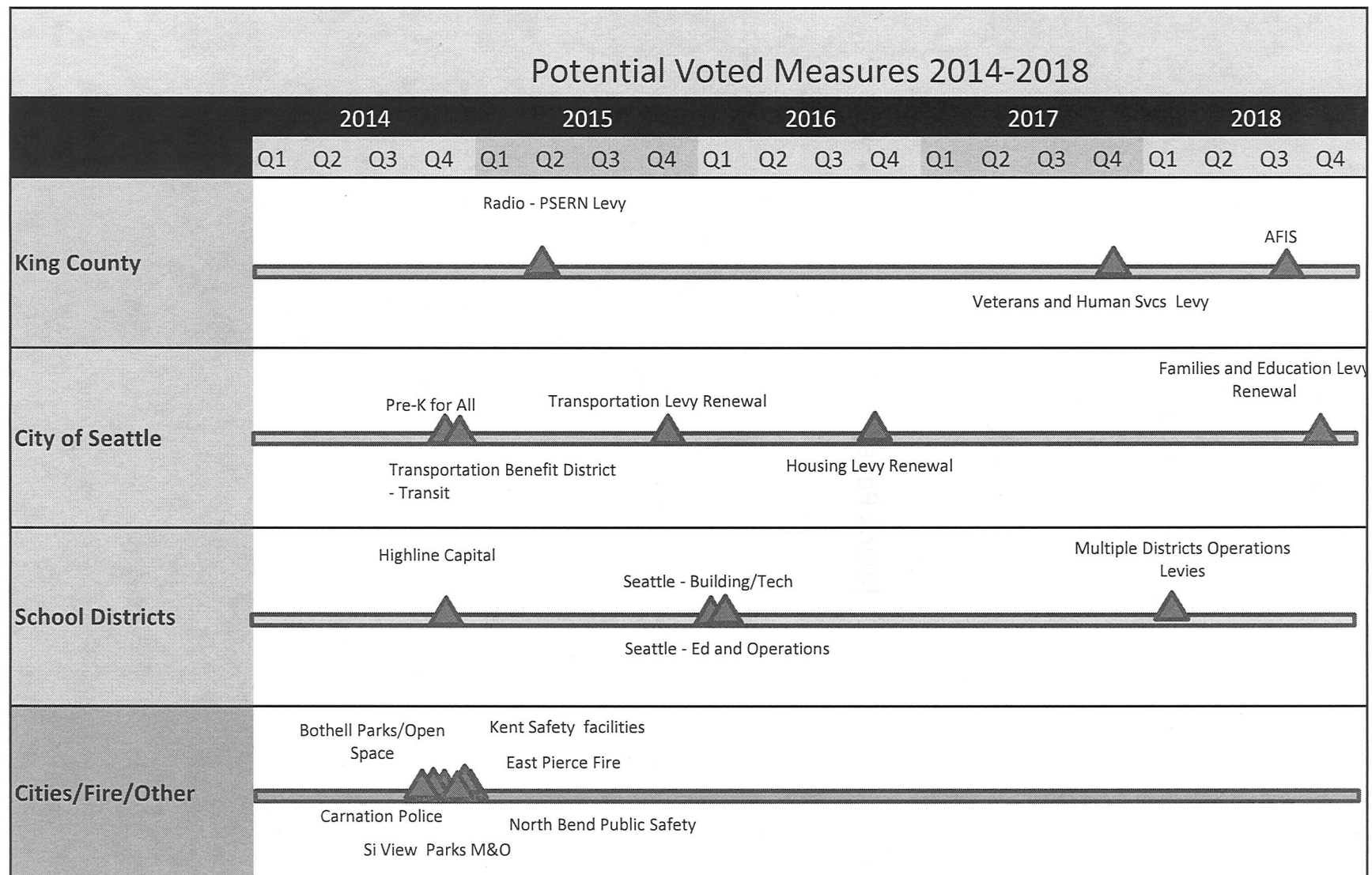
Seattle voters just approved Proposition 1B which authorizes a \$58 million property-tax levy to fund a four-year pilot program of preschool subsidized on a sliding scale, while setting academic standards and raising preschool teacher pay. The levy will cost the owner of a Seattle home valued at \$400,000 about \$43 a year, according to the city. Not approved by the voters was Seattle Proposition No. 1A, supported by a pair of labor unions and some child-care workers.

Other King County property tax measures that will potentially be renewed/expanded

Executive staff has reported preliminary information regarding anticipated renewals or new ballot measures for smaller cities and districts throughout the county on Attachments 1 and 2. These will be covered during the verbal briefing before the committee.
