1	A RESOLUTION encouraging efforts to protect
2	individuals within King County from human
3	papillomavirus-associated cancers and other conditions by
4	improving human papillomavirus vaccination rates and
5	increasing knowledge and acceptance of human
6	papillomavirus vaccines among parents and adolescents.
7	WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, nearly
8	eighty million Americans, which is one in four, are currently infected with at least one
9	type of human papillomavirus, and
10	WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that human
11	papillomavirus infections are responsible for an estimated thirty thousand seven hundred
12	new cancer cases each year in the United States, and
13	WHEREAS, human papillomavirus is thought to be responsible for more than
14	ninety percent of anal and cervical cancers, about seventy percent of vaginal and vulvar
15	cancers and more than sixty percent of penile cancers, and
16	WHEREAS, the incidence of noncervical cancers associated with human
17	papillomavirus is increasing, and
18	WHEREAS, in Washington state, the overall annual rate of all human
19	papillomavirus-associated cancers is 11.2 per one hundred thousand persons, which

equates to an average of two hundred thirty human papillomavirus-associated cancers 20 diagnosed in King County annually, and 21 WHEREAS, in King County, American Indian/Alaska Native and Hispanic 22 women have the highest rates of cervical cancer, followed by black, Asian/Pacific 23 Islander and white women, and 24 WHEREAS, human papillomavirus vaccines are recommended by the United 25 States Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices for males and females ages eleven 26 to twelve, with "catch-up" doses for females up to age twenty-six and for males up to age 27 twenty-one who were not vaccinated earlier in adolescence, and 28 WHEREAS, the United States Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices 29 also recommends human papillomavirus vaccination for men age twenty-two through 30 twenty-six years who have sex with men or who are immunocompromised, and 31 WHEREAS, more than seven years of vaccine safety monitoring by the Centers 32 for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration provide 33 continued evidence of the safety of human papillomavirus vaccines, and 34 WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 35 progress in the United States toward achievement of the Healthy People 2020 goal of 36 eighty percent human papillomavirus vaccination coverage among thirteen- to fifteen-37 year-olds has stagnated, resulting in ongoing vulnerability to human papillomavirus-38 related morbidity and mortality, and 39 WHEREAS, Washington state Immunization Information System data indicate 40 that local human papillomavirus vaccination coverage levels continue to be inadequate 41 42 with only thirty-eight percent of thirteen-to-seventeen-year-old girls and twenty-six

43	percent of thirteen-to-seventeen-year-old boys in King County completing the three-dose
44	human papillomavirus vaccine series, and
45	WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, missed
46	clinical opportunities are the most important reason why the United States has not
47	achieved high rates of human papillomavirus vaccine uptake, and
48	WHEREAS, parents' knowledge, attitudes and beliefs affect whether their
49	children receive vaccines, and
50	WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the President's
51	Cancer Panel have identified improving uptake of human papillomavirus vaccines as a
52	public health priority to reduce cancer in the United States;
53	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Health of King
54	County:
55	A. The Board of Health supports efforts by Public Health - Seattle & King
