5	1. Ordinance 18031 establishe	ed the grant award criteria and process for
6	the WaterWorks grant progran	n in accordance with the 2015/2016 Biennial
7	Budget Ordinance, Ordinance	17941, Section 110, Proviso P2, and
8	authorized the release of \$2,00	00,000.
9	2. Attachment A to Ordinance	e 18031 contains the implementation
10	guidelines for the WaterWork	s grant program, including the project
11	criteria, eligibility, project sele	ection process and administration of grants;
12	the implementation guidelines	provide for a grant ranking committee to
13	review, rank and recommend	projects for funding and for the wastewater
14	treatment division of the depa	rtment of natural resources and parks to
15	administer and staff the progra	am.
16	3. As described in Attachmen	at A to Ordinance 18031, projects approved
17	for funding must meet eligibil	ity criteria for water quality improvements,
18	and the grant ranking commit	tee is to review, rank and recommend to the
19	King County executive the pr	ojects to be approved for funding, based

20	upon the eligibility criteria and ability of the applicants to demonstrate
21	water quality benefits and implementation strength.
22	4. The grant ranking committee convened three times in December 2015,
23	January 2016 and February 2016 to review and rank grant proposals, and
24	has recommended funding for the projects listed in section 1 of this
25	ordinance, based upon the eligibility criteria, water quality benefits and
26	implementation strength.
27	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
28	SECTION 1. The King County council authorizes the funding of WaterWorks
29	projects for Round 1, 2016, totaling \$850,000, as follows:
30	A. Nature Vision: \$24,949 for "Water Quality Education Project";
31	B. Friends of the Issaquah Salmon Hatchery: \$30,000 for "FISH Volunteer
32	Recruitment Support";
33	C. Futurewise: \$81,565 for "Stormwater Pollution Reduction Project for
34	Algona";
35	D. Stewardship Partners: \$75,000 for "Green Stormwater Infrastructure Mini
36	Grants, RainWise Access Grants and Community Engagement Campaign";
37	E. West Woodland Elementary School PTA, School Gardens Committee:
38	\$15,000 for "Rain Garden Restoration - Built to Last";
39	F. City of Kent - \$100,000 for "Leber Homestead: Arsenic Remediation";
40	G. Seattle Tilth Association: \$50,000 for "Improving Water Quality through
41	Changes to Agriculture Practices";

42	H. Mountains to Sound Greenway Trust: \$50,000 for "Me-Kwa-Mooks Parks
