Homeland Security/Emergency Management	 Secure the following in the Homeland Security Appropriations bill: \$5.0 million for floodplain buyouts and home elevations to reduce flood risks for the residential area of North Bend; \$1.6 million for the acquisition and installation of Chemical, Biological, and HazMat detection system, in the Downtown Seattle Transit Tunnel.
6.	Reclaimed Water	Secure \$1.5 million in the Interior and Environment Appropriations bill in the EPA's State and Tribal Assistance Grant (STAG) program for construction of reclaimed water distribution facilities for agricultural irrigation in the Sammamish Valley.

9.	Housing and Community Development Funds	Secure the following in Housing and Urban Development Appropriations: \$1.9 million for relocation costs for low income floodplain residents at high risk of flooding (40-50 trailers @ Cedar Grove Mobile Home Park).
10.	Energy Efficiency	Secure the following in the Energy and Water Development Appropriations bill in the Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy Account: 1. \$750,000 for the Issaquah Highlands Zero Energy Affordable Housing Project; 2. \$240,000 for the Low-Energy Bus Yard Lighting Project.
11.	Superior Court	Secure \$2.0 million in the Commerce, Science, Justice Appropriations bill in the COPS Technology Account for the development and implementation of the King County Superior Court Criminal Tracking System.

1. Transportation

Support legislation that would supplement the definition of "Bridge" as used in section 650.403 of the Code of Federal Regulations to include short span structures whose replacement would be more than 20 feet long. This would allow short-spans to qualify for the federal bridge replacement and rehabilitation program.

Support the reauthorization of the Airport Improvement Program. (On September 23, 2008, Congress approved H.R. 6984 reauthorizing the Federal Aviation Administration through March 31, 2009.)

Support the reauthorization of the SAFETEA-LU legislation (authorizing all surface transportation programs) with a special emphasis on transportation components of the Climate Communities' Climate Action Blue Print for President Obama and the 111 Congress to address a more balanced investment in highway and mass transit; with a special emphasis on reducing the transportation sectors impact on climate change.

Support continued solvency of the Highway Trust Fund and oppose any raiding of Federal Transit Administration Funds to offset the shortfall.

Support mileage reimbursement for volunteers and carpools. Support increased transit funding in the reauthorization of the SAFETEA-LU legislation.

Support the development of energy efficient buses and providing funds to defray the cost differential for hybrid buses.

Support the following flood control projects: \$3 million North Bend request for improved flood conveyance across SR202.

2.	Lake Washington Ship Canal	Support funds (amount TBD) in the Energy and Water Appropriation bill for the Muckleshoot Indian Tribe request for permanent solutions for fish passage problems at the Lake Washington Ship Canal.
3.	Workforce Development	Support \$500,000 in the Labor-Health and Human Services- Education Appropriations bill for the Seattle King County Workforce Development Council to integrate workforce training services into other social services currently offered to ex-offenders transitioning back into the community.
4.	Emergency Management	Support federal legislation to prohibit caller identification spoofing and to require higher caller location accuracy for manufacturers of telecommunications equipment. Monitor future activity pertaining to the FCC regulation requiring VoIP to provide e-911 service.
5.	Homeland Security/ Bioterrorism	Support efforts to designate the Seattle/King County area as a Tier I threat area. Oppose imposition of non-federal matching requirements for federal homeland security funds. Oppose proposed 15% personnel cap on federal homeland security and emergency management funds.
6.	Health Care Reform	 Support acceleration and expansion of the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) and the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) efforts to: Support health care reform legislation that includes payment reform based on quality, prevention and value-based care, expansion of public insurance coverage and access, preservation of private and employer-sponsored insurance, consumer engagement, and incentives for primary care recruitment; Support public reporting of nationally-vetted process and outcome measures and cost transparency of all care regardless if paid for by private or public (e.g., Medicare) insurance; Support health information technology, clinical information system adoption and clinical management capabilities; Fund regional, interoperable health information technology networks;

Fund medical home/patient-centered care demonstration pilot programs; Support legislation related to approval of biogenerics; Support legislation related to developing criteria as to when a specialty drug should be included in a benefit plan; Support legislation aimed at reducing employer costs or crediting employers for offering comprehensive health benefits, prevention and supportive wellness programs; and Support legislation that reduces hospital acquired conditions and denies payment for services caused by hospital acquired conditions. Support CMS and the Agency of Health Research and Quality (AHRQ) to continue to: • Publicly support cost-effective evidence-based medicine and medical practices; Advocate the importance of improving quality of health care delivered; and Secure grant funding to support the evaluation component of King County's Healthy Incentives Initiative which employs a unique combination of strategies to drive down health care costs by improving employee health, as well as health education/wellness programs. 7. Housing and Community Housing and Urban Development Appropriations: **Development Funds** The CDBG Program is able to spend funds and create jobs immediately by addressing its current backlog of projects. Restore funding to at least \$4.1 billion or more as part of any economic stimulus package; Provide full funding for the Section 8 Program; Fund the McKinney/Vento Act for Homeless Assistance at \$1.8 billion and ensure the renewal of Shelter Plus Care funding; The HOME Program is able to spend funds and create jobs immediately by addressing its current backlog of projects. Fund the HOME Program to at least \$2 billion or more as part of any economic stimulus package; Increase funding for the National Housing Trust Fund. Require funding to local governments based upon the same formula distribution factors used to allocate funds to state; and Support legislation to amend and improve the Section 811 Supportive Housing for Persons with Disabilities program. H.R. 5772 – the Frank Melville Supportive Housing Investment Act of 2008 will improve the Section 811 program and increase new Section 811 units every year.

8.	Homelessness Resources	Support legislation to provide supportive services to eliminate homelessness as outlined in the Ten Year Plan to End Homelessness in King County by 2015.
9.	Immigration Reform	Support legislation that respects established civil rights, ensures due process of law for immigrants, including freedom from racial profiling and enforcement that is neither arbitrary nor selective, reunites and protects families, protects workers regardless of immigration status, offers a pathway to citizenship for the millions of undocumented immigrants in this nation.
10.	Workforce Training	Support Workforce Investment Act funding for dislocated workers, youth education and training funds, and Green Jobs. Support funding for the HUD Youthbuild program.
11.	Endangered Species	Oppose any attempts to weaken environmental protections provided by the Endangered Species Act.
12.	Natural Resources	Support legislation supporting a portion of federal transportation project mitigation funding is directed toward high priority salmon recovery projects within watersheds/WRIAs; allow for mitigation banking for ESA implementation.
13.	Abandoned Mines	Support legislation reauthorizing Abandoned Mines Land fund.
14.	Federal Cap & Trade System for Greenhouse Gas (carbon) Emissions and other mitigation efforts	Support the America's Climate Security Act of 2007 that creates a national "cap and trade" system for power plant operators and major industrial emitters. Include provisions to provide incentives for local governments to address their impacts on global warming, such as increase use of hybrid fleets and bio-diesel; hydrogen fuel cells and reclaimed water investments at wastewater treatment plants, and addressing the reduction of vehicle miles traveled (VMT) by residents.
15.	Renewable Fuels	Support House and Senate bills calling for mandated minimum fuels content for ethanol in gasoline and bio-diesel in diesel.

16.	Electric Vehicle Promotion	Support funding for a pilot program to convert public agency fleets to electric and plug-in vehicles.
17.	Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) Program	Support \$2 billion annual appropriation to the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant (EECBG) program included in the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 to provide assistance to local and state governments to develop and implement a comprehensive energy efficiency strategy which emphasizes a bottom-up, community-based approach in helping the nation meet its energy and climate protection goals.

Climate Change	Support provisions to provide funding for climate change adaptation planning and implementation (e.g., investments in sustainable resources, such as reclaimed water; evaluation and replacement of vulnerable infrastructure). Support legislation designed to facilitate the improvement of water management by the Bureau of Reclamation and take into
		account the impacts of global climate change on water resources. Support the Climate Communities' Climate Action Blue Print for the Obama Administration and the 111 th Congress.
19.	Clean Water Act (wetlands protection, infrastructure, CSO affordability, watershed management	Support legislative efforts to provide statutory protection for wetlands and other aquatic resources whose coverage under the Clean Water Act is in jeopardy from court decisions. Track federal agency efforts (EPA) to weaken such protections via administrative rulemakings.
		Support legislation to reauthorize the Clean Water State Revolving Fund for water pollution infrastructure improvements of \$20 billion in FY 2008-2012, and authorize additional funding for sewer overflow projects. Maximize CWSRF funding appropriation to the maximum authorized amount.
		Support legislation to create a natural trust fund for water and wastewater infrastructure.
		Support legislation (S. 3443) directing EPA to revise the 1997 Combined Sewer Affordability Guidance to achieve a more integrated, flexible and site specific approach.

		1. Support Kids-Safe Chemicals Act - S.3040 and H.R. 6100 in 110th Congress – to amend the Toxic Substances Control Act to reduce exposure of children, workers and consumers to toxic chemicals

28.	Mental Health	Support legislation to address co-occurring disorders (mental health and substance abuse) eligibility and integration of services.
		Support legislation to modify 42 CFR Part 2 to allow for information on chemical dependency treatment to be shared when done for the purpose of offering services. Services include: housing, mental health treatment, physical health, and co-occurring disorder treatment.
		Support legislation such as the 110 th Congress' Medicare Mental Health Co-payment and Equity Act of 2007 (S. 1715). Currently Medicare patients pay 50 percent for mental health outpatient treatment. S. 1715 reduces the Medicare payment to 20 percent.
	,	Support legislation to increase the Federal Medicaid Assistance Percentage (FMAP) for Washington state.
29.	Public Health	Withdraw proposed rule regarding "Provider Conscience Regulations" (73 Fed. Reg. 50274).
		 Support omnibus family planning initiatives that: increase access to family planning services; eliminate cost barriers for poor and low-income women; ensure equity in prescription insurance and contraceptive coverage; and protect teens against infection and unintended pregnancy.
		Support legislation that re-authorizes the State Children's Health Insurance (SCHIP) and expands SCHIP coverage to include families with higher incomes (300% of FPL).
		Support legislation that increases access to comprehensive oral healthcare services for adults and children living in underserved areas including rural and inner-city communities.
		Support inclusion of prevention/public health as part of any federal health care reform proposal.
		Reinstate CDC program and funding for an Academic Health Department in the County, which would support a partnership between the County and area universities to provide cutting edge care and to better healthcare workforce and for academic practice-based research.
:		Support efforts to permanently abolish the 7 CMS regulations under moratoria.

Make Steps to a Healthier US funding a priority of the new Administration

Support increased funding in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, including additional resources to address communicable diseases, to provide immunizations, to prevent and treat TB, to combat the spread of STDs, and expand the cancer screening and early detection programs.

Support legislation to decrease health disparities.

Pursue regulations to allow state Title V funded programs to participate in the 340 B Drug Pricing Program, thereby making contraceptives more affordable for women and men.

Remove age restrictions for those 17 years old and younger over-the-counter emergency contraception.

Support the creation of an interagency task force to develop and implement a national plan to halt and reverse the national obesity epidemic.

Authorize resources for states to develop and test public health approaches to promote healthy eating and active living.

Tobacco Master Settlement relating to marketing cigarettes to youth. Secure greater enforcement of the current Master Settlement agreement re: tobacco advertising in youth oriented magazines. Amend the current regulations for enforcement at the state level.

Support Home visiting programs such as The Healthy Children and Families Act proposed in the 110th Congress (S. 1052/HR 3024) that allows states the option of offering, within SCHIP and Medicaid programs, evidence based nurse home visitation services such as NFP to low-income women/children. Also, the request through the Administration for Children and Families for evidence-based home visitation programs.

Support the creation of a generic flexible funding pool of \$20 billion for public health.

Support increased transparency and accountability through the development of performance measures and accreditation

30.	Repeal Institutions for Mental Disease (IMD) Exclusion	Facilities of greater than 16 beds that are primarily devoted to the care of psychiatric patients are deemed to be Institutions for Mental Diseases (IMD). Persons in such a facility do not qualify for Medicaid and no Title XIX funding can be used for their care. The IMD Exclusion impacts over 400 individuals who reside in King County residential facilities.
31.	Solid Waste	Support legislation similar to the 110 th Congress' H.R. 1248 which would have ended unregulated solid waste operations along rail lines and the ability of these waste facilities to operate independent of state and local environmental, health and safety regulations.
		Support efforts to reverse the 2006 EPA-issued final rule (Toxics Release Burden Reduction Rule) that relaxed reporting requirements for the Toxics Release Inventory (TRI). Reporting requirements for the most dangerous category of toxic chemicals, persistent bioaccumulative toxins (PBTs), was also reduced.
		Support efforts to remove federal regulatory barriers that prohibit or restrict the development of a safe medicine return program for consumers.
		Support efforts to finalize the pesticide container recycling rule. The current rule proposal addresses only agricultural pesticide containers. A similar mandatory recycling program provided by pesticide manufacturers for residential and landscaping containers is also needed.
		Support efforts to ban the export of electronic waste collected by Electronics Recycling laws. Electronics waste from the US continues to be shipped overseas to countries which do not follow adequate recycling processes, resulting in highly hazardous exposure to workers and appalling environmental contamination
32.	CSO Affordability Guidance	Support legislation similar to the 110 th Congress' S. 3443 to direct EPA to revise its 1997 CSO Affordability Guidance.
33.	Developmental Disabilities	Support legislative efforts to increase funding for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) for early intervention services to birth to three year old infants and toddlers with developmental delays.
