1 AN ORDINANCE providing for the submission to the
2 qualified electors of King County at a special election to be
3 held in King County on May 20, 2003, of a proposition to
4 protect the public's investment in parks by authorizing a
5 property tax levy in excess of the levy limitation contained
6 in chapter 84.55 RCW, for a four-consecutive-year period,
7 at a rate of not more than \$0.049 per one thousand dollars
8 of assessed valuation, for the purpose of providing funding
9 to enable the continued and increased operation and
10 maintenance of King County's regional and rural parks,
11 recreation facilities and community-based recreation
12 programs and establishing a county parks citizens'
13 oversight board to review and report on expenditures of
14 levy proceeds, contingent on voter approval of the levy.

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17 **BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:**

18 **SECTION 1. Findings:**

19 A. King County owns and operates a parks system consisting of over twenty-five
20 thousand acres of parks land, natural lands, open space, ballfields, local parks and
21 recreation facilities. Although many of these parks and open space areas are located in
22 rural areas, the King County parks system includes many parks that are used by residents
23 throughout the region. King County parks and open space areas include Marymoor park,
24 Cougar Mountain regional park, the King County aquatic center and portions of the
25 Burke Gilman trail, all of which contribute to the high quality of life in our region.

26 B. In the last six months, the parks and recreation division of the King County
27 department of natural resources and parks has implemented a major transition in the way
28 it does business. The county has transferred many park and recreation facilities to cities,
29 cut parks and recreation division staff by thirty-five percent, reduced the parks and
30 recreation division budget by thirty-five percent from 2002 levels, and initiated an array
31 of entrepreneurial activities to raise nontax revenue to support county parks. These
32 efforts have been designed to reduce the parks system's reliance on taxes, and to refine
33 and refocus the King County parks system on regional assets and the county's ongoing
34 local government role in the rural area. A list of the county's regional and rural park
35 assets is included as Attachment A to this ordinance.

36 C. The countywide planning policies acknowledge the overall benefit provided
37 by rural areas to all King County residents, and call for regional strategies to support rural
38 area services.

39 D. Although parks system-generated revenues are expected to grow every year,
40 the metropolitan parks task force found that King County parks cannot become

41 completely self-sufficient. The continued operation of the parks system requires
42 continued tax support.

43 E. In 2003, the tax- and fee-supported funding for parks, after deducting system
44 generated revenues, is ten million dollars. This amount currently is provided by the
45 current expense (CX) fund, as well as surface water management fees for natural lands
46 and road fund dollars.

47 F. The King County office of management and budget estimates that in 2004,
48 continued operation of the entire parks system will require twelve million dollars in tax
49 support. The amount of tax support required to operate the entire park system, even with
50 growth in system-generated revenues, is likely to increase over the next six years to an
51 estimated sixteen million eight hundred thousand dollars in 2009.

52 G. The county's CX fund faces continuing challenges in future years, including
53 anticipated shortfalls in 2004 and 2005 in excess of twenty million dollars each year. As
54 a discretionary service under state law, parks will face significant additional cuts if they
55 remain reliant primarily on CX funding.

56 H. The parks and recreation division continues to work to implement the
57 recommendations described in the King County parks and recreation division business
58 plan, dated August 28, 2002, that call for continued and expanded efforts to raise nontax
59 revenue to support parks through entrepreneurial public-private ventures. K.C.C.
60 7.06.090 requires the parks and recreation division to report to the county council on its
61 progress in implementing the recommendations.

62 I. The metropolitan parks task force was created in February 2002 and tasked to
63 recommend to the county council and the executive ways to keep King County parks and

64 recreation facilities open to the public and eliminate the reliance of these parks and
65 facilities on county current expense revenues. The task force's phase I report, issued on
66 June 12, 2002, recommended the aggressive implementation of a broad array of new,
67 entrepreneurial strategies, the transfer of local in-city facilities to cities and the
68 reallocation of certain existing county revenues.

69 J. The metropolitan parks task force issued a phase II report in February 2003,
70 ("report"). The report concluded that "remarkable progress has been made in a few short
71 months to transform the county parks system operations, to implement innovative
72 business practices and efficiencies, to undertake entrepreneurial ventures to provide
73 nontax revenues to support parks, to reduce the size of the parks and recreation division
74 staff, transfer in-city parks to cities, and refocus on regional priorities."

75 K. Based on the 2002 report of the active sports and youth recreation commission
76 and the endorsement of the metropolitan parks task force, the 2003 parks and recreation
77 division budget included five hundred thousand dollars in capital funding from real estate
78 excise taxes and one hundred thousand dollars in current expense funding to support
79 association development operations partnerships, which will fund partnerships with
80 community-based organizations for recreational purposes. These partnerships typically
81 enable the county to enhance community recreation opportunities without increasing
82 maintenance costs.

83 L. As a result of funding challenges, maintenance levels at county parks have had
84 to be reduced over the years. This was a significant concern for the metropolitan parks
85 task force. The task force determined that a levy of between five and six cents per one

86 thousand dollars of assessed value was appropriate so that park maintenance levels could
87 be increased.

88 M. The task force recommended that the county seek voter approval for a six-
89 year property tax lid lift, in the amount of five and one-half cents per one thousand
90 dollars of assessed value dedicated to support county regional and rural parks. The task
91 force recommended that this money be applied to: support of regional and rural local
92 parks, which is the primary mission of the parks and recreation division; enhanced
93 operation and maintenance of the regional and rural local parks; an operation and
94 maintenance contingency in support of the regional and rural local parks; and continued
95 funding of association development operations partnerships to provide recreational
96 opportunities in partnership with nonprofit organizations.

97 N. The task force further recommended the creation of a citizen oversight board
98 to review and report on the expenditure of any parks levy proceeds.

99 O. The task force further recommended that the county create incentives to the
100 parks and recreation division to continue its work to transition the parks system to be
101 more entrepreneurial and less dependent upon tax subsidies over time.

102 P. The task force further recommended that the county fund the operation and
103 maintenance of its unincorporated urban parks with existing county revenue sources. The
104 subsidy required to operate these facilities is estimated to be approximately three million
105 dollars in 2004. The task force further encouraged King County's efforts to transfer these
106 facilities to cities.

107 Q. The county executive endorsed the work of the task force but has proposed
108 that the levy amount recommended by the task force be reduced by a half-cent to a rate of

109 five cents per one thousand dollars of assessed value. This lower amount is expected to
110 be sufficient to provide some funding for all the purposes identified by the task force,
111 including approximately one million dollars per year to increase maintenance levels at
112 regional and rural parks above existing standards, while keeping the levy rate as low as
113 practicable.

114 **SECTION 2. Definitions.** The definitions in this section apply throughout this
115 ordinance unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

116 A. "Levy" means the levy of regular property taxes, for the specific purpose and
117 term provided in this ordinance and authorized by the electorate in accordance with state
118 law.

119 B. "Levy proceeds" means the principal amount of funds raised by the levy and
120 any interest earnings on the funds.

121 C. "Recreation grant programs" means programs whereby King County provides
122 funding to recreation-oriented user groups, sports associations or community-based
123 organizations to undertake any combination of developing, operating or maintaining a
124 public park or recreation facility or program for the public benefit.

125 D. "Regional parks" means:

126 1. Those parks listed on Attachment A to this ordinance as regional trails,
127 resource and ecological lands, regional active facilities or regional passive parks; and

128 2. Any other parks, facilities or properties, including, without limitation, new
129 acquisitions, that are designated as regional parks by the parks and recreation division
130 based on their regional use and similar character and nature to the regional parks and
131 recreation identified on Attachment A to this ordinance.

132 E. "Rural parks" means:

133 1. Those parks listed on Attachment A to this ordinance as rural parks and
134 facilities; and

135 2. Any other parks, facilities or properties, including, without limitation, new
136 acquisitions, that are designated as rural parks by the parks and recreation division based
137 on their similar character and nature to those rural parks and facilities identified on
138 Attachment A to this ordinance.

139 **SECTION 3. Levy submittal to voters.** To provide necessary funds for the
140 continued and increased operation and maintenance of King County's regional and rural
141 parks, and to provide funds for recreation grant programs, the county council shall submit
142 to the qualified electors of the county a proposition authorizing a regular property tax
143 levy in excess of the levy limitation contained in chapter 84.55 RCW, for four
144 consecutive years commencing in 2003 with collection beginning in 2004, at a rate not to
145 exceed four and nine-tenths cents per one thousand dollars of assessed value. In
146 accordance with RCW 84.55.050, this levy shall be a regular property tax levy, which is
147 subject to the statutory rate limit of RCW 84.52.043.

148 **SECTION 4. Deposit of levy proceeds.** The levy proceeds shall be deposited in
149 a special revenue fund, which fund shall be created by ordinance.

150 **SECTION 5. Eligible expenditures.** If approved by the qualified electors of the
151 county, all levy proceeds shall be used to pay the costs associated with: the continued
152 and increased operation and maintenance of King County's regional and rural parks; and
153 up to three hundred thousand dollars of annual funding for recreation grant programs.

154 Eligible expenditures shall include all costs and charges to the parks and recreation
155 division or the county associated with or attributable to the purposes listed in this section.

156 **SECTION 6. Call for special election.** In accordance with RCW 29.13.010, it is
157 hereby deemed that an emergency exists requiring the submission to the qualified electors
158 of the county at a special election to be held on May 20, 2003, a proposition authorizing a
159 regular property tax levy for the purposes described in this ordinance. The manager of
160 the records and elections division shall cause notice to be given of this ordinance in
161 accordance with the state constitution and general law and to submit to the qualified
162 electors of the county, at the said special county election, the proposition hereinafter set
163 forth. The clerk of the council shall certify that proposition to the manager of the records
164 and elections division, in substantially the following form, with such additions, deletions
165 or modifications as may be required for the proposition listed below by the prosecuting
166 attorney:

167 **PROPOSITION 1:** The King County Council has passed Ordinance 14586
168 concerning funding parks, recreation, open space and trails. This proposition would fund
169 continued and increased operation and maintenance of King County's regional parks (for
170 example, Marymoor Park; Cougar Mountain; portions of Burke Gilman Trail), rural
171 parks, and recreation facilities, and fund recreation grant programs. It would authorize
172 King County to exceed RCW 84.55 regular property tax limitations and levy an
173 additional regular property tax of 4.9 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for four
174 consecutive years with collection beginning in 2004, as provided in Ordinance 14586.

178 **SECTION 7. County parks citizen oversight board established.** If the levy is
179 approved by the voters in accordance with section 6 of this ordinance, a county parks
180 citizen oversight board shall be established. The board shall consist of thirteen members.
181 Each councilmember shall nominate a representative from the councilmember's district.
182 If the executive does not appoint a person that has been nominated by a councilmember,
183 the executive must request that the councilmember nominate another candidate for
184 appointment. Board members shall be confirmed by the council. Members shall be
185 residents of King County and may not be elected or appointed officials of any unit of
186 government. On or before May 30 of each year beginning in the year 2005, the board
187 shall review and report to the King County executive and the King County council on the
188 parks and recreation division's expenditure of levy proceeds. The parks and recreation
189 division shall provide the board with the quarterly reports that the parks and recreation
190 division transmits to the King County council in accordance with K.C.C. 7.08.090. The
191 board expires June 30, 2008.

192 **SECTION 8. Ratification.** Certification of the proposition by the clerk of the
193 county council to the manager of the records and elections division in accordance with
194 law before the election on May 20, 2003, and any other act consistent with the authority
195 and before the effective date of this ordinance are hereby ratified and confirmed.

196 SECTION 9. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance or its application to
197 any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance or the
198 application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.




