2002 CULTURAL EDUCATION PROGRAM ARTS AWARDS: PANEL RECOMMENDATIONS

The Cultural Education Arts Advisory Committee review panel met on Friday April 26 and Saturday April 27, 2000 to review 66 applications to the 2002-2003 Cultural Education Arts Program.

The review panel consisted of the following committee members and panelists:

Process

Committee members read all applications prior to the panel meeting. Additional information for returning applicants was provided through written on-site reports conducted during the year by arts education specialist Candy Gamble. During the panel meeting support materials were reviewed, each application was discussed and rated according to the following criteria; Project Quality, Feasibility, Strength of Partnership, and Curriculum Integration. Applications which addressed specific program goals of discipline, ethnic and geographic diversity, or special needs populations, received additional consideration.

Funding was allocated based on panel ranking, review of project budgets, and further discussion of program impact. Priority was given to projects and expenses which provide direct in-classroom experience for teachers and students. In order to fund as many projects as possible many applicants received partial funding.

The Cultural Education Program received a total of 66 arts projects requesting \$647,870 and recommended a total of projects for \$328,002. These allocations include projects in all King County School Districts and all King County Council Districts.

OVERVIEW

The King County Landmarks and Heritage Commission's 2002 – 2003 Cultural Education Program Panel met on April 20, 2002 to review applications to the Heritage Cultural Education Program.

The following summarizes the Heritage Cultural Education Program Panel Recommendations for 2002 - 2003:

- The total number of applications reviewed was seventeen; the total amount of funding requested was \$187,400; and the total of project budgets leveraged by these requests was \$394,485.
- The panel recommended support for eleven projects, with a total of \$78,660 in available funds.
- Seven of the eleven projects recommended for funding will be receiving an award from the Heritage Cultural Education Program for the first time.
- Recommended awards range from \$10,000 to \$2,080.
- Applications were reviewed and evaluated based upon the following criteria, as stated in the 2002 2003 Heritage Cultural Education Program guidelines: Project Quality, Feasibility, Strength of Partnership between applicant and school(s), Project Impact, and Landmarks and Heritage Commission priorities.

This curriculum has been developed during the past four years with support from the Heritage Cultural Education Program, and focuses on the heritage of the First People of Puget Sound by studying one element of the region's indigenous culture in-depth. Working with the University of Washington's MESA (Mathematics, Engineering, Science Achievement) Project, which will host the completed site and promote its use, the applicant will work with teachers who have been involved in past years in the development of the project to review, critique, and pilot test the materials from the web.

Project Summary: The applicant proposes to conduct an urban archaeological excavation in the Courtland Place neighborhood of Rainier Valley in conjunction with a public art project and a street paving project that will be going on there next fall. Public artist Don Fels will serve as project director, and the project will involve several community partners, including Burke Museum Archaeology curator Dr. Peter Lape who will supervise graduate student archaeologists on the project. RVHS director Mikala Woodward will train elementary school students to gather oral history interviews and integrate historical documentation with archaeological 'evidence.' The excavation will be conducted in a traffic circle that is being reconfigured by the Seattle Department of Transportation (SeaTrans) in area where there have been numerous antique bottles and other historical artifacts found. The site is not currently listed on the state inventory; however, Dr. Lape will serve as liaison to the state Office of Archaeology and Historic Preservation to ensure that appropriate permits and review are obtained. In addition to participating in the excavation, students will work with RVHS to research, document, and create an exhibit of their findings, which will be displayed at RVHS and other neighborhood venues through the 2002-2003 school year.
