1	A MOTION expressing council support for the
2	implementation of the Snohomish Basin Salmon
3	Conservation Plan and related commitments and
4	conditions.
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7	WHEREAS, in March of 1999, the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric
8	Administration ("NOAA") Fisheries listed the Puget Sound Chinook salmon
9	evolutionarily significant unit as a threatened species under the Endangered Species Act
10	("ESA"), and
11	WHEREAS, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service ("USFWS") listed the
12	Puget Sound bull trout distinct population segment as a threatened species under the ESA
13	in November of 1999, and
14	WHEREAS, under the ESA, it is illegal to "take" a listed species, and the ESA
15	defines the term "take" to include actions that could harm listed species or their habitat,
16	and

17	WHEREAS, certain federal court opinions may be interpreted to suggest that
18	"take," if caused by actions that are directly or indirectly authorized by local
19	governments, could potentially expose local governments to civil or criminal penalties
20	under the ESA, and
21	WHEREAS, under ESA Section 4(f), NOAA Fisheries (for Chinook salmon) and
22	the USFWS (for bull trout) are required to develop and implement recovery plans to
23	address the recovery of the species, and
24	WHEREAS, the most essential ingredient for the development and
25	implementation of effective recovery programs is coordination and cooperation among
26	federal, state, and local agencies, tribes, academic researchers, nongovernmental
27	organizations and private citizens, and
28	WHEREAS, NOAA Fisheries and the USFWS can provide certain regulatory
29	assurances to jurisdictions that have committed to a recovery plan, and
30	WHEREAS, Shared Strategy for Puget Sound, a regional nonprofit organization,
31	has assumed a lead role in the Puget Sound response to developing a recovery plan for
32	submittal to NOAA Fisheries and the USFWS, and
33	WHEREAS, Shared Strategy for Puget Sound intends that its recovery plan will
34	include commitments from stakeholders, and
35	WHEREAS, King County is a party to a five-year interlocal agreement with the
36	cities of Duvall, Carnation, Snoqualmie and North Bend, through the Snoqualmie
37	Watershed Forum to jointly fund planning for watershed health and restoration of
38	salmonid habitat, and

39	WHEREAS, King County is a member of the Snohomish Basin Salmon Recover
40	Forum and assisted in the development of the Draft Snohomish Basin Salmon
41	Conservation Plan, and
42	WHEREAS, King County values ecosystem health, the protection of salmonids,
43	water quality and flood hazard reduction and maintaining a legacy for future generations
44	including commercial, tribal and sport fishing, aesthetic quality of life and cultural
45	heritage, and
46	WHEREAS, King County has consistently implemented habitat restoration and
47	protection projects over the past five years, including but not limited to such projects as:
48	the purchase of development rights on ninety thousand acres of the Snoqualmie Forest,
49	acquisition and establishment of Chinook Bend Natural Area, Fall City Natural Area,
50	Tolt Natural Area and Raging River Natural Area; the design of the Lower Tolt River
51	Floodplain Reconnection Project and the Raging River Preston Reach Levee Removal
52	Project; and the completion of restoration work along thousands of feet of the
53	Snoqualmie river and other important streams in the watershed, and
54	WHEREAS, King County, together with the other jurisdictions of the Snoqualmic
55	Watershed Forum, have conducted a joint regulatory review as directed under the
56	Snohomish Basin Near Term Action Agenda, and updated policies and local regulations
57	to address consistency with recommendations necessary for salmonid recovery and
58	watershed health, and
59	WHEREAS, King County supports regional cooperation to set common priorities
60	for action among partners, efficient use of resources and investments and distribution of
61	responsibility for action and expenditures, and

62	WHEREAS, it is important to provide jurisdictions, the private sector and the
63	public with certainty and predictability that the Snohomish Basin Salmon Conservation
64	Plan ("the Plan") represents the course of salmon recovery actions that we as a region will
65	be taking in the Snohomish river basin;
66	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County:
67	A. The council hereby indicates its approval of and support for:
68	1. The goal of the Snohomish Basin Salmon Recovery Forum to protect, restore
69	and enhance the productivity of all wild salmon stocks in the Snohomish basin to a level
70	that will sustain fisheries and non-consumptive salmon-related cultural values;
71	2. The long-term vision of the Plan; and
72	3. The ten-year habitat improvement milestones in the Plan, which provide a
73	clear path to make significant progress towards salmon recovery.
74	B. The council further indicates its support of continued work with NOAA
75	Fisheries, the USFWS and Shared Strategy for Puget Sound, or a future Puget Sound
76	regional recovery organization, to implement the Plan, such as:
77	1. Continuing to participate on the Snoqualmie Watershed Forum and
78	Snohomish Basin Salmon Recovery Forum to support Plan implementation, evaluation,
79	and management;
80	2. Implementing restoration and protection projects in unincorporated King
81	County consistent with the Plan;
82	3. Facilitating the achievement of forty to sixty percent of the Plan's mainstem
83	habitat condition milestones in the King County portion of the watershed;

84	4. Implementing policies, programs and regulations consistent with the intent of
85	the Plan and necessary to achieve salmon recovery needs and goals;
86	5. Providing technical assistance, stewardship, education and incentives to
87	agriculture, forestry and rural residential landowners to protect and restore critical
88	habitat; and
89	6. Providing technical resources for monitoring and evaluation of habitat actions
90	and overall plan implementation.
91	C. The support of the King County Council is conditioned upon the following:
92	1. If King County commits to plan implementation, then NOAA Fisheries and
93	the USFWS will each adopt the Plan as an operative element of their separate ESA §4(f)
94	recovery plans for the Puget Sound Chinook salmon and the Puget Sound bull trout;
95	2. If King County commits to implementing the plan and is making progress,
96	then NOAA Fisheries and the USFWS:
97	a. shall take no direct enforcement actions against King County under the
98	ESA; and
99	b. shall endorse the Plan and its actions, and shall defend them against legal
100	challenge by third parties;
101	3. If King County commits to implement the Plan, then the federal and state
102	governments will reward commitments through:
103	a. direct funding and other monetary incentives to cover the majority of costs
104	of implementation; and
105	b. streamlined permitting of King County projects implemented primarily to
106	restore salmonid habitat; and

4. To the extent that the commitments described in Subsection B. of this motion require future appropriations beyond current appropriation authority, then the commitments are conditioned upon future appropriations by the King County council.

Motion 12114 was introduced on 2/22/2005 and passed by the Metropolitan King County Council on 5/2/2005, by the following vote:
