2 **ARTICLE 2: UNION RECOGNITION AND MEMBERSHIP**

3 **Section 2.1.** The County recognizes the signatory organization as representing those regular
4 full-time and regular part-time career service, civil service and probationary employees whose job
5 classifications are listed in attached Addendum A (Wage Rates). The County also recognizes the
6 signatory organization as representing those temporary and term-limited temporary employees (as
7 opposed to regular employees) whose job classifications are listed in attached Addendum A (Wage
8 Rates), and who meet Washington State Public Employment Relations Commission's definition of
9 "employee".

10 Temporary and term-limited temporary employees (defined in Addendum C (Definitions))
11 however, are covered only by Article 7 (Wages) Sections 1, 2, 4 and 6 and Addendum A (Wage
12 Rates) of this collective bargaining agreement. No other provision in this collective bargaining
13 agreement applies to temporary or term-limited temporary employees. Except that Article 7 Section
14 6D (Education) applies to TLT employees but not to temporaries.

15 Vacation, sick leave, holidays and health care benefits for temporary and term-limited
16 temporary employees shall be governed by King County Code, Section 3.12.

17 **Section 2.2. Union Security:** It shall be a condition of employment that all regular full-time,
18 regular part-time, temporary and term-limited temporary employees who are members of the Union
19 on the effective date of this Agreement, shall remain members in good standing, or pay an agency fee
20 to the Union for their representation to the extent permitted by law.

21 It shall be a condition of employment that regular full-time, regular part-time, temporary and
22 term-limited temporary employees, covered by this Agreement and hired on or after its effective date
23 shall, on the thirtieth calendar (consecutive) day following such employment, become and remain
24 members in good standing in the Union, or pay an agency fee to the Union for their representation to
25 the extent permitted by law.

26 Provided, however, employees who hold genuine religious beliefs or tenets which object to
27 membership in the Union, as provided by state and federal law, shall not be required to tender those
28 dues or initiation fees to the Union as a condition of employment. Such employee shall pay an

1 amount of money equivalent to regular union dues and initiation fee to a non-religious charity
2 mutually agreed upon between the public employee and the Union. The employee shall furnish
3 written proof that payment to the agreed upon non-religious charity has been made. If the employee
4 and the Union cannot agree on the non-religious charity, the Public Employment Relations
5 Commission shall designate the charitable organization. It shall be the obligation of the employee
6 requesting or claiming the religious exemption to show proof to the Union that he/she is eligible for
7 such exemption.

8 All initiation fees and dues paid either to the Union or charity shall be for non-political
9 purposes.

10 **Section 2.3. Dues Deduction:** Upon receipt of written authorization individually signed by a
11 bargaining unit employee, the County shall have deducted from the pay of such employee the amount
12 of dues as certified by the secretary of the signatory organization and shall transmit the same to the
13 treasurer of the signatory organization.

14 The signatory organization will indemnify, defend, and hold the County harmless against any
15 claims made and against any suit instituted against the County on account of any check-off of dues
16 for the signatory organization. The signatory organization agrees to refund to the County any
17 amounts paid to it in error on account of check-off provision upon presentation of proper evidence
18 thereof.

19 **Section 2.4. Union Membership - Informational Form:** The County will require all new
20 employees, hired in a position included in the bargaining unit to sign a form (in triplicate), which will
21 inform them of the union's exclusive recognition.

22 **Section 2.5. Bargaining Unit Roster:** The County will transmit to the Union a current listing
23 of all employees in the bargaining unit within thirty (30) days of request for same but not to exceed
24 twice per calendar year. Such list shall include the name of the employee, classification, department
25 and salary.

26 **ARTICLE 3: RIGHTS OF MANAGEMENT**

27 **Section 3.1.** It is recognized that the Employer retains the right to manage the affairs of the
28 County and to direct the work force. Such functions of the Employer include, but are not limited to:

1 A. determining the mission, budget, organization, number of employees, and internal security
2 practices of the Departments;

3 B. recruiting, examining, evaluating, promoting, training, transferring employees of its
4 choosing, and determining the time and methods of such action;

5 C. disciplining employees, including the suspension, demotion, or dismissal of employees for
6 just cause. When a transfer is used as a disciplinary sanction, it shall be subject to the grievance
7 procedure and just cause provisions of Article 12;

8 D. assigning and directing the work force;

9 E. developing and modifying class specifications;

10 F. determining the method, materials, and tools to accomplish the work;

11 G. designating duty stations and assigning employees to those duty stations;

12 H. reducing the work force;

13 I. establishing reasonable work rules;

14 J. assigning the hours of work;

15 K. taking whatever actions may be necessary to carry out the Department's mission in case of
16 emergency.

17 L. Bi-weekly pay: the right to define and implement changes to the bi-weekly payroll system
18 is vested exclusively in King County. Implementation of such system may include, but is not limited
19 to, the conversion of wages and leave benefits into hourly amounts and changes to scheduled pay
20 dates. The parties agree that application provisions in the CBA may be re-opened at any time during
21 the life of this Agreement by the County for the purpose of negotiating these standardized pay
22 practices, to the extent required by law. The parties recognize King County's exclusive right to make
23 necessary changes to the payroll system, consistent with Addendum G.

24 M. The departments may change or modify or implement requirements with respect to
25 uniforms worn by their employees.

26 N. Requiring employees to serve a period of probation that does not exceed one year, except
27 that to the extent permitted by law, the probationary period shall be automatically extended for any
28 absence from work, or any period during which the employee cannot perform all the essential

1 functions of the job, that extends longer than ten (10) work days.

2 **O.** Assigning bargaining unit work to any member of the bargaining unit, consistent with
3 other provisions in this collective bargaining agreement.

4 In prescribing policies and procedures relating to personnel and practices, and to the
5 conditions of employment, the Employer will comply with state law to negotiate or meet and confer,
6 as appropriate. However, the parties agree that the Employer retains the right to implement any
7 changes to policies or practices that are not mandatory subjects of bargaining. All of the functions,
8 rights, powers, and authority of the Employer not specifically abridged, deleted, or modified by this
9 Agreement are recognized by the Union as being retained by the Employer.

10 **P.** Civil Service and Career Service: King County retains the right to bargain changes or
11 effects - to the extent required by law - to King County Civil Service Rules and Career
12 Service/Personnel Guidelines, and may propose such changes at any time. Such proposals may be
13 discussed in labor/management meetings or any forum acceptable to the parties.

14 **Q.** Early Intervention Systems (EIS): Consistent with the authority retained in Article 3
15 Section B supra, King County has the right to develop and implement an EIS system consistent with
16 King County Sheriff's Office policies and procedures.

17 **R.** Performance Review: Consistent with the authority retained in Article 3, Section B supra,
18 King County has the right to develop and implement a performance evaluation system consistent with
19 King County Sheriff's Office policies and procedures.

20 **S.** Civilian Review: King County has the right to create, develop and implement a system of
21 civilian review and an Office of Law Enforcement Oversight (KC OLEO) consistent with King
22 County Ordinances.

1 **ARTICLE 4: HOLIDAYS**

2 Employees covered by this Labor Agreement shall be eligible for holidays with pay as
3 provided in Article 10 of the MLA, except as modified below.

4 **Section 4.1. Date of Observance:** Employees who work in a twenty-four hour, seven day per
5 week operation shall observe the following four (4) holidays on the specific dates listed below.
6 Examples of the twenty-four hour operations are: Automated Fingerprint Identification System
7 (AFIS) division of the Sheriff's Office. For these specific named holidays, overtime will be paid only
8 on the dates listed below:

Holiday	Date of Observance and Overtime Payment
New Year's Day	First of January
Independence Day	Fourth of July
Veteran's Day	Eleventh of November
Christmas Day	Twenty-fifth of December

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14 **Section 4.2. If Holiday falls on furlough:** If a holiday (as defined in Article 10 of the MLA)
15 falls on an eligible employee's furlough day, the employee is entitled to either schedule eight (8)
16 hours off some other time (to be scheduled like vacation) or to receive an extra eight (8) hour's pay at
17 the employer's option.

18 **Section 4.3. Holiday Overtime Payment:** All employees shall take holidays on the day of
19 observance unless their work schedule requires otherwise for continuity of services, in which event,
20 they shall be paid at one and one half (1-1/2) times the regular rate for any shift that begins on a
21 holiday, in addition to the regular holiday pay.

22 **Section 4.4. Personal Holiday:** Is pursuant to Article 10 of the MLA.

23 **Section 4.5. Holiday Pay Eligibility:** Is pursuant to Article 10 of the MLA.

24 **Section 4.6. Pro-Rata Benefits:** Regular part-time employees will receive holiday benefits
25 based upon the ratio of hours actually worked (less overtime) to a standard work year.
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1 **ARTICLE 5: VACATIONS**

2 **Section 5.1. Accrual - 40 Hour Employees:** MLA Provisions in Article 35 regarding
3 Vacation Leave shall not apply to this bargaining unit, except as noted in 5.8 below. Regular full-
4 time employees working 40 hours per week, shall receive vacation benefits as indicated in the
5 following table:

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26 **Section 5.1.a. Accrual - 35 Hour Employees:** Regular employees working less than 40 hours
27 per week shall receive prorated vacation benefits.

28 **Section 5.2. Monthly Accrual - Vacation Holidays and Sick Leave:** Employees with one or

1 more continuous years of service shall accrue vacation benefits monthly pursuant to King County
2 policy and ordinances. Employees shall be charged vacation based on their daily work schedule
3 (10 hour, 8 hour, 7.5 hour, or 7 hour). Employees shall accrue vacation, sick leave and holiday pay
4 on the basis of the hours they actually work; i.e. seven (7) hours, seven and one-half (7.5) hours or
5 eight (8) hours.

6 **Section 5.3. Regular Part Time Employees:** Vacation benefits for regular, part-time
7 employees will be established based upon the ratio of hours actually worked (less overtime) to a
8 standard work year. For example: If a regular, part-time employee normally works four hours per
9 day in a department that normally works eight hours per day, then the part-time employee would be
10 granted four-eighths of the vacation benefit allowed a full-time staff member with an equivalent
11 number years of service.

12 **Section 5.4. No County Employment While on Vacation:** No person shall be permitted to
13 work for compensation for the County in any capacity during the time when vacation benefits are
14 being drawn.

15 **Section 5.5. Leave Increments:** For overtime eligible employees, vacation, sick leave and
16 unpaid leave may be used in one-fourth (1/4) hour increments only at the discretion of the department
17 director or his/her appointed designee.

18 **Section 5.6. Maximum Payment Upon Termination:** Upon termination for any reason, a
19 non-probationary employee will be paid for unused vacation credits up to a maximum allowable
20 accumulated vacation. Probationary employees who have left King County (except for those who
21 were terminated for cause) will be paid for unused vacation credits after 6 months of probation.
22 Vacation payoff shall be calculated by utilizing the employee's base wages as set forth in Addendum
23 A and shall also include longevity incentive pay for those who receive it. The hourly rate shall be
24 determined by dividing the annual rate of pay by the number of work hours in that year.

25 **Section 5.7. Payment Upon Death of Employee:** In cases of separation by death, payment of
26 unused vacation benefits shall be made to the employee's estate, or, in applicable cases, as provided
27 by RCW, Title 11.

28 **Section 5.8. Excess Vacation:** Is pursuant to Article 9 and Section 35.2 Vacation Leave Cap

1 provisions of the MLA, except as modified below. All employees may continue to accrue additional
2 vacation beyond the maximum specified in Article 9 and Section 35.2 of the MLA if, as a result of
3 cyclical workloads or work assignments, accrued vacation will be lost. Employees who leave King
4 County employment for any reason will be paid for their unused vacation up to the maximum
5 specified in Article 9 and Section 35.2 of the MLA consistent with Section 5.6 above. Employees
6 shall use or forfeit excess vacation accrual prior to the pay period that includes December 31st of
7 each year. Employees may carryover excess vacation accrual only when express approval is granted
8 by the Sheriff or his/her designee.

9 **Section 5.9. Vacation Preference:** In accordance with past practice, vacation shall be
10 granted on a seniority basis within each shift, squad, or unit and shall be taken at the request of the
11 employee with the approval of the Division Commander for the King County Sheriff's Office.
12 Employees who are transferred involuntarily, and who have already had their vacation request
13 approved as specified above, will be allowed to retain that vacation period regardless of their
14 seniority within the new shift, squad, or unit to which they are transferred.

15 **Section 5.10. Inclement Weather:** In situations involving "unusual occurrences" and/or
16 inclement weather the standard KCSO policy will be adhered to except that employees who cannot
17 come to work due to the "unusual occurrence" and/or weather conditions will be allowed to use
18 compensatory time, vacation time, or leave without pay to cover such absences.

19 **ARTICLE 6: SICK LEAVE**

20 **Section 6.1. Accrual:** MLA Provisions in Article 34 regarding Sick Leave shall not apply to
21 this bargaining unit. Regular full-time employees, and regular part-time employees who receive
22 vacation and sick leave shall accrue sick leave benefits at the rate of 0.04616 hours for each hour in
23 pay status exclusive of overtime up to a maximum of eight (8) hours per month. The employee is not
24 entitled to sick leave if not previously earned.

25 **Section 6.2. Sick Leave Extension:** After the first six months of full-time service, a regular
26 employee may, at the division manager's discretion, be permitted to use up to five days of vacation as
27 an essential extension of used sick leave. An employee may use vacation leave for sick leave for a
28 Washington Family Care qualifying event. If an employee does not work a full twelve months, any

1 vacation credit used for sick leave must be reimbursed to the County upon termination.

2 **Section 6.3. Increments:** For overtime eligible employees, sick leave may be used in one-
3 quarter (1/4) hour increments at the discretion of the division manager or department director.

4 **Section 6.4. No Sick Leave Limit:** There shall be no limit to the hours of sick leave benefits
5 accrued by an employee.

6 **Section 6.5. Verification of Illness:** Department management is responsible for the proper
7 administration of the sick leave benefit. Verification of illness from a licensed healthcare provider
8 may be required for any requested sick leave absence.

9 **Section 6.6. Separation from Employment:** Separation from County employment except by
10 reason of retirement or layoff due to lack of work or funds or efficiency reasons, shall cancel all sick
11 leave currently accrued to the employee. Should the employee resign in good standing or be laid off
12 and return to the County within two years, accrued sick leave shall be restored.

13 **Section 6.7. Pregnancy Disability:** Accrued sick leave may be used for absence due to
14 temporary disability caused by pregnancy.

15 **Section 6.8. Other Than County Employment:** Sick leave because of an employee's
16 physical incapacity shall not be approved where the injury is directly traceable to employment other
17 than with the County.

18 **Section 6.9. Sick Leave Cashout:** Employees eligible to accrue sick leave and who have
19 successfully completed at least five (5) years of County service and who retire as a result of length of
20 service or who leave the County's employment in good standing after twenty-five (25) years or more
21 or who terminate by reason of death shall be paid, or their estates paid or as provided for by RCW
22 Title 11, as applicable, an amount equal to thirty-five (35) percent of their unused, accumulated sick
23 leave multiplied by the employee's rate of pay in effect upon the date of leaving county employment
24 less mandatory withholdings.

25 **Section 6.10. Maximum Compensation:** Employees injured on the job may not
26 simultaneously collect sick leave and workers' compensation payments in a total amount greater than
27 the net regular pay of the employee. Provided that employees who qualify for workers'
28 compensation may receive payments equal to net regular pay.

1 **Section 6.11. Uses of Sick Leave:** Employees are eligible for payment on account of illness
2 for the following reasons:

- 3 A. Employee illness;
- 4 B. Employee disability due to pregnancy or childbirth;
- 5 C. Employee exposure to contagious diseases and resulting quarantine;
- 6 D. Employee keeping medical, dental, or optical appointments;
- 7 E. Employee caring for a child under the age of eighteen (18) with a health condition
8 that requires treatment or supervision (pursuant to RCW 49.12.270);
- 9 F. As required under state or federal law;
- 10 G. To volunteer in a child's school for up to a maximum of 3 days on the conditions
11 set forth in the King County Personnel Guidelines;
- 12 H. Organ Donation (pursuant to King County Code 3.12.215).

13 **Section 6.12. Bereavement Leave:** Is pursuant to Article 8 of the MLA.

14 **Section 6.13. Sick Leave Incentive:** In January of each calendar year, employee sick leave
15 usage will be reviewed. Regular, full-time employees who have used sixteen (16) or less hours of
16 sick leave during the entire preceding calendar year shall be rewarded by having sixteen (16)
17 additional hours credited to their vacation account. Employees who have used more than sixteen (16)
18 but less than thirty-three (33) sick leave hours shall have eight (8) additional hours credited to their
19 vacation account. The additional vacation credits specified herein shall not affect sick leave amounts.

20 **Section 6.14. Prescribed Period of Absence:** Holidays or regular days off falling within the
21 prescribed period of absence will not be charged against accrued sick leave.

22 **Section 6.15. King County Family Medical Leave:** Is pursuant to Article 11 of the MLA.

23 **ARTICLE 7: WAGE RATES**

24 **Section 7.1. Rates of Pay:** Wage rates for regular part-time employees shall be prorated
25 based upon the ratio of hours actually worked to the standard 40-hour workweek.

26 **Section 7.2.** All wage rates in effect for the classifications listed in Addendum A will receive
27 increases in accordance with the King County and Union Coalition "2017-2018 Total Compensation"
28 Memorandum of Agreement, Document Code: 000U0516 and Article 29 of the MLA.

1 **Section 7.3. Work Out of Class:** MLA Provisions in Article 37 regarding Working Out of
2 Class shall not apply to this bargaining unit. King County may assign an employee to work out of
3 class whenever an employee is assigned, in writing (such assignments must be in writing), by the
4 division manager or his/her designee, to perform the duties of a higher classification for a period of
5 one full working day or more, that employee shall be paid at the first step of the higher class or a
6 minimum of five percent (5%), whichever is greater, over the salary received prior to the assignment,
7 for all time spent while so assigned. Additional compensation shall not exceed the maximum of the
8 salary range for the assigned classification. King County may assign employees to perform the work
9 of a lower classification, but while so assigned, the employee will be paid at the rate of his/her
10 normal classification, consistent with Article 3(O.).

11 **Section 7.4. Lead Worker Pay:** Employees assigned, in writing, by the division manager or
12 his/her designee to perform lead worker duties, shall be compensated at a rate which is five percent
13 (5%) greater than their regular rate for all time so assigned.

14 Assignment of “lead worker” will not confer on an employee any privilege, right of appeal, or
15 right of position, transfer, demotion, promotion, reinstatement, or any other right. Assignments may
16 be revoked at any time at the sole discretion of management at such time as the “lead worker”
17 designation is removed, the employee’s compensation reverts to the rate received prior to the
18 designation. Except that when revocation of lead worker pay is used as a disciplinary sanction, it
19 shall be subject to the grievance procedure and requirements of just cause.

20 **Section 7.5. Salary on Promotions:** Any employee who is promoted to a higher
21 classification shall receive the beginning step for the higher classification or the next higher salary
22 step as would constitute a minimum of a five percent (5%) increase over the salary received prior to
23 the promotion.

24 **Section 7.6. Employee Incentive/Career Development:**

25 **Statement of Intent:** The intent of the parties is that this program is to be funded through
26 cost savings. It is also the intent of the parties that the cost of this program (employee incentive
27 program) not exceed 1% of the total base wages of the bargaining unit.

28 The parties agree that in addition to the costs, other factors that will be considered in

1 evaluating the program include the effectiveness of the program in improving productivity and
2 efficiencies (consistent with department adopted missions and goals) the ease of administration,
3 consistency in implementation, difficulties of implementation, effect on employee morale, and
4 administration costs and demands.

5 **A. Translation**

6 Regular full-time employees who are formally certified by the State of Washington to perform
7 interpreting/translation services may request that the Sheriff or Director or his/her designee select the
8 employee for purposes of placing the employee's name on a list to be published and distributed
9 annually within the department. Placement on or removal from such list is at the discretion of the
10 Sheriff, Director or designee.

11 Those employees named on such list are eligible and qualified to perform
12 translation/interpreting services for the department and are eligible to receive a five hundred dollar
13 (\$500) (flat monthly rate of \$41.67 converted to an hourly figure) per year premium for such
14 services. Payment will be made for the calendar year no later than the first pay period in April of the
15 year. Employees who are placed on the eligibility list after January 1st of any given year shall be
16 paid a prorated share of the five hundred dollars (\$500) yearly premium (flat monthly rate of \$41.67
17 converted to an hourly figure). Employees who are placed on the eligibility list after January 1st of
18 any given year shall be paid such premium the month following placement on such list.

19 The intent of this provision is to compensate employees who may be called upon by their
20 departments on a regular basis to provide interpreting/translation services. It does not apply to any
21 employee whose class specification or job description requires such skills, and it is not intended that
22 people who are expected to do casual informal interpreting be placed on the list of employees eligible
23 for the premium. State Certification is at the employee's expense.

24 The departments agree to use only these employees on the "list" of eligibles to
25 interpret/translate in the formal manner described above, except in cases of emergency or when, due
26 to unforeseen circumstances, no one on the list can speak the language required. The departments
27 retain the right to hire interpreters/translators other than their own employees.

28 Examples of the situations anticipated by this premium include but are not limited to:

- 1 1) A prescheduled witness interview, or;
- 2 2) The translation of a legal document or a written witness statement into either
- 3 English or another language.

4 Examples of situations in which the departments would not be restricted to the "list" include

5 but are not limited to:

- 6 1) The reading of a citation by a Spanish speaking receptionist to a Spanish speaking
- 7 citizen who walks in off the street;
- 8 2) The same receptionist or another employee giving directions over the phone in a
- 9 language other than English.

10 This Section (A. Translation) is not subject to the grievance procedure contained in Article 12

11 of this collective bargaining agreement, except that the failure to pay the required premium after

12 placement on the list of eligibles, is subject to such procedure.

13 **B. Training**

14 1) Management has the right to appoint a Training Coordinator to perform

15 group training and to develop plans and processes to meet training needs. An employee so appointed

16 will receive fifty dollars (\$50) (flat rate converted to hourly figure) premium for each pay period in

17 which this assignment is made and services are used by the employer.

18 Employees who are selected to train must, in the department's view, have the necessary

19 skills/training to do formal group training, to assess training needs, develop training plans and to

20 track whether training needs have been met.

21 Lead workers are not eligible for this premium. This section is not subject to the grievance

22 procedure, Article 12, except failure to pay the premium is subject to such procedure.

23 2) Management has the right to assign, in writing, an employee to train other

24 employees. When an employee is assigned to train one-on-one for one full day or more, such

25 employee will be paid 5% (five percent) above his/her base pay for that day or days, under the

26 following conditions:

27 a) The employee submits a timely request for training pay under this

28 section. Requests should be submitted consistent with department policies and procedures, and if

1 **D. Education**

2 The department will pay to qualified employees a premium of forty-five to sixty-five dollars
3 (\$45 to \$65) per month (see below), provided that the employee has obtained an A.A., B.A. or M.A.
4 degree from any accredited state college. As with Section A (Translation) such premiums will not be
5 paid if the degree constitutes a minimum requirement of the position.

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10 This section is subject to the grievance procedure.

11 **Section 7.7. Longevity Pay:** Employees working in job classifications in the King County
12 Sheriff's Office, who were receiving longevity pay prior to the date of ratification of this contract by
13 the King County Council, shall continue to receive longevity pay, including future longevity step
14 increases, provided that they have not reached the top longevity step of twelve years (\$82.25), so long
15 as they continue to work in a job classification which was eligible for longevity pay. Those
16 employees who were hired prior to December 14, 1992 and who are working in job classifications in
17 the King County Sheriff's Office which would have been eligible for longevity pay shall receive
18 longevity pay at such time as they would have become eligible for such pay, so long as they remain
19 in a job classification which was eligible for longevity under the previous collective bargaining
20 agreement that expired on December 31, 1994.

21 A. Those eligible employees, as outlined above, shall earn longevity as follows:

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During the 7th and 8th year of service	\$20.50 per month
During the 9th and 10th year of service	\$41.25 per month
During the 11th and 12th year of service	\$61.50 per month
After 12 years of service	\$82.25 per month

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26 B. Longevity shall be paid beginning from the first of the month following the month
27 the employee first qualified for the program.

28 **Section 7.8. Shift Differentials:** The value of the shift differential has been rolled over into

1 the base wage of bargaining unit employees who previously received such differential, and is
2 included in the wages outlined in the Addendum A (Wage Rates) to this contract. No employees
3 shall receive shift differential as a separate premium.

4 **Section 7.9. Reinstated Employees:**

5 **A. Reinstatement Within One Year:** Employees who are reinstated pursuant to
6 Civil Service Rules within one calendar year of the date they left County service shall, upon
7 reinstatement, be compensated at Step 1 of their respective pay range. Upon successful completion
8 of six (6) months actual service after reinstatement, they shall be compensated at the equivalent of the
9 same salary step that they were on when they left service plus any step advancement due for the
10 addition of the current service.

11 **B. Reinstatement Within Two Years:** Employees who are reinstated pursuant to
12 Civil Service Rules within two (2) calendar years but after one (1) calendar year shall, upon
13 reinstatement, be compensated at Step 1 of their respective pay range. Upon successful completion
14 of twelve (12) months actual service after reinstatement, (or six (6) months for job classifications for
15 which employees receive a step increase after six (6) months of service) they shall be compensated at
16 the equivalent of the same salary step that they were on when they left service plus any step
17 advancement due for the addition of the current service.

18 **C.** In order to receive credit for prior service under this Section, employees must
19 receive an overall rating of "Meets Standards" or better on all performance evaluations during the six
20 (6) month or one (1) year period respectively.

21 **Section 7.10.** The parties have bargained King County's 2005 proposed changes to the King
22 County Personnel Guidelines through coalition bargaining. The results of said bargaining are hereby
23 incorporated into this Agreement.

24 **ARTICLE 8: OVERTIME**

25 **Section 8.1. Overtime:**

26 Overtime shall be payable after working 40 hours in a week.

27 Overtime shall be paid at one and one-half (1-1/2) times the employee's FLSA regular rate
28 calculated using their actual hours worked. "Actual hours worked" excludes all sick leave.

1 **Section 8.2. Callouts:** Are pursuant to Article 33 of the MLA.

2 **Section 8.3. Training Shift Pay:** In the event that the department requires an employee to
3 attend a mandatory training session, and such training is not directly before or after a shift or during a
4 shift, then a two (2) hour minimum shift will be paid.

5 **Section 8.4. Overtime Authorization:** All overtime shall be authorized by the Department
6 Director or his/her designee in writing. Saturday and Sunday work is not overtime when it is a
7 regularly scheduled work day for the individual crew.

8 **Section 8.5. Minimum Standards Set By Law:** If any provision of this article conflicts with
9 minimum standards established by RCW 49.46 (Washington Minimum Wage Act) or the Federal
10 FLSA, then those minimum standards shall apply.

11 **Section 8.6. Compensatory Time:** In lieu of overtime pay, an employee may request, in
12 writing, prior to working the overtime, compensatory time at the rate of time and one half for each
13 hour of overtime that was worked, provided: all comp time must be authorized by Department
14 management. If denied, the overtime work will be compensated with overtime pay. A denial of a
15 request to be compensated for overtime hours worked with comp time rather than overtime pay is
16 within the discretion of management and is not subject to the grievance procedure of this collective
17 bargaining agreement, but may be discussed in Labor Management Meetings.

18 Under normal conditions, the following conditions will apply to the use of comp time:

19 A. A maximum of forty (40) straight time hours may be accrued.

20 B. Comp time balances may be carried over from calendar year to calendar year, but
21 may not go above the referenced forty (40) hour maximum. All overtime hours worked by an
22 employee whose comp time balance is already at the above-referenced maximum will be
23 compensated with overtime pay.

24 C. When an employee requests to use accrued comp time, comp time will be
25 equivalent to vacation leave. It will be scheduled and used like vacation time, and the same
26 operational and staffing considerations will apply. When such a request is submitted, it will be
27 granted within a reasonable period of time after such request, unless to do so will “unduly disrupt”
28 the operations of the department.

1 D. The parties agree that a “reasonable period” of time, as referred to above, and as
2 defined by the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), is no longer than six (6) months after the employee
3 has made the request to use accrued comp time.

4 E. Employees will note their comp time balances (as reflected either on their pay
5 stubs or in payroll) and submit requests for the use of comp time only when they have adequate leave
6 in their comp time bank to cover the request.

7 The parties share an interest in keeping both the cost and administrative burden of
8 compensatory time to a minimum. Both factors will be evaluated at the end of the contract period.

9 **Section 8.7. Voluntary Training:** Employees who request training on a voluntary basis will
10 not be paid for study time associated with said training, nor will overtime compensation be paid for
11 workdays that extend beyond the normal contractual workday if said workday is part of the normal
12 training schedule, provided, however, employees who are required to attend by the Department will
13 be paid their regular wage for attending training plus any overtime, if applicable, pursuant to the
14 overtime provisions of this agreement. If an employee seeks professional development opportunities
15 under MLA Article 12, they must obtain advance approval for scheduling and time away from work.

16 **Section 8.8. Executive Leave:** Employees who are both FLSA and contract overtime exempt
17 employees shall receive a minimum of five (5) days of Executive Leave, each calendar year,
18 consistent with King County policies, rules and procedures for the assignment and use of such leave.
19 This leave must be taken the year it was awarded, and may not be carried over from year to year.

20 **Section 8.9.** Overtime-eligible employees who receive work related calls at home on their off
21 hours shall be paid overtime for hours worked as long as the work is a minimum of eight (8)
22 consecutive minutes. Such overtime will be paid in fifteen (15) minute increments.

23 **Section 8.10. KCSO Remote call out:** Is pursuant to Article 33 of the MLA.

24 **ARTICLE 9: HOURS OF WORK**

25 **Section 9.1.** The working hours of the full-time classifications affected by this Agreement
26 shall be the equivalent of thirty five (35) to forty (40) hours per week on an annualized basis.

27 **Section 9.2. Work Schedules:** The establishment of reasonable work schedules and starting
28 times is vested solely within the purview of department management and may be changed from time

1 to time provided a two (2) week prior notice of change is given, except in those circumstances over
2 which the Department cannot exercise control. PROVIDED: the required two (2) calendar week (or
3 ten (10) working days) notification period shall not commence until the employee has received verbal
4 or written notification of the proposed change.

5 In the exercise of this prerogative, department management will establish schedules to meet
6 the dictates of the work load, however, nothing contained herein will permit split shifts.

7 Employees with paid meal periods are subject to being called back to work at any time during
8 a paid break or meal period. To this end, employees with paid meal periods are not allowed to leave
9 the employer's facility to which the employee is assigned, during their paid breaks or meal periods.
10 The employer will schedule break periods to assure adequate coverage.

11 Community Service Officers will be scheduled to work eight (8) hour days that include a paid
12 meal period.

13 **Section 9.3. Minimum Standards:** If any provision in this article shall conflict with the
14 minimum standards of RCW 49.46, then that provision shall be automatically amended to conform.

15 **Section 9.4. Employee Requests:** Work schedules may be altered, upon written request of
16 the employee, to a flex schedule, a 4/10 schedule, or an alternative schedule mutually agreed upon by
17 the employee and management, for so long as the parties agree in writing.

18 **Section 9.5. Job Sharing:** If two employees in the same job classification and work site
19 wish to job share one full-time position, they shall submit such a request in writing to their immediate
20 supervisor. The immediate supervisor shall submit such request to the Precinct Commander,
21 Division Chief, or Division Manager. The request shall be transmitted to the Department Director or
22 Sheriff/Director. The Department Director or Sheriff shall have ninety (90) days from the date he/she
23 receives the request to review the request and either approve or deny the request for job sharing.
24 Employees who job share one full-time position shall receive pro-rata benefits except medical
25 benefits shall be granted on the same basis as other half-time County employees. In the event that
26 one of the job-sharing employees terminates his/her employment (voluntarily or involuntarily), the
27 County shall have the following options:

28 A. No change to the situation, allowing a half-time position to continue.

1 B. Fill the vacant half-time position with temporary help.

2 C. Expand the half-time position to a full-time position, as long as the employee is
3 given sixty (60) calendar days notice of the employer's intent to so expand.

4 **ARTICLE 10: MEDICAL, DENTAL & LIFE INSURANCE**

5 Group medical, dental and life insurance programs will be maintained in accordance with
6 Article 25 of the King County Coalition of Unions Master Labor Agreement.

7 **ARTICLE 11: MISCELLANEOUS**

8 **Section 11.1. Leave of Absence for Union Employment:** MLA Provisions in Article 22
9 regarding Union Leave shall not apply to this bargaining unit. An employee elected or appointed to
10 office in a local of the signatory organization which requires a part or all of his/her time shall be
11 given leave of absence up to one (1) year without pay upon application.

12 **Section 11.2. Mileage Reimbursement:** Is pursuant to Article 24 of the MLA.

13 **Section 11.3. Access to Premises:** The Employer administration shall afford Union
14 representatives a reasonable amount of time while on on-duty status to consult with appropriate
15 management officials and/or aggrieved employees, provided that the Union representative and/or
16 aggrieved employees contact their immediate supervisors, indicate the general nature of the business
17 to be conducted, request necessary time without undue interference with assignment duties. Time
18 spent on such activities shall be recorded by the Union representative on a time sheet provided by the
19 supervisor. Union representatives shall guard against use of excessive time in handling such
20 responsibilities.

21 **Section 11.4. Loss of Personal Effects:** Employees who suffer a loss or damage, in the line
22 of duty, to personal property and/or clothing worn on the body, will have same repaired or replaced at
23 department expense, not to exceed \$150.00.

24 **Section 11.5. Mandatory Higher Education:** Employees who are required to obtain
25 additional formal education beyond that initially required for employment shall be allowed time off
26 from work with pay to attend classes/seminars with scheduling approval of same at the sole discretion
27 of management.

28 **Section 11.6. Jury Duty:** Working conditions in MLA Article 5 regarding Jury Duty shall

1 not apply to this bargaining unit. An employee required by law to serve on jury duty shall continue
2 to receive his/her salary and shall be relieved of regular duties and assigned to day shift for the period
3 of time necessary for such assignment. If they have four hours or more left on their shift at the
4 completion of the jury duty assignment for the day, they shall report to their work location and
5 complete the day shift. Once the employee is released for the day, or more than one day, then he/she
6 is required to contact the supervisor who will determine if he/she is required to report for duty,
7 provided however such release time is prior to 1:00 p.m. If an employee is released after 1:00 p.m.
8 he/she shall not be required to report for work on that particular day.

9 The fees, exclusive of mileage, paid by the Court for jury duty shall be forwarded to the
10 Comptroller. The employer may request verification of jury duty service.

11 When an employee is notified to serve on jury duty, he/she will inform his/her immediate
12 supervisor as soon as possible, but not later than two (2) weeks in advance, regarding the dates of
13 absence from regular duties. The supervisor will ensure that the employee is relieved of regular
14 duties a minimum of twelve (12) hours prior to the time of reporting for jury duty.

15 When the employee is dismissed from jury duty (completion of jury duty assignment) the
16 employee is required to contact his/her supervisor immediately. The supervisor will instruct the
17 employee when to report to work, PROVIDED: there must be a minimum of twelve (12) hours
18 between the time the employee is dismissed from jury duty and the time he/she must report for
19 regular duties.

20 **Section 11.7. Bus passes:** Are pursuant to Article 38 of the MLA.

21 **Section 11.8. Essential Personnel:** The Sheriff's Office has reviewed its policies with
22 respect to employees considered essential personnel, with the goal of including as few non-
23 commissioned employees as reasonably necessary to meet the needs of King County and the Sheriff's
24 Office.

25 **Section 11.9. Promotional Opportunities:** MLA Provisions in Article 18 regarding Job
26 Postings shall not apply to this bargaining unit. Bargaining unit members may apply for promotional
27 opportunities within the KCSO. If after applicable Civil Service and County testing, there is no
28 bargaining unit member within the top-scoring pool of applicants to be considered under the

1 County's application of the relevant Civil Service rules, then the highest scoring bargaining unit
2 member on the civil service list shall be added to the pool of applicants eligible for consideration.
3 Should there be a tie for highest score in that situation, the most senior member shall be placed in the
4 pool.

5 **Section 11.10. Lateral Transfers:** As outlined in the General Orders Manual (GOM), prior
6 to the initiation of any selection process to fill a vacant bargaining unit position, regular employees of
7 the bargaining unit, whose classification is the same as that of the vacant position, shall be given the
8 opportunity to submit an application for transfer to be considered for the vacant position.

9 **Section 11.11. Annual Performance Evaluations and Appeal:** If an employee challenges
10 the fairness or accuracy of their annual performance evaluation, the evaluation may be appealed by
11 the employee in writing within ten (10) business days of the employee's receipt of such evaluation. It
12 will then be discussed/reviewed between the supervisor and reviewer. If a suitable solution cannot be
13 reached, the employee may appeal to the Section Commander/Manager of the unit. The employee
14 may appeal the Commander/Manager's decision to the third step of the appeal process. At each step
15 of the process, the employee shall have ten (10) business days in which to appeal to the next step in
16 writing (from the date of receipt of the decision, or expiration of the timeframe). The Supervisor and
17 Commander/Manager review should result in a written determination within ten (10) days of
18 receiving the issue, or the employee may appeal to the next step.

19 The third and final step in the appeal process is a hearing before a panel of three that includes:
20 A department representative, labor representative, and a representative from the King County Office
21 of Alternative Dispute Resolution.

22 See Addendum J.

23 **ARTICLE 12: GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE**

24 MLA Provisions in Articles 26 and 27 regarding Grievance Procedure and Discipline and
25 Sunset Clause shall not apply to this bargaining unit. King County recognizes the importance and
26 desirability of settling grievances promptly and fairly in the interest of continued good employee
27 relations and morale and to this end the following procedure is outlined. To accomplish this, every
28 effort will be made to settle grievances at the lowest possible level of supervision.

1 Employees will be unimpeded and free from restraint, interference, coercion, discrimination
2 or reprisal in seeking adjudication of their grievances.

3 **Section 12.1. Definition:** Grievance - An issue raised by a party to this Agreement relating
4 to the interpretation of his/her rights, benefits, or conditions of employment as contained in this
5 Agreement, except that verbal or written reprimands are not subject to Step 4 of the grievance
6 procedure outlined in this Agreement.

7 **Procedure**

8 **Step 1 - Immediate Supervisor:** A grievance shall be presented by the aggrieved employee,
9 or his/her representative if the employee wishes, on a Union grievance form within 14 calendar days
10 of the act or omission giving rise to the grievance, to the employee's immediate supervisor.

11 The grievance must:

- 12 A. fully describe the alleged violation and how the employee was adversely affected;
13 B. set forth the section(s) of the Agreement which have been allegedly violated; and
14 C. specify the remedy or solution being sought by the employee filing the grievance.

15 The supervisor or administrator shall gain all relevant facts and shall attempt to adjust the
16 matter and notify the employee within ten (10) calendar days. If a grievance is not pursued to the
17 next level within ten (10) calendar days, it shall be presumed resolved.

18 **Step 2 - Section Commander:** If, after thorough discussion with the immediate supervisor or
19 administrator, the grievance has not been satisfactorily resolved, the Union shall present the
20 grievance to the Section Commander for investigation, discussion and written reply. The Section
21 Commander shall make his/her written decision available to the aggrieved employee within fourteen
22 (14) calendar days. If the grievance is not pursued to the next higher level within ten (10) calendar
23 days, it shall be presumed resolved.

24 **Step 3 - Section Chief/Office of Labor Relations (OLR):** If, after thorough evaluation, the
25 decision of the Section Commander has not resolved the grievance to the satisfaction of the
26 employee, the Union may present the grievance to the Section Chief. The Chief, in consultation, with
27 OLR will determine whether the grievance relates to a working condition (KCSO) or wage or benefit
28 (OLR), and the appropriate agency shall review and respond to the grievance. All letters, memoranda

1 and other written materials previously submitted to lower levels of supervision shall be made
2 available for the review and consideration at this level. The Chief/OLR may interview the employee
3 and/or his/her representative and receive any additional related evidence which he/she may deem
4 pertinent to the grievance. The Chief/OLR shall make his/her written decision available within
5 fourteen (14) calendar days. If the grievance is not pursued to the next higher level within ten (10)
6 calendar days, it shall be presumed resolved.

7 By mutual agreement, the parties may call in a mediator to attempt to resolve the
8 dispute. The parties shall jointly select the mediator who will hear both sides of the dispute and
9 attempt to bring the parties to an agreement. The mediator may not bind the parties to any
10 agreement, as mediation is a voluntary process. Parties are encouraged to participate in good faith
11 mediation and nothing the mediator says shall be admissible in an arbitration.

12 All employer grievances shall be initiated at Step 3 of this procedure.

13 **Step 4 - Arbitration:** Either the County or the Union may request arbitration within thirty
14 (30) days of the issuance of the Step 3 decision, and the party requesting arbitration must at that time
15 specify the exact question which it wishes arbitrated. The parties shall then select a third
16 disinterested party to serve as an arbitrator. In the event that the parties are unable to agree upon an
17 arbitrator, then the arbitrator shall be selected from a panel of seven arbitrators furnished by the
18 American Arbitration Association or the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, PERC, or by
19 another agency if the parties mutually agree. The arbitrator will be selected from the list by both the
20 County representative and the Union, each alternately striking a name from the list until one name
21 remains. The arbitrator, under voluntary labor arbitration rules of the Association, shall be asked to
22 render a decision promptly and the decision of the arbitrator shall be final and binding on both
23 parties.

24 The arbitrator shall have no power to change, alter, detract from or add to the provisions of
25 this Agreement, but shall have the power only to apply and interpret the provisions of this Agreement
26 in reaching a decision.

27 The arbitrator's fee and expenses and any court reporter's fee and expenses shall be borne
28 equally by both parties. Each party shall bear the cost of any witnesses appearing on that party's

1 behalf. Regardless of the outcome, each party is responsible for their own attorney and
2 representation fees.

3 No matter may be arbitrated which the County by law has no authority over, has no authority
4 to change, or has been delegated to any civil service commission or personnel board.

5 There shall be no strikes, cessation of work or lockout during such conferences or arbitration.

6 Time restrictions may be waived in writing by consent of both parties.

7 **Section 12.2. Multiple Procedures:** If employees have access to multiple procedures for
8 adjudicating grievances, then selection by the employee of one procedure will preclude access to
9 other procedures; selection is to be made no later than at the conclusion of Step 2 of this grievance
10 procedure.

11 **Section 12.3. Just Cause/Progressive Discipline:** No employee may be discharged,
12 suspended without pay, or disciplined in any way except for just cause. In addition, the County will
13 employ the concept of progressive discipline in appropriate cases. The County's policy is that
14 discipline is corrective, rather than punitive in nature. It is understood that there may be egregious
15 cases that may result in discharge, disciplinary transfer, or other disciplinary action that do not
16 require corrective action.

17 Written reprimands may not be used for purposes of progressive discipline once three (3)
18 years have passed from the date the reprimand was issued, and the employer has documented no
19 similar problems with the employee during this three (3) year time period. In those instances where
20 disciplinary action is based on reasonable evidence of the commission of a crime, or the proposed
21 discipline involves suspension or termination of the employee, the grievance procedure will begin at
22 Step 3.

23 **Section 12.4. Appearing at Civil Service, PERC, and Arbitration Hearings:** Employees
24 who are directly involved with proceedings as described above may be allowed to attend without loss
25 of pay provided prior permission is granted by the Employer or his/her designee.

26 **Section 12.5. Probationary Period:** All newly hired and promoted employees must serve a
27 probationary period as defined in RCW 41.14 and Civil Service Rules. To the extent permitted by
28 law, the probationary period shall be automatically extended for any absence from work, or any

1 period during which the employee cannot perform the essential functions of the job, that extends
2 longer than ten (10) work days. As the above specify that the probationary period is an extension of
3 the hiring process, the provisions of this Article will not apply to employees if they are discharged
4 during their initial probationary period, or are demoted during the promotional probationary period
5 for performance related issues. Grievances brought by probationary employees involving issues
6 other than discharge or demotion may be processed in accordance with this Article.

7 **Section 12.6. Union Concurrence:** Inasmuch as this is an agreement between the County
8 and the Union, no individual may, without Union concurrence, make use of the provisions of this
9 Article.

10 **ARTICLE 13: BULLETIN BOARDS**

11 Use of Bulletin Boards and Electronic Devices will be in accordance with Article 23 the
12 MLA.

13 **ARTICLE 14: NON-DISCRIMINATION**

14 The Employer or the Union shall not unlawfully discriminate against any individual with
15 respect to compensation, terms, conditions, or privileges of employment because of race, color,
16 religion or religious affiliation, national origin, ancestry, sexual orientation, gender identity or
17 expression, age, sex, honorably discharged veteran or military status, or any disability.

18 The parties agree that personnel actions may be taken to accommodate disabilities, as may be
19 required under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), and that such an accommodation under
20 the ADA shall take precedence over any conflicting provisions of this agreement.

21 Grievances under this Article may proceed through Step 4 only and may not go to arbitration.
22 The employee's right to file a complaint with an administrative agency under the appropriate County,
23 State, or Federal law is not limited by this Article but such rights are subject to the appropriate
24 statutes of limitations contained in such laws.

25 **ARTICLE 15: SAVINGS CLAUSE**

26 Article 30 Savings Clause in the MLA applies also to this Appendix and its Addenda.

27 **ARTICLE 16: WORK STOPPAGES AND EMPLOYER PROTECTION**

28 **Section 16.1. No Work Stoppages:** The employer and the signatory organization agree that

1 the public interest requires efficient and uninterrupted performance of all County services, and to this
2 end pledge their best efforts to avoid or eliminate any conduct contrary to this objective.
3 Specifically, the signatory organization shall not cause or condone any work stoppage, including any
4 strike, slowdown, or refusal to perform any customarily assigned duties, sick leave absence which is
5 not bona fide, or other interference with County functions by employees under this agreement and
6 should same occur, the signatory organization agrees to take appropriate steps to end such
7 interference. Any concerted action by any employees in any bargaining unit shall be deemed a work
8 stoppage if any of the above activities have occurred.

9 **Section 16.2. Union Responsibilities:** Upon notification in writing by the County to the
10 signatory organization that any of its members are engaged in a work stoppage, the signatory
11 organization shall immediately, in writing, order such members to immediately cease engaging in
12 such work stoppage and provide the County with a copy of such order. In addition, if requested by
13 the County, a responsible official of the signatory organization shall publicly order such signatory
14 organization employees to cease engaging in such a work stoppage.

15 **Section 16.3. Disciplinary Action:** Any employee who commits any act prohibited in this
16 article will be subject to the following action or penalties:

- 17 1. Discharge.
- 18 2. Suspension or other disciplinary action as may be applicable to such employee.

19 **ARTICLE 17: WAIVER CLAUSE**

20 The parties acknowledge that each has had the unlimited right within the law and the
21 opportunity to make demands and proposals with respect to any matter deemed a proper subject for
22 collective bargaining. The results of the exercise of that right and opportunity are set forth in this
23 agreement. Therefore, the County and the signatory organization, for the duration of this agreement,
24 each agree to waive the right to oblige the other party to bargain with respect to any subject or matter
25 not specifically referred to or covered by this Agreement.

26 The parties agree that in the event they enter into memoranda of understanding during the life
27 of this agreement, such agreements are binding when signed by authorized representatives of the
28 parties, and subject to each party's ratification process, if required.

1 **ARTICLE 18: REDUCTION-IN-FORCE**

2 **Section 18.1. Layoff Procedure:** Employees laid off as a result of a reduction in force shall
3 be laid off according to inverse seniority within the classification, with the employee with the least
4 time being the first to be laid off. In the event there are two (2) or more employees eligible for layoff
5 within the Department with the same classification seniority, the Department head will determine the
6 order of layoff based on employee performance, PROVIDED: no regular or probationary employee
7 shall be laid off while there are temporary employees serving in the class or position for which the
8 regular or probationary employee is eligible and available. Each employee will have an adjusted
9 service date based on their length of service within their classification and Department.

10 **Section 18.2. Reversion to Previously Held Positions:** In lieu of layoff, a regular or
11 probationary employee may on the basis of classification seniority, bump the least senior employee in
12 any lower level position (within the department and bargaining unit) formerly held by the employee
13 designated for layoff, provided that the employee exercising his/her right to bump has more seniority
14 in the classification than the employee who is being bumped.

15 **Section 18.3. Re-Employment List:** The names of laid off employees will be placed in order
16 of layoff (with the employees with the most seniority as defined above placed at the top of the list) on
17 a Re-employment List for the classification previously occupied. The Re-employment List will
18 remain in effect for a maximum of two (2) years or until all laid off employees are rehired, whichever
19 occurs first.

20 **ARTICLE 19: CIVILIAN REVIEW**

21 The King County Office of Law Enforcement Oversight (OLEO) will provide a professional
22 presence to help ensure a quality investigation in real time, and visible, independent oversight to
23 reassure the public

24 **Section 19.1.** The OLEO will actively monitor all KCSO internal investigations. In addition,
25 OLEO may monitor any incidents involving an officer's use of force, and Critical Incidents. Critical
26 Incidents include the use of deadly force, officer-involved shootings, uses of force (including
27 intentional use of a vehicle) or vehicular pursuits resulting in death or injury requiring hospitalization,
28 and in-custody deaths.

1 **Section 19.2.** The OLEO may receive complaints from any complaining party, including,
2 without limitation, citizens or employees of KCSO. The OLEO will forward all complaints to the
3 Internal Investigations Unit (IIU) for processing and, when appropriate, investigation. The OLEO
4 will not conduct independent disciplinary investigations, but may participate in interviews as
5 provided herein.

6 **Section 19.3.** OLEO staff shall be timely notified of and have the opportunity to attend
7 scenes of Critical Incidents requiring call out of the Criminal Investigations Division (CID) and the
8 administrative investigation team. OLEO staff shall be stationed at the Command Post and interact
9 with the administrative team as liaison with the CID. After the initial investigation is complete and
10 scene secured, a representative from the CID will escort the OLEO representative through the scene.

11 **Section 19.4.** OLEO staff shall have the opportunity to attend shooting review or use of force
12 review boards as a non-voting member. If a driving review board involves a Critical Incident, OLEO
13 staff may attend such review boards as a non-voting member.

14 **Section 19.5.** The OLEO will have the opportunity to make a recommendation for mediation
15 to the Sheriff, prior to investigation, except in cases of complaints of serious matters (complaints that
16 could lead to suspension, demotion or discharge). In the event KCSO, the complainant and the
17 officer all agree to mediation, that process will be utilized rather than sending the matter on for
18 investigation. Assuming the officer participates in good faith during the mediation process, the
19 officer will not be subject to discipline and the complaint will be administratively dismissed. Good
20 faith means that the officer listens and considers the issues raised by the complainant, and acts and
21 responds appropriately. Agreement with either the complainant or the mediator is not a requirement
22 of good faith. In the event an agreement to mediate is reached and the complainant thereafter refuses
23 to participate, the officer will be considered to have participated in good faith. Moreover, any records
24 related to mediation (other than a mediation settlement agreement) shall not be admissible in any
25 proceeding except to enforce this section. The parties agree that “serious” matters are not eligible for
26 this mediation option.

27 **Section 19.6.** IIU will notify the OLEO of all administrative interviews on all complaints of a
28 serious matter (complaints that could lead to suspension, demotion or discharge) and all complaints

1 originating at the OLEO. A single OLEO representative from the OLEO may attend and observe
2 interviews, and will be given the opportunity to ask questions that are within the scope of permissible
3 investigative questioning after the completion of questioning by KCSO. The OLEO will not
4 participate in criminal investigations of KCSO employees in any way.

5 **Section 19.7.** Upon completion of internal investigations, IIU will forward a complete copy
6 of the case file to the OLEO for review. The OLEO will determine, in writing, whether the
7 investigation was thorough and objective in the opinion of the Director of the OLEO.

8 **Section 19.8.** As a part of the review process, the Director of the OLEO may believe that
9 additional investigation is needed on issues he/she deems material to the outcome. If there is any
10 dispute between the assigned investigator(s) and the OLEO regarding the necessity, practicality or
11 materiality of the requested additional investigation, the IIU Commander will determine whether
12 additional investigation will be undertaken. If the OLEO is not satisfied with the determination of the
13 IIU Commander, the matter will be submitted to the King County Sheriff, for review. If the Director
14 of the OLEO is not satisfied with the determination of the Sheriff, the matter will be resolved by the
15 King County Executive, whose decision will be final. Once the matter has been referred to and
16 resolved by the Executive, the investigation will be completed consistent with the determination by
17 the Executive. After completion of the additional investigation, or the conclusion that no further
18 investigation will be undertaken, the OLEO will then certify whether or not, in the opinion of the
19 Director of the OLEO, the internal investigation was thorough and objective. This determination will
20 be made within five (5) business days. Once the above finding is entered in the investigation, the
21 OLEO will not be involved further in the processing of that case except as provided herein.

22 **Section 19.9.** All final disciplinary decisions will be made by the Sheriff.

23 **Section 19.10.** Reopener: The parties agree to reopen this Article to bargain the decisions
24 and/or effects following ratification of the King County Police Office Guild (KCPOG) collective
25 bargaining agreement on OLEO with a term date starting in 2017.



ADDENDUM B
STEP PROGRESSION

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4 1. All step increases are based upon a satisfactory or higher performance rating. Merit pay
5 above top step is in accordance with the County's Performance Appraisal and Merit Pay System
6 Manual (Merit Plan), as amended.

7 2. Employees covered by this CBA who start at Step 1, shall automatically (consistent with
8 other provisions of this CBA and the wage chart attached) advance from Step 1 to Step 2 upon
9 completion of six (6) months of service regardless of the length of probation. Thereafter, the
10 employee will receive a step increase according to the wage addendum based on a satisfactory or
11 higher performance rating until they have reached the top step of their range, and are eligible for
12 merit pay in accordance with the Merit Plan. The KCSO has the right to place employees on
13 probation for a period of up to one (1) year.

14 3. Satisfactory performance shall mean overall rating of "Meets Standards" or "Exceeds
15 Standards" on the employee performance evaluation utilized by the KCSO.

16 4. If the performance of the employee is rated "Unsatisfactory" or "Improvement Needed" on
17 any factor or overall rating, specific facts on which the rating is based must be provided; such facts
18 shall include time, place and frequency of unacceptable performance.

19 5. The employee, if denied a step increase, shall be placed on either monthly or quarterly
20 evaluations and at such time that the employee's performance becomes "Satisfactory" or higher, the
21 employee shall receive the previously denied step increase the first of the month following attaining a
22 "Satisfactory" or higher evaluation. The date on which an employee would be entitled to a future
23 step increase will not be affected by the above action.

24 6. Term-Limited Temporary Employees shall also automatically advance through the steps of
25 their salary range. Temporaries shall not receive step increases. Term-limited temporary and
26 temporary employees are employed at will and are not subject to the just cause requirement under the
27 CBA.

28 7. New Career Service or Civil Service employees, who have relevant experience as either a

1 term-limited temporary or temporary employee with the County in the same classification to which
2 they are hired, should be given appropriate credit for such prior service with respect to step
3 placement.

4 8. The parties agree that the County has discretion to place employees with or without prior
5 County service in a classification at the step the County believes is appropriate, consistent with other
6 CBA provisions and County rules. This applies whether the employee is a new employee, a lateral
7 hire, a new Civil Service or Career Service employee, a transferred or a promoted employee.

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1 **ADDENDUM C**

2 **DEFINITIONS**

3 For the purpose of this Agreement, the following definitions will apply:

4 **1. Party:**

5 One of three parties to this collective bargaining agreement, King County Sheriff's Office,
6 King County, or Public Safety Employees Union.

7 **2. Regular Full-Time Position:**

8 "Regular Full-Time Position" means a regular position which has an established work
9 schedule of not less than thirty-five (35) hours per week in those work units in which a
10 thirty-five (35) hour week is standard, or of not less than forty (40) hours per week in those work
11 units in which a forty (40) hour week is standard.

12 **3. Regular Part-Time Position:**

13 "Regular Part-Time Position" means a regular position in which the part-time regular
14 employee is employed for at least nine hundred and ten (910) hours but less than a full time basis in a
15 calendar year in a work unit in which a thirty-five (35) hour week is standard or for at least one
16 thousand forty (1,040) hours but less than a full time basis in a calendar year in a work unit in which
17 a forty hour work week is standard. Where the standard work week falls between thirty-five (35) and
18 forty (40), the Director, in consultation with the Department, is responsible for determining what hour
19 threshold will apply.

20 **4. Temporary Position:**

21 "Temporary Position" means a position which is not a regular position as defined in this
22 Addendum and excludes administrative intern. Temporary positions include both term-limited
23 temporary positions as defined in this Addendum and short-term (normally less than six months)
24 temporary positions in which a temporary employee works less than nine hundred ten (910) hours in
25 a calendar year in a work unit in which a thirty-five (35) hour work week is standard or less than one
26 thousand forty (1,040) hours in a calendar year in a work unit in which a forty-hour work week is
27 standard. Where the standard work week falls between thirty-five (35) and forty (40) hours, the
28 Director, in consultation with the department, is responsible for determining what hour threshold will

1 apply.

2 **5. Temporary Employee:**

3 “Temporary employee” means an employee employed in a temporary position and, in
4 addition, includes an employee serving a probationary period or under provisional appointment.
5 Under Section 550 of the charter, temporary employees are not members of the career service or civil
6 service.

7 **6. Term-Limited Temporary Position:**

8 “Term-Limited Temporary Position” means a temporary position with work related to a
9 specific grant, capital improvement project, information systems technology project, or other non-
10 routine, substantial body of work, for a period greater than six months.

11 **7. Term-Limited Temporary Employee:**

12 “Term-Limited Temporary Employee” means a temporary employee who is employed in a
13 term-limited temporary position. Term-limited temporary employees are not members of the career
14 service or civil service.

15 Term-limited temporary employees may not be employed in term-limited temporary positions
16 longer than three (3) years beyond the date of hire, except that for grant-funded projects, capital
17 improvement projects, and information systems technology projects the maximum period may be
18 extended up to five years upon approval of the director. The director shall maintain a current list of
19 all term-limited temporary employees by department.

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ADDENDUM D
OUT-OF-CLASS WORK

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3 1. King County retains the right (as negotiated between the parties) to transfer or assign
4 employees to higher classifications and equal classifications, as long as the conditions of Article 7
5 Section 3 are met.

6 2. Whether an out-of-class assignment is defined as an assignment to a higher, lower or
7 lateral classification depends solely on the pay for those classifications.

8 3. King County also retains the right (as negotiated between the parties) to transfer or assign
9 employees to lower classifications as long as the following conditions are met:

10 a. An employee so assigned shall continue to be paid according to the wage scale
11 assigned to his/her regular classification for the duration of the lower classification assignment.

12 b. The Department is responsible for seeing that all employees are adequately trained
13 and are qualified to perform the work they are required to perform.

14 c. The Department recognizes that there is a limit as to the number of job duties one
15 employee can perform satisfactorily in a given period of time. It is not the intent of the Department
16 to require one employee to complete each and every duty of two full-time jobs at one time. When an
17 employee is asked to temporarily perform the duties of another classification both the department and
18 the employee have the duty to keep the other informed of work assignment priorities and completion
19 dates.

20 d. When out-of-class work is available due to the absence of a regular employee or
21 some other reason, the precinct will notify employees (through a posting at the precinct where the
22 work is located, or posting in the G.I.B., or through any other forum the department selects), and will
23 consider employees who volunteer for this assignment. If the Department determines that there are
24 no qualified volunteers available, the Department will select another qualified employee.

25 e. Employees who are assigned to do lower class work will be assigned on a
26 temporary basis, and shall not be used to permanently supplant employees in the lower
27 classifications. Thus, such assignments will generally be of short duration, limited to no more than
28 three (3) consecutive months per employee per instance, unless both King County and the Union
agree to extend this time period in a particular case.

 f. The parties recognize that some employees wish to work out of class and some
employees do not. The parties, through this agreement, have attempted to meet the concerns of
employees, and the needs of the Department for adequate staffing and flexibility. The parties also
recognize King County Civil Service Rules and expressly acknowledge that this Agreement takes
precedence over any civil service rules.

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ADDENDUM F

TRANSITION TO BIWEEKLY PAY

1. The County provided timely notice to the Union of its intent to implement a biweekly payroll schedule for employees represented by the Union who are currently paid on a semi-monthly schedule.

2. As provided for in the collective bargaining agreement, the County is entitled to implement a biweekly payroll schedule for employees represented by the Union. The affected employees are members of the Public Safety Employees Union.

3. To assist the employees during the transition period, employees may elect to receive a transition paycheck in an amount equivalent to one (1) week of the requesting employee's base wage.

4. The transition paycheck will be a payment of earnings for time worked after the close of the pay period covered by the last semi-monthly paycheck. Employees who elect to receive the transition check must request it on the designated form by no later than the cut-off to be established for such designation.

5. Employees who elect to receive the transition check must designate a repayment schedule; the options are to refund the County in equal deductions from future paychecks over either three (3) months, six (6) months, or twelve (12) months, beginning with the second (2nd) biweekly paycheck.

6. If an employee separates from County service prior to returning the full transition check amount, the remaining amount will be due and payable on the last day of that employee's County employment. The remainder may be deducted from the employee's final paycheck. If the amount of the final paycheck is insufficient to recover the remainder of the funds advanced in the transition check, the amount may be deducted from the payoff of accrued vacation leave. If the final paycheck and vacation payout are insufficient, the employee will be required to agree to a repayment plan acceptable to the County.

7. The County agrees to provide briefings on the progress of the transition to Union representatives at least once a month in the three (3) months preceding the transition and to provide ongoing information to employees as the transition plan approaches implementation.

8. The Union acknowledges that the County has fulfilled its obligation to bargain the effects of implementation of the biweekly pay with the execution of this Agreement.

1 ADDENDUM G

2 PAYMENT PRACTICES AND PAYROLL COMPLAINT PROCESS

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4 1. **Payment practice:** For as long as the King County Sheriff's Office is paid on a semi-
5 monthly basis, the Union knowingly acknowledges that the County may reasonably pay as follows.
6 Overtime pay, and holiday pay for hours worked on the 1st through the 15th will be paid by the 1st pay
7 date of the following month and for hours worked from the 16th through the end of the month by the 2nd
8 pay date of the following month. An employee who on the 1st through the 15th of a month submits a
9 request for compensation in accordance with King County Sheriff's Office policies for "acting" pay will
10 be paid his or her pay by the 1st pay date of the following month. If this request is submitted on the 16th
11 through the end of the month, the pay will be paid on the 2nd pay date of the following month. This
12 section shall not apply when there is a bona fide dispute as to the underlying pay.

13 2. **Authorized Employee:** Within 30 days following the effective date of an ordinance to
14 appropriate funds for settlement of *Covey, et al v. King County*, King County Superior Court Cause No.
15 02-2-08317-0 SEA, the King County Sheriff's Office will designate an employee responsible for the
16 investigation ("Authorized Employee") and resolution of employee complaints regarding the payment of
17 wages. Written complaints will be submitted in accordance with King County Sheriff's Office policies.
18 A response will be provided to the employee within ten (10) business days from the date the complaint is
19 received by the Authorized Employee. If the employee complied with the King County Sheriff's Office
20 policies regarding timely submission of his/her pay request, and timely resubmission as necessary, the
21 Authorized Employee will award one hour of straight time pay for each incident of overtime that is paid
22 one pay period beyond the date noted in Paragraph 1 above, and may issue an appropriate additional
23 remedy for late payment beyond one pay period up to a total maximum amount equal to the underlying
24 pay at issue. If the employee does not agree with the resolution of the complaint, the employee may, if
25 within ten (10) business days of receipt of the response from the Authorized Employee, submit the issue
26 to the Payroll Review Board.

27 3. **The Payroll Review Board:** The Payroll Review Board will consist of one KCSO Chief
28 appointed by the Sheriff and one union representative from the bargaining unit representing the

1 employee who filed the complaint. The Authorized Employee will present to the Payroll Review Board
2 the facts relating to the complaint. If the Board finds that the employee complied with the King County
3 Sheriff's Office policies regarding timely submission of his/her pay request, and timely resubmission as
4 necessary, the Board will award one hour of straight time pay for each incident of overtime that is paid
5 one pay period beyond the date noted in Paragraph 1 above, if not previously awarded by the Authorized
6 Employee, and may issue an appropriate additional remedy for late payment beyond one pay period, if
7 not previously awarded by the Authorized Employee, up to a total maximum amount equal to the
8 underlying pay at issue. The decision of the Payroll Review Board to alter the resolution determined by
9 the Authorized Employee must be unanimous. A decision on each case presented to this Board must be
10 issued within five (5) business days of the presentation by the Authorized Employee. The Authorized
11 Employee will communicate the decision of the Board to the employee who filed the complaint. If the
12 Payroll Review Board cannot reach a unanimous decision, the disputed claim may be presented to a
13 mutually agreeable third person, who need not be an arbitrator, for a decision. If the Payroll Review
14 Board is unable to agree on a third person, the winner of a coin toss will select the third person.

15 4. The remedies afforded in paragraphs 2 and 3 do not apply if there is a bona fide dispute
16 concerning the underlying pay.

17 5. **Collective Bargaining Agreement:** The Payroll Review Process is separate from and not
18 subject to the grievance process outlined in the collective bargaining agreements covering the employees
19 represented by the Union. Matters submitted to the Payroll Review Board may not be submitted to the
20 collective bargaining agreement grievance process. Disputes arising out of the collective bargaining
21 agreement, that meet the contractual definition of a "grievance", remain subject to the contractual
22 grievance process.

23 6. This agreement, along with the collective bargaining agreements as modified by this
24 agreement, and relevant current MOUs modifying the collective bargaining agreement, constitute the
25 full and complete agreement between the parties with respect to payment of wages in the KCSO, and a
26 payroll dispute resolution process in the KCSO.

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ADDENDUM H

SICK LEAVE AND OVERTIME

1. The King County Sheriff's Office has a longstanding past practice of including paid leave as "hours worked" for purposes of calculating hourly overtime compensation rates, but excluding paid sick leave from such calculation. The exclusion of sick leave in calculating this rate is mandated by the last sentence of Article 8 section 1 ("Actual hours worked" excludes all sick leave.)

2. Due to the payroll related difficulties of implementing this particular language with respect to the exclusion of sick leave from the overtime rate calculation, the parties agree to a temporary suspension of this language.

3. The effect of this temporary suspension is that the hourly overtime rate for members of this bargaining unit will assume "Actual hours worked" include paid sick leave.

4. This agreement does not constitute a change in contract language, but merely a temporary change in practice, or a suspension of the contract language in question. The "status quo," for purposes of collective bargaining, remains the current language found in Article 8 Section 1.

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ADDENDUM I

5/2 – 5/3 WORK SCHEDULE IN DATA UNIT

Facts:

1. The average number of workdays per year in a 5/2-5/3 schedule is 243.3.
2. The average number of workdays in a normal 5/2 schedule with twelve (12) holidays is 260.7.
3. The differential of seventeen-point-four (17.4) days off is made up by including the ten (10) legal holidays and two (2) personal holidays into the 5/2-5/3 furlough schedule.
4. After inclusion of these holidays there remains a differential of five-point-four (5.4) additional days off. This differential is recovered (made up) by requiring the affected employees to work the five (5) extra days during the calendar year as factored into their assigned shift/furlough schedule.

Article 9, Section 4 of the PSEU Non Commissioned Professional Employees collective bargaining agreement (CBA) provides for agreements with respect to “alternative work schedules” “mutually agreed to” by the employee and management, “for so long as the parties agree, in writing”. This Agreement is consistent with this provision.

The following terms apply to all agreements regarding alternative work schedules:

1. Management will clearly outline the hours the employee is expected to work.
2. The alternative work schedule must not increase the need for overtime, and employee availability to work overtime must not be reduced.
3. Vacation and sick leave shall be used on an hour for hour basis.
4. Overtime continues to be paid after forty (40) hours in a week, consistent with the terms of the current CBA.
5. The employer may cancel the alternative work schedule arrangement and revert back to the traditional 5/2 schedule for any reason with thirty (30) calendar days written notice to the affected employee. The decision to take an employee off the alternative work schedule and put him/her back on a 5/2 schedule may not be grieved under Article 12 Grievance Procedure of the applicable CBA.
6. The following terms apply to the experimental 5/2 5/3 schedule in the KCSO Data Unit:
 - a. KCSO will put together a schedule consistent with the numbers outlined in Facts above.

b. Holidays: The current CBA Article 4, sections 2 and 4, will not be applied to employees working a 5/2 5/3 schedule. The ten (10) legal holidays and two (2) floating holidays are included in the total number of furlough days of the 5/ 2 5/3 schedule and thus the current contractual provisions relating to holidays that fall on furlough and floating holidays do not apply. Holiday leave shall be applied to the employees working the 5/2 5/3 schedules in the following manner:

If holiday falls on a scheduled workday, the employee receives four (4) hours extra pay per employee.

If holiday falls on a scheduled furlough day, the employee receives zero hours extra pay per employee.

This Agreement is not intended to supplement Article 9, section 4 of the current CBA. It does not replace any provision of the current CBA.
