WHEREAS, the double-digit increase in housing prices in King County yearover-year and the loss of 112,000 units of housing units affordable to those making 80 percent area median income or less since 2012 has led to increasing unaffordability and ultimately displacement of low-income families and communities of color, and WHEREAS, equitable development refers to public and private investments, programs and policies in geographic areas that take into account past history and current conditions to meet the needs of marginalized populations and to reduce disparities so that quality of life outcomes are equitably distributed for both existing residents and new residents to create strong communities, and WHEREAS, inequities in community investment perpetuate disparate outcomes and displacement for historically marginalized populations including BIPOC, immigrants and refugees, LGBTQ and persons with disabilities, and WHEREAS, the council seeks to directly address negative impacts caused by historical structural racism, disenfranchisement and inequities in community investment, and WHEREAS, the council unanimously adopted Ordinance 16948, which is also referred to as the Equity and Social Justice Ordinance, in 2010, reaffirming a shared vision in which all King County residents have equitable opportunity to thrive, defining equity for the county and identifying determinants of equity and priorities for government in advancing equity, and WHEREAS, the 2016-2022 King County Equity and Social Justice Strategic Plan establishes a blueprint for action and change aimed at expanding access to opportunities in eight areas, including: child and youth development; economic development and jobs;

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environment and climate; health and human services; housing; information and 42 technology; the justice system; and transportation and mobility, and 43 WHEREAS, dedicated place-based funding to advance these eight opportunity 44 areas, along with community partnerships, is critical to advance and implement racial and 45 social equity in King County, and 46 WHEREAS, an equitable development initiative provides investment, programs 47 and policies that take into account past policy decisions, historic inequities and current 48 conditions that will improve access to opportunities to the most affected communities and 49 allocate resources to communities at risk from displacement, and 50 WHEREAS, an equitable development initiative includes investment and resource 51 allocation to identified communities to advance economic mobility and opportunity, 52 prevent residential, economic and cultural displacement, build upon local cultural assets, 53 promote transportation mobility and connectivity, create healthy and safe communities, 54 and enable equitable access for all communities; 55 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County: 56 A. The council requests that the executive complete a feasibility analysis to 57 implement a King County equitable development initiative that is designed to reduce 58 disparities and achieve equitable outcomes for marginalized populations throughout the 59 County. The executive should electronically file the report no later than December 31, 79 2022, with the clerk of the council, who shall retain an electronic copy and provide an 80 electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff for the 81 committee of the whole, or its successor. The report should be accompanied by a 82 proposed motion that should accept the report. 83 E. Upon acceptance of the report by the council, the council requests that the 84 executive convene an equitable development advisory committee, comprised of three

representatives chosen by the executive and one representative from each council district,

to assist with the planning of the King County equitable development initiative.

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- Committee members shall be compensated for their participation on the advisory committee at a rate comparable to other county advisory committees. The advisory committee shall use the analysis report to:
  - 1. Make recommendations on potential policy and programmatic changes to reduce economic and racial disparities, by preventing residential, economic and cultural displacement and creating and preserving community stability;
  - 2. Identify a process to improve community outreach and collaboration with community-based organizations and other jurisdictions, with a particular focus on communities experiencing or are at risk of displacement; and
  - 3. Provide recommendations for an equitable development capital grant program. The capital grant program should:
  - a. incorporate data of current and predicted future displacement risk and related metrics to determine project eligibility;
    - b. include metrics for monitoring and evaluating equitable outcomes; and
  - c. utilize a competitive request for proposals process that includes community outreach to inform applicants about the grant; provide technical assistance to applicants and includes a request for proposals review panel comprised of advisory committee members, county staff and councilmember office representatives.
  - F. Upon receipt of the advisory committee recommendations, the executive shall transmit to the council any legislation needed to establish an equitable development capital grant program.
