14	STATEMENT OF FACTS:	
15	1. Created in 2004 in accordar	ace with state law, the King County board of
16	health sets countywide public l	nealth policy, enacts and enforces local
17	public health regulations and c	arries out the duties of local boards of
18	health as specified in RCW 70.	05.060 including preventing and
19	controlling the spread of infect	ious disease, abating nuisances and
20	establishing fee schedules for l	icenses and permits.

21	2. In May 2021, Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill 1152 was signed
22	into law as Chapter 205, Laws of Washington 2021, modifying the
23	structure of local boards of health. Chapter 205, Laws of Washington
24	2021 requires that the membership of the King County board of
25	health("KCBOH") be modified so that the number of KCBOH members
26	who are elected officials representing the county and its cities and towns
27	("elected officials") equals the number of members who are not elected
28	officials, with one of those nonelected members selected by the American
29	Indian Health Commission of Washington State and the remaining
30	nonelected members selected by the KCBOH from three specific
31	categories of interests. The selected candidates would be appointed by the
32	King County council. Those changes to state law go into effect on July 1,
33	2022.
34	3. The King County council is committed to supporting equity and social
35	justice principals and as such welcomes the encouragement in Chapter
36	205, Laws of Washington 2021 to recruit nonelected members
37	representing consumers of public health to be from historically
38	marginalized and underrepresented communities. The council supports
39	using racial equity and social justice principles when recruiting nonelected
40	members from all categories outlined in state law.
41	4. Additionally, Chapter 205, Laws of Washington 2021 requires the
42	Washington state Board of Health ("the state Board") to promulgate rules
43	for how nonelected members of local boards of health are to be recruited,

44	selected and appointed. The new rules are expected to be effective by July
45	25, 2022.
46	5. It is anticipated that the KCBOH will begin recruiting and selecting new,
47	nonelected members in accordance with Chapter 205, Laws of Washington 2021
48	and the state Board rules and declare the names of its selection through the
49	adoption of a resolution to the King County council by the last quarter of 2022 to
50	provide enough time for the King County council to appoint the nonelected
51	members to begin their terms on January 1, 2023.
52	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
53	SECTION 1. Ordinance 14989, Section 3, as amended, and K.C.C. 2.35.021, are
54	hereby amended to read as follows:
55	A. For members of the board until January 1, 2023:
56	<u>1.</u> The King County board of health shall consist of the following members:
57	((1,)) <u>a.</u> $((T))$ <u>three</u> members of the metropolitan King County council to be
58	appointed by the chair of the council, provided that the chair shall consider appointing
59	members such that county councilmember representation on the board of health is
60	geographically balanced across the county and includes representation of the
61	unincorporated area of the county on the board. Each county councilmember vote shall
62	be weighted as two votes;
63	$((2.))$ <u>b.</u> $((\mp))$ <u>three elected officials of the city of Seattle to be appointed by the</u>
64	city;

65	((3.)) <u>c.</u> $((T))$ <u>t</u> wo elected officials from cities and towns of King County other
66	than Seattle to be appointed in a manner agreed to by and among the cities and towns
67	representing a majority of the populations of those cities and towns; and
68	(4.)) <u>d.</u> ((\mp)) <u>t</u> wo health professionals who shall be appointed by a majority vote
69	of the other members of the board of health. One of the health professionals should have
70	knowledge of environmental health, including knowledge of septic systems and
71	groundwater quality. A third nonvoting member, who shall also be a health professional,
72	may be appointed by a majority vote of the other members of the board. The terms of
73	health professional members shall be established by the rules of the $board((-))$: and
74	((B.1.)) <u>2.a.</u> Alternate members for each regular member may be appointed
75	according to the relevant procedures under subsection ((A.1, 2. or 3.)) A.1a., b., or c. of
76	this section. During the meeting, an alternate member shall indicate when the alternate
77	member is serving in a regular member's absence. When serving in a regular member's
78	absence, an alternate member shall act as a regular member.
79	((2.)) <u>b.</u> $((4))$ <u>if</u> the board appoints a third nonvoting health professional member
80	as provided under subsection $((A.4.))$ <u>A.1.d.</u> of this section, that member shall serve as an
81	alternate voting member in the absence of either of the two voting health professional
82	members.
83	B. For members of the board on January 1, 2023, and thereafter:
84	1. The King County board of health shall consist of the following members:
85	a. three members of the metropolitan King County council and one alternate to
86	be appointed by the chair of the council. The chair shall consider appointing members
87	such that county councilmember representation on the board of health is geographically

88	balanced across the county and includes representation of the unincorporated area of the
89	county on the board;
90	b. three elected officials of the city of Seattle and one alternate to be appointed
91	by the city;
92	c. two elected officials from cities and towns of King County other than Seattle
93	and two alternates to be appointed in a manner agreed to by and among the cities and
94	towns representing a majority of the populations of those cities and towns; and
95	d.(1) In accordance with state law, the remaining members of the board of
96	health shall equal the number of elected official members appointed under subsection
97	B.1.a., b. and c. of this section, shall not be elected officials and, except for any member
98	selected by the American Indian Health Commission of Washington State, must be
99	recruited, selected and appointed in accordance with RCW 70.05.035(1)(a) and the rules
100	required under RCW 43.20.300.
101	(2) One of the nonelected member candidates selected under RCW
102	70.05.035(1)(a)(i) should have knowledge of environmental health, including knowledge
103	of septic systems and groundwater quality.
104	(3) The council shall appoint by motion the nonelected members from those
105	selected by the board of health and any member selected by the American Indian Health
106	Commission of Washington State in accordance with RCW 70.05.035.
107	(4) In accordance with RCW 70.05.035(1)(1), members described in
108	subsection B.1.d.(1) of this section shall be voting members except as it pertains to any
109	decision related to the setting or modification of permit, licensing and application fees;
110	and

111	2. The board shall elect the chair from the members described in subsection
112	B.1.a of this section.
113	NEW SECTION. SECTION 2. There is hereby added to K.C.C. chapter 2.35 a
114	new section to read as follows:
115	Sections 3 through 6 of this ordinance apply to members of the board on January
116	1, 2023, and thereafter.
117	NEW SECTION. SECTION 3. There is hereby added to K.C.C. chapter 2.35 a
118	new section to read as follows:
119	A. Alternate members for regular, elected official member may be appointed
120	according to the relevant procedures under K.C.C. 2.35.021.B.1.a., b. or c. During the
121	meeting, an alternate elected official member shall indicate when the alternate elected
122	official member is serving in a regular elected official member's absence. When serving
123	in a regular member's absence, an alternate elected official member shall act as a regular
124	elected official member.
125	B. Alternate nonelected members shall be appointed by the council in equal
126	numbers as alternate members appointed under subsection A. of this section. One of the
127	alternate nonelected members shall be selected by the American Indian Health
128	Commission for Washington State. During the meeting, an alternate nonelected member
129	shall indicate when the alternate nonelected member is serving in a regular nonelected
130	member's absence. When serving in a regular nonelected member's absence, an alternate
131	nonelected member shall act as a regular nonelected member.
132	NEW SECTION. SECTION 4. There is hereby added to K.C.C. chapter 2.35 a

133 new section to read as follows:

134	A. For each nonelected board member candidate selected by the King County
135	board of health, the board shall provide the council with the name, biography, application
136	materials and confirmation that the board member candidate meets the qualifications and
137	requirements of RCW 70.05.035(1)(a) and was recruited and selected in accordance with
138	the rules promulgated under RCW 43.20.300. The board shall also indicate which of the
139	three categories set forth in RCW 70.005.035(1)(a) each nonelected board member
140	candidate was selected to represent. In accordance with section 5.B. of this ordinance,
141	the board shall also indicate the initial term for each nonelected member candidate.
142	B. The board shall coordinate with the American Indian Health Commission of
143	Washington State to receive the commission's selected tribal representative candidates
144	and information about the commission's selected candidates.
145	C. For each of the alternate nonelected board candidates selected by the board,
146	the board shall provide the council with the name, biography, application materials and
147	confirmation that the alternate board member candidate meets the qualifications and
148	requirements of RCW 70.05.035(1) and was recruited and selected in accordance with the
149	rules promulgated under RCW 43.20.300. The board shall also indicate the term for each
150	alternate nonelected member candidate.
151	D. The board shall transmit to the council the information required by
152	subsections A., B. and C. of this section, together with one or more resolutions of its
153	nonelected board member candidate and alternate candidate selections, the commission's
154	tribal representative member and alternate selections to establish the expanded board
155	membership required by RCW 70.05.035. The initial resolutions must be electronically
156	filed with the clerk of the council by no later than October 28, 2022. Subsequent

157	resolutions to fill positions of members described in K.C.C. 2.35.021.B.1.d. and their
158	requisite alternates should be filed with the clerk no later than three months before the
159	starting date of the term for the respective member or alternate candidate.
160	NEW SECTION. SECTION 5. There is hereby added to K.C.C. chapter 2.35 a
161	new section to read as follows:
162	A. All members described in K.C.C. 2.35.021.B.1.d. shall be eligible to serve for
163	up to three full terms. Except as otherwise provided in subsection B. of this section, for
164	members described in K.C.C. 2.35.021.B.1.d., a full term shall be three years.
165	B. For all members described in K.C.C. 2.35.021.B.1.d., their initial terms to the
166	expanded board shall be as follows: two members shall each serve a one-year term, three
167	members shall each serve a two-year term and three members shall each serve a three-year
168	term. The board shall determine the initial term lengths primarily by member preference.
169	Each of the initial terms shall be considered full terms when considering eligibility for
170	service in future terms.
171	NEW SECTION. SECTION 6. There is hereby added to K.C.C. chapter 2.35 a
172	new section to read as follows:
173	All members described in K.C.C. 2.35.021.B.1.d. and the nonelected member
174	alternates who are not being compensated for their participation on the King County
175	board of health through their employer shall be compensated at a rate of two hundred
176	twenty-five dollars per full board meeting they attend and shall not exceed two hundred
177	twenty-five dollars per month before December 31, 2023. Beginning January 1, 2024,
178	the compensation amount per meeting and the maximum compensation amount per
179	month shall be automatically adjusted annually, and every year thereafter, at the rate

180	equivalent to the twelve-month change in the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor
181	Statistics Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for the Seattle-Tacoma-
182	Bellevue Statistical Metropolitan Area, which is also known as "the CPI-U." However, if
183	the twelve-month change in the CPI-U is negative, there shall not be an adjustment.
184	SECTION 7. Sections 8 through 12 take effect January 1, 2023.
185	SECTION 8. Ordinance 14989, Section 3, as amended, and K.C.C. 2.35.021, are
186	hereby amended to read as follows:

210	provided under subsection A.1.d. of this section, that member shall serve as an alternate
211	voting member in the absence of either of the two voting health professional members.
212	B. For members of the board on January 1, 2023, and thereafter:
