The program responds to current coronavirus disease 2019 conditions, including: (1) the reduction of congregate shelter capacity due to the closure and deintensification of shelters in the Pioneer Square and the Chinatown-International District neighborhoods that has led to an increased number of unsheltered persons in those neighborhoods; (2) the reduction of hours and accessibility to both physical and behavioral health providers for that vulnerable population; and (3)

the difficulty in accessing federal and state provided economic relief assistance by program participants due to required closures of government and service provider offices. The program elements include, the following: (1) providing rapid assessment of program participants; (2) securing rooms for temporary lodging in underutilized hotels to be used by program participants through the end of public health emergency in King County; (3) providing access to hygiene facilities to program participants to facilitate compliance with coronavirus disease 2019 public health precautions; (4) providing intensive case management for program participants designed specifically to mitigate coronavirus disease 2019 effects and enable compliance with coronavirus disease 2019 public health precautions; and (5) administrative costs associated with services to program participants for opportunities to transition them to permanent supportive housing.
