SUMMARY

Proposed Motion 2010-0628 (pp. 3-4 of these materials) would adopt King County's 2011 (FY 2012) Federal Agenda.

BACKGROUND

Each year King County develops a federal legislative agenda. The Council and the Executive work together through their respective government relations staff to decide on the positions that are most important to bring to the attention of King County's Congressional delegation. These are then reduced to writing in the form of Appropriations Requests and Policy Interests, which are reviewed by the Executive and then transmitted to the Council for final review and adoption.

THE PROPOSED LEGISLATION

Proposed Motion 2010-0628 (pp. 3-4 of these materials) would adopt the King County's 2011 (FY 2012) Federal Agenda – Appropriations Requests and Policy Interests, which are attachments to the motion (pp. 5-9 of these materials).

Biodiversity Conservation & Habitat Protection and Restoration

We seek federal funding support to implementation of habitat protection and restoration projects in approved WRIA-based salmon recovery plans. We support legislation directing a portion of major transportation project mitigation funds to high-priority salmon recovery projects. We support federal funding for USFWS to complete the status review projects for listing the Lake Sammamish Kokanee salmon. We support approaches to recovery of ESA-listed species that consider multiple species and their habitats. We support investments to maintain the good working order of the Ballard Locks, a critical passage for juvenile salmon.

Climate Change and Energy

We support federal assistance for local governments—like the EECBG Program and Qualified Energy Efficiency Bonds—to retrofit public facilities for greater energy efficiency, partner with the private sector and local universities to develop "green" technologies and provide green jobs training, and provide assistance to housing authorities to make energy efficiency investments. We seek federal funding to replace our transit fleet with hybrid electric buses, develop electric-car charging infrastructure, and purchase alternative fuel vanpool fleet vehicles. We seek federal funding support for development of tools and strategies for evaluating and adapting to climate impacts on public health, emergency response, and natural resources. We support federal grant programs, including the Sustainable Housing and Communities Grant Program, that promote integration of transportation, housing, health, low impact development, and climate mitigation planning and projects.

Economic Development

We encourage federal efforts to partner with local governments and provide them with tools needed to build strong, diverse, and sustainable economies. We support regional economic growth through strategic public-private partnerships such as the Central Puget Sound Regional Economic Strategy as well as federal support to help develop this and other economic strategies to retain existing businesses and strategically recruit new ones in key industrial clusters where the region has a competitive advantage. King County supports public works grants, such as those through the Economic Development Administration, to support private-sector projects that will create basic jobs, leverage private investment, and encourage domestic and international exports.

King County values export promotion programs that inform small to middle-size businesses of the economic benefits of international exporting, reduce the fear, myths, and uncertainty surrounding exporting, and encourage firms to actively seek international business. We support continued funding of Workforce Investment Act programs for youth, low-income adults, and dislocated workers to provide them the tools they need to enter or reenter the workforce in emerging sectors with career opportunities. We support greater funding and support for curricula at the secondary and postsecondary education levels that emphasize training and careers in science, technology, engineering, and math.

Emergency Management & Flood Hazard Reduction

We support integrated approaches to major river flood hazard reduction, including development of regional standards for levee maintenance that both protect public safety and meet state and federal requirements for protecting listed species. We seek federal funding for major flood hazard mitigation projects, including those that meet multiple objectives of reducing future flood damages, protecting habitat, and providing open space benefits. We seek appropriations of federal funds to repair Howard Hanson Dam and reduce flood risks in the Green River Valley. We seek funding support and technical assistance from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to continue updating federal Flood Insurance Rate Maps used to identify flood hazards and regulate development.

Health Care and Support

King County develops and implements creative and effective strategies and programs that prevent the leading causes of poor health, ensure access to appropriate and quality physical and behavioral health services, and promote individual health and interventions to reduce health disparities. Supporting and expanding this work requires stable funding at the federal level for our public health, mental health and chemical dependency prevention and support infrastructure. Addressing health disparities in our community require investments in resources and initiatives that will give all our residents access to affordable health care, including prescription drug coverage, alcohol and substance abuse treatment, and comprehensive mental health services.

The County will work with federal legislators and administration members to support implementation of national health care reform legislation and related legislative and administrative policies that meet the above goals. We also support federal regulatory and legislative initiatives that will protect the health of our communities and provide environmental safeguards ensuring the safety of our residents. Support steps that will strengthen healthy eating and active living standards that will prevent obesity and reduce use of tobacco and tobacco by products.

Homelessness & Housing

King County is the Administrative lead for the Countywide Ten Year Plan to End Homelessness. The plan's success is built on existing strong collaborations between local, state and federal governments and community nonprofit providers. We support maintaining and expanding funding and regulatory initiatives for affordable appropriate housing at the federal level for homeless and low income residents of King County, including the Workforce Investment Act and funding for YouthBuild.

King County supports federal initiatives that provide services critical to maintaining housing stability and prevent homelessness, including Community Development Block Grants, Homeless Assistance Grants, and HOME Investments, and the National Housing Trust Fund through the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. Complementing the housing strategy is the provision of tools to reduce homelessness for families, individuals and youth through early support and intervention, including consideration of ways to prevent discharging youth and adults directly into homelessness from federal institutions. We also seek opportunities to connect county investments supporting veterans with the federal government's initiative to end homelessness for veterans.

Human Services

King County supports funding for human services programs that help all children and youth grow and prosper socially and academically, offer paths to reduce or prevent involvement in the criminal justice, crisis mental health and emergency medical systems, and provide a safety net of services and partnerships to support our most vulnerable residents. We further support initiatives that offer opportunities for independence, self-sufficiency and mobility for our residents of all ages, including the

Land Use and Built Environment

King County favors policies and legislation that support the integration of land use, transportation and public health through urban and suburban development standards; siting of hazardous land uses; transportation infrastructure; transit planning, and building construction requirements. We also support greater access to locally generated and fresh food, and the improved use of electronic food stamps to purchase these products from local farmers and producers.

Law & Criminal Justice

We support a fair and accessible justice system that keeps people safe in their homes and communities. We support the use of court fees that appropriately balance the need for revenue with the need to eliminate barriers to court access. We support legislation that would allow for the interception of federal tax refunds to pay for past-due state judicial debts and HR 1956. We support legislation providing for continuation of federal benefits for qualifying mentally ill adult and juvenile inmates and detainees. We are committed to

ending domestic violence and sexual assault for our residents. We continue to be concerned about human trafficking and will work to combat its practice. We encourage the continued use of successful crime prevention and gang intervention programs, like School Resource Officers. We also support collaborative partnerships between communities and law enforcement and tools that help residents and local officers exchange information.

Stormwater/Water Quality/Puget Sound Partnership

We support more holistic implementation of the Clean Water Act, including evaluation of and prioritization of actions at a watershed and Puget Sound scale. We seek federal funding to support watershed- and Puget Sound-scale analysis and identification of the most cost-effective approaches for retrofitting stormwater facilities. We support federal aid for wide-scale retrofits of stormwater facilities and septic systems, similar to past federal investments to develop wastewater treatment plants. We support an interim decision on the Lower Duwamish Cleanup that would enable high-priority clean-up actions to proceed in concert with rigorous monitoring and adaptive management. We support funding and implementation of the Puget Sound Partnership's Action Agenda, including funding for grants administered by EPA and establishment of the Puget Sound Restoration as a recurring line-item in the federal budget. We support federal appropriations for the Puget Sound Nearshore Ecosystem Restoration and Pacific Coastal Salmon Recovery Program.

Transportation

As the operator of the 9th largest bus system in the United States, King County strongly supports federal efforts to fund mass transit improvements nationwide. With nearly 1,700 miles of paved roads, 51 miles of unpaved roads, and184 bridges under county management, we have a diverse and complex mix of infrastructure needs to support our many communities. We support innovative opportunities for transit-oriented development that serves a number of complementary goals, including reducing greenhouse gas emissions, focusing density into urban areas, and providing for a range of affordability levels for county residents. We support legislation that gives transit vehicles priority in the design and operation of federal roads. We support programs to promote hybrid and electric buses, electric charging stations, and alternative fuels for vehicles. We support legislation to reduce greenhouse gas levels caused by transportation. We support federal programs to address the aging infrastructure needs of our roadways and transit systems. We support funding for passenger ferry service.

Waste Reduction and Recycling

We support development "cradle-to-grave" product education, stewardship, recycling, and take-back programs for products for which improper disposal is likely to result in hazardous waste or water quality contamination, including pharmaceuticals and medicines, computers and other electronics, carpet, and fluorescent lighting.

Dear Councilmember Ferguson:

Enclosed for your consideration and approval is a motion establishing the King County 2011 (FY 2012) Federal Agenda. The proposed 2011 (FY 2012) Federal Agenda – Appropriations Requests and 2011 (FY 2012) Federal Agenda – Policy Interests documents are also attached. As in previous years, it may be necessary to further amend these documents, at a later date, to incorporate major issues and concerns that arise during the First Session of the 112th Congress.

The federal government continues to work toward policies that will pull the nation out of its greatest recession in generations, despite lagging employment numbers and an anemic market for real estate. Nevertheless, the Obama Administration has advanced a number of critical policy and revenue conversations, and King County continues to have a strong voice in the federal policy arena. From transportation and public safety to health care reform and climate change, we continue to market the resources and attributes that make King County a logical choice for innovation and investment.

Collaboration will again play a key role in succeeding with our priorities for 2011. We will work with our intergovernmental partners, including the Governor, the Puget Sound Regional Council, the cities of Seattle and Bellevue and the other suburban cities to aggressively advocate for federal funding for the challenges our region faces together. This includes continued federal support for transportation, public health, homeland security, salmon recovery, flood control, affordable housing and other important needs. Scarce resources and great needs have driven us to develop a strategic list of federal priorities for the coming year.

We are encouraged by our successful partnerships in the past year, where our congressional delegation stepped forward to partner with King County on key federal priorities. Faced with the imminent flood control situation in the Green River valley, we collaborated with Governor

Chris Gregoire and our colleagues in local government and the private sector to make clear the immediate threat and the expansive impacts of a potential flood event. The interim repairs to the Howard Hanson Dam funded in 2010 are critical for both the public safety of our residents and the security of our many businesses located in the valley. We continue to work toward a permanent fix for the dam and a regulatory path for certification of levees. We are also proud to have received a TIGER II grant award for the New South Park Bridge after a fiercely competitive process. We believe that our teamwork with our partners in the community, industry, labor, local governments, and the state is a model for future efforts.

We will continue the strong collaboration we have with the County Council and separately elected officials to address the priorities outlined in the attached documents. We also look forward to continuing our strong collaboration at the national level with the National Association of Counties, the American Public Transportation Association and Climate Communities.
