1	AN ORDINANCE relating to public transportation;
2	suspending the general financial practices and farebox
3	recovery ration sections of the 2016 Fund Management
4	Policies for the Public Transportation Fund during the
5	2023-2024 biennium.
6	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
7	SECTION 1. Findings:
8	A. Adopted transit fund management policies provide a framework to ensure the
9	financial health and viability of the public transportation fund.
10	B. In July 2016, following recommendations from a staff work group and review
11	by a special committee on transit, the 2016 Fund Management Policies for the Public
12	Transportation Fund were adopted through Ordinance 18321.
13	C. The 2016 Fund Management Policies for the Public Transportation Fund set
14	general financial practices and a fund structure for the public transportation fund, as well
15	as policies and targets for financial and capital planning, expenditures, revenues, and
16	reserves.
17	D. King County government has experienced significant operational and fiscal
18	impacts due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Though the impacts have lessened since the
19	height of the pandemic, many remain and are expected to continue into the 2023-2024
20	biennium, including reduced fare revenue for the public transportation fund.

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21	E. The COVID-19 pandemic resulted in multiple extraordinary measures taken to
22	respond to the pandemic. Motion 15610, passed on March 3, 2020, affirmed the
23	proclamation of an emergency. Ordinance 19115 ratified the executive's proclamation of
24	the 2019-2020 biennium budget cycle as an emergency budget crisis, and Ordinance
25	19201 did the same for the 2021-2022 budget cycle.
26	F. The Metro transit department made operational changes during the COVID-19
27	pandemic to respond to lower ridership and to ensure the health and safety of employees
28	and passengers. Changes included reductions or suspension of service on many routes
29	and the suspension of fares from March 21, 2020, to October 1, 2020.
30	G. The Metro transit department received \$240 million less in bus fare revenues
31	during the 2021-2022 biennium than had been anticipated before the pandemic.
32	H. In September 2020, the Metro transit department director informed the council
33	that, during the 2021-2022 biennium, the Metro transit department anticipated not
34	meeting either the farebox recovery target of thirty percent of passenger related operating
35	costs or the farebox recovery ratio of at least twenty-five percent of passenger related
36	operating costs set by the 2016 Fund Management Policies for the Public Transportation
37	Fund. The council suspended those sections of the fund management policies via
38	Ordinance 19206.
39	I. Ridership and fare revenue have increased since the height of the pandemic but
40	remain significantly below 2019 levels. The Metro transit department's actual farebox
41	recovery ratio was 7.2 percent in 2021 and the department estimates the ratio in 2022 will
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43 J. The Metro transit department is also planning for two fare policy changes to 44 increase accessibility: reducing the youth fare to \$0.00 and a one-year pilot to reduce the 45 ORCA LIFT fare to \$1.00. Those changes will impact the Metro transit department's 46 farebox recovery by reducing fare revenue from those categories. 47 K. Ridership and work patterns have not stabilized as the region recovers from 48 the pandemic. The Metro transit department will continue to monitor how riders use 49 transit so as to restore and grow service to meet these changing ridership needs. Work 50 and ridership trends over the next biennium will also help the Metro transit department 51 understand if the farebox recovery policy might need to be updated in the future. 52 L. As a result of decreased ridership and fare revenue, the Metro transit 53 department anticipates it will not be able to comply with the general financial practices 54 and farebox recovery ratio sections of the 2016 Fund Management Policies for the Public 55 Transportation Fund during the 2023-2024 biennium. The Metro transit department 56 requests a continued suspension of those sections of the policies in the 2023-2024 57 biennium. 58 M. The Metro transit department will consider evolving regional conditions and 59 any fare policy changes during 2023-2024 and will recommend updates to the farebox 60 recovery section of the 2016 fund management policies, if needed, with the 2025-2026 61 biennial budget cycle. 62 SECTION 2. During the 2023-2024 biennium, the sections of the 2016 Fund 63 Management Policies for the Public Transportation Fund relating to general financial 64 practices, in Section I.A., and farebox recovery ratio, in Section III.A., are suspended.

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65 <u>SECTION 3.</u> All other sections of the 2016 Fund Management Policies for the

66 Public Transportation Fund remain in effect.
