## STRIKING AMENDMENT S1 TO PROPOSED ORDINANCE 2013-0105, VERSION 1

Starting on page 1, delete lines 6 through line 60 and insert

1	"1. King County currently has solid waste interlocal agreements and forum
2	interlocal agreements, as amended, (collectively "the original
3	agreements") with thirty-seven cities in King County. Only the City of
4	Seattle, which has its own solid waste system, and the city of Milton,
5	which is part of Pierce county's solid waste system do not have such
6	interlocal agreements with King County.
7	2. The original agreements established the respective responsibilities of
8	the parties in the federated solid waste management system, including:
9	planning; waste reduction; recycling; and the collection, transfer and
10	disposal of mixed municipal solid waste, industrial waste, demolition

11	debris and all other solid waste; and moderate risk waste as defined in
12	RCW 70.105.010.
13	3. The original agreements recognize the benefits of a federated solid
14	waste management system and provide for collaborative system planning.
15	4. The original agreements will expire in 2028.
16	5. Working with cities on the metropolitan solid waste management
17	advisory committee, the solid waste division of the department of natural
18	resources and parks developed a solid waste transfer and waste
19	management plan that recommended the renovation of the urban transfer
20	system.
21	6. The solid waste transfer and waste management plan was adopted by
22	the King County council in December 2007.
23	7. Working with a group of cities, the executive reached agreement on a
24	proposed amended and restated interlocal agreement ("the ILA") that will
25	be effective through December 31, 2040.
26	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
27	SECTION 1. Findings:
28	A. The ILA negotiations were arduous and took place over a two and
29	one-half year time span, including use of a mediated process. The ILA
30	provides for continuation of the collaborative approach to system planning
31	to ensure the continued management of waste in a cost-effective manner.
32	B. The ILA extends the federated solid waste management system for
33	an additional twelve and one-half years through 2040. It provides for

34	dispute resolution, mechanisms and protocols to safeguard the county's
35	and cities' general funds, and for mitigation to cities for impacts from solid
36	waste facilities consistent with RCW 36.58.080.
37	C. The ILA provides for the creation of the Metropolitan Solid Waste
38	Advisory Committee (MSWAC) to provide a forum for on-going advice
39	from cities to King County and other jurisdictions as appropriate on
40	policy, management and planning related to solid waste management and
41	planning.
42	D. Regional committees were established by amendment of the King
43	County Charter in 1992 as part of the consolidation of the Municipality of
44	Metropolitan Seattle (METRO) into King County government. The
45	charter-based duties of the regional committees are to review and make
46	recommendations regarding countywide regional policies and plans within
47	each committee's subject matter. Solid waste policies and plans are not
48	countywide because the cities of Seattle and Milton plan for and handle
49	solid waste independent of the federated King county system.
50	E. The ILA reaffirms the historic role that the regional policy
51	committee has played in the county federated solid waste system's
52	planning since assuming the responsibilities of the solid waste interlocal
53	forum in 1996. Among its responsibilities as the solid waste interlocal
54	forum, the regional policy committee provides advice and
55	recommendations to the King County executive and council on solid waste
56	planning and policy pursuant to the forum interlocal agreements, as

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57	amended. The ILA provides that the regional policy committee will
58	continue to perform the forum's advisory duties beyond 2028, until the
59	ILA's expiration at the end of 2040.
60	F. A fundamental expectation throughout the ILA negotiation process
61	was that all parties to the original agreements would execute the ILA, with
62	its extended duration. As of the date of council action on this ordinance
63	several cities have not determined to enter into the ILA.
64	G. As a result of several cities uncommitted to executing the ILA, the
65	county and those cities that will be signatories to the ILA should engage in
66	further discussions to address substantive matters that are expected to arise
67	in the near future and may require amendments to the ILA. These issues
68	include but are not limited to:
69	1. latecomer provisions;
70	2. changes to the disposal rates charged based on the number of
71	parties to the ILA;
72	3. potential alternative financing mechanisms for future capital
73	investments in solid waste facilities; and
74	4. clarification of solid waste management planning responsibilities
75	for cities that are not committed to the system after 2028.
76	H. The executive and cities are encouraged to discuss the issues
77	arising as a result of some cities' choice not to enter into the ILA and to
78	report to the council on the progress of those discussions and any
79	recommended amendments to the ILA that would be appropriate.

80	SECTION 2. The King County executive is hereby authorized to enter into
81	amended and restated interlocal agreements, substantially in the form of Attachment A to
82	this ordinance, with any city that is part of the King County solid waste system."
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Attachment: A. Amended and Restated Solid Waste Interlocal Agreement

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Effect: The striker includes findings and asks the executive and the cities that are parties to the ILA to re-engage in negotiations to address issues that may require future amendments to the ILA.
