1	A MOTION expressing support for federal and state rules	
2	and policies protecting net neutrality.	
3	3 WHEREAS, net neutrality, sometimes referre	ed to as "open Internet" or "Internet
4	4 freedom," is described by the Federal Communicatio	ns Commission as Internet where
5	5 broadband service providers cannot block or delibera	tely slow speeds for Internet
6	6 services or applications, favor some Internet traffic in	n exchange for consideration or
7	7 engage in other practices that harm Internet openness	s, and
8	8 WHEREAS, practices such as throttling, bloc	king and paid prioritization have
9	9 been considered by experts to hinder net neutrality, a	nd
10	0 WHEREAS, King County is a world-leading	hub of high-tech invention and
11	development and the birthplace of many leading Inte	rnet and technology companies, and
12	2 WHEREAS, King County is also home to ov	er two million residents, many of
13	whom rely on the county to provide essential service	s such as law enforcement,
14	healthcare, assistance for youth and the elderly and s	ocial services, and
15	WHEREAS, established county programs, se	rvices and information require
16	affordable, accessible and open Internet access to be	tter enable county citizens to avail
17	themselves of these programs, services and informat	ion, and
18	WHEREAS, open Internet provides citizens	the opportunity to search for gainful
19	employment, participate in free web-based job traini	ng programs and learn new skills

through online education courses, and 20 WHEREAS, public safety, emergency services, education and healthcare services 21 all rely on the availability of broadband Internet service free from throttling, blocking and 22 paid prioritization, and 23 24 WHEREAS, the preservation of net neutrality is necessary for the prosperity of 25 the King County local economy, including, but not limited to, startup technology 26 companies, rural businesses and entrepreneurs, and WHEREAS, net neutrality encourages competition among businesses, fosters 27 innovation, creates jobs and promotes economic vitality, both within King County and 28 29 across the nation, and WHEREAS, King County, as a Washington local government, adheres to and 30 champions the principle of transparency, including transparency in the provision of 31 broadband Internet service, and 32 WHEREAS, King County is best served and civic engagement is enhanced 33 through the availability of open Internet, and 34 WHEREAS, King County and its citizens depend on the accessibility of 35 affordable and nondiscriminatory broadband Internet service to ensure that all residents, 36 37 businesses, nonprofit organizations and public agencies have the opportunity to participate in the governmental process through the use of digital and communications 38 technology, and 39 WHEREAS, the Federal Communications Commission adopted net neutrality 40 rules in its 2015 Report and Order on Remand, Declaratory Ruling, and Order, Protecting 41 and Promoting the Open Internet, GN Docket No. 14-28 ("the 2015 report and order"), to 42

protect consumers from tactics that threaten the open Internet by banning blocking,
 throttling and paid prioritization, and

WHEREAS, the 2015 report and order adopted a policy on blocking, which states that "A person engaged in the provision of broadband Internet access service, insofar as such person is so engaged, shall not block lawful content, applications, services, or non-harmful devices, subject to reasonable network management," and

WHEREAS, the 2015 report and order adopted a policy on throttling stating "A person engaged in the provision of broadband Internet access service, insofar as such person is so engaged, shall not impair or degrade lawful Internet traffic on the basis of Internet content, application, or service, or use of a non-harmful device, subject to reasonable network management," and

WHEREAS, the 2015 report and order adopted a policy on paid prioritization stating "A person engaged in the provision of broadband Internet access service, insofar as such person is so engaged, shall not engage in paid prioritization," which refers to the management of a broadband provider's network to directly or indirectly favor some traffic over other traffic either in exchange for consideration, which is monetary or otherwise, from a third party or to benefit an affiliated entity, and

WHEREAS, in the 2015 report and order, the Federal Communications

Commission reaffirmed its 2010 transparency rule, which states that "A person engaged in the provision of broadband Internet access service shall publicly disclose accurate information regarding the network management practices, performance, and commercial terms of its broadband Internet access services sufficient for consumers to make informed choices regarding use of such services and for content, application, service, and device

providers to develop, market, and maintain Internet offerings," and 66 67 WHEREAS, in the 2015 report and order, the Federal Communications 68 Commission reclassified broadband Internet access service as a public utility under Title 69 II of the Telecommunications Act, which provided the legal basis for the commission to 70 enforce its net neutrality rules, and WHEREAS, the Federal Communications Commission published a Notice of 71 Proposed Rulemaking in May 2017, Restoring Internet Freedom, WC Docket No. 17-72 108, in which it announced its proposal to rescind the net neutrality rules in the 2015 73 report and order, and end public utility regulation of the Internet, and 74 75 WHEREAS, following the Notice of Proposed Rulemaking, the Federal 76 Communications Commission released a Declaratory Ruling, Report and Order, and 77 Order, Restoring Internet Freedom, WC Docket No. 17-108 ("the 2017 report and 78 order"), which provided additional details regarding the proposal to rescind the net neutrality rules, and 79 80 WHEREAS, the 2017 report and order also included a provision preempting any state or local measures that would effectively impose rules or requirements that the 81 commission has repealed or decided to refrain from imposing in the order or that would 82 impose more stringent requirements for any aspect of broadband service addressed in the 83 order, and 84 WHEREAS, state and local governments are closest to the people and the 85 preemption provision would threaten the authority of the state of Washington and King 86 87 County to govern, and WHEREAS, the Federal Communications Commission's Chairman Ajit Pai 88

announced that the Commission will tentatively consider the proposal to rescind those net 89 neutrality rules and end public utility regulation of the Internet at its December 14, 2017, 90 Commission meeting; 91 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT MOVED by the Council of King County: 92 93 A. The metropolitan King County council: 94 1. Expresses King County's strong support for the preservation and defense of 95 net neutrality rules and policies as articulated by the Federal Communications 96 Commission in its 2015 Report and Order on Remand, Declaratory Ruling, and Order, 97 Protecting and Promoting the Open Internet, GN Docket No. 14-28; and 98 2. Expresses King County's strong support for action at the state level seeking to 99 protect net neutrality within the state of Washington.

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B. The clerk of the council is directed to send a copy of this motion to each member of Washington's congressional delegation and state legislature.
