1	Transportation	Secure the following in the Transportation Appropriations bill: 1. \$5 million for Bus Radio Replacement Program; 2. \$5 million for Tolt River Bridge Replacement (Snoqualmie Bridge); 3. \$1.8 million for Vashon Island Passenger Only Ferry; 4. \$5 million for the I-405 Bus Rapid Transit; 5. \$9 million for Taxiway Rehabilitation and Emergency Equipment 6. \$2 million for BNSF Multimodal Greenway Corridor.
2	Salmon Recovery	Secure the following in the Energy and Water Appropriations bill (Corps of Engineers): • \$2.5 million for the Duwamish/Green Ecosystem Restoration Program; • Funding for Salmon Habitat Restoration Studies, specifically: • \$779,000 for the Lake Washington/Ship Canal Ecosystem Study; • \$1.9 million for the Puget Sound Nearshore Ecosystem Restoration Project; and • \$510,000 for the White River Flood Control and Ecosystem Restoration study. Support \$90 million funding level for the Pacific Coastal Salmon Recovery Program, which is critical to habitat recovery projects in King County. Support efforts to design, implement and maintain a series of on-the-ground restoration projects on private agricultural lands for salmon habitat restoration in the Snoqualmie Watershed through the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service, Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program

3	Puget Sound Recovery Initiative	Support Pacific Northwest National Laboratory's efforts to secure funding for Endocrine Disrupting Compounds (EDC) research in partnership with King County on aquatic effects and effective treatment methods. Support continued federal funding of the Puget Sound Initiative.
4	Wastewater	Secure \$2 million funding under EPA's State Tribal Assistance Grant (STAG) program for construction of Quartermaster Harbor community wastewater treatment facilities.
5	Workforce Development	Support \$1 million in the Labor-Health and Human Services-Education Appropriations bill for the Seattle King County Workforce Development Council to integrate workforce training services into other social services currently offered to ex-offenders transitioning back into the community.
6	Emergency Management	Support federal legislation that provides revenue tools to local governments to fund the new infrastructure needed to provide effective e-911 services resulting from internet service providers offering Voice over Internet Protocol (VOIP). Monitor future activity pertaining to the FCC regulation requiring VoIP to provide e-911 service.
7	Homeland Security/ Bioterrorism	Support first-responder legislation currently pending in Congress to streamline funding to local first responders and provide them with greater control over how grant resources would be expended at the local level. Support legislation that would allow for the funding of FTE's for critical HS functions via the various HS grant programs.
8	Sheriff's Wireless Communications Project	Secure \$3.8 million for the second phase of deployment of a Regional Interagency Wireless Communications and Data Sharing Program to enhance King County's ability to communicate with local, state and federal agencies in the All Hazards Response environment.

Medicaid	Support legislation to broaden allowable Medicaid mental health services following the recommendations of the President's New Freedom Commission on Mental health.

Maintain or increase funding for HOME program. Support legislation to provide supportive services for homeless housing.
14	Magnuson Act	Support proposed legislative language in the current reauthorization bill that would allow NOAA the discretionary authority to access and employ local law enforcement resources to fulfill certain duties mandated by the Magnuson Act. ISSUE	DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST
Short-Span Bridge Replacement	Support legislation that would supplement the definition of "Bridge" as used in section 650.403 of the federal register to include short span structures whose replacement would be more than 20 feet long. This would allow short-spans to qualify for the federal bridge replacement and rehabilitation program.
Rail Corridor Acquisition	Work to secure an additional \$8 million for acquisition of the Burlington Northern Eastside rail corridor through the TIFIA program. Burlington Northern has indicated that it intends to cease operation of the line, and the County currently has a short-term exclusivity agreement to acquire this irreplaceable transportation corridor. (TCSP)
Workforce Training	Support Workforce Investment Act funding for dislocated workers and youth education and training funds. Support funding for the HUD Youthbuild program.
Endangered Species	Oppose any attempts to weaken environmental protections provided by the Endangered Species Act.
	Support any and all efforts to increase funding for salmon habitat restoration.
Natural Resources	Adequately fund the State Revolving Fund for water pollution infrastructure improvements at \$1.35 billion.
	Support legislation to create a national trust fund for water and wastewater infrastructure.
	Support legislation which would apply the full market value of real property used in ecosystem restoration projects to the County's non-federal match requirement.
	Support legislation providing for receiving in-kind credit for goods and services provided before and after the signing of a partnership

	agreement.
	Support legislation supporting a portion of federal transportation project mitigation funding be directed toward high priority salmon recovery projects within watersheds/WRIAs; allow for mitigation banking for ESA implementation.
Abandoned Mines	Support legislation reauthorizing Abandoned Mines Land fund.
Biogas Funding	Seek funding for Enumclaw manure biogas project. Beyond existing grant opportunities in USDA and DOE, seek additional funding options for an anaerobic digester and research on reducing nutrients from the residual digester effluent.
Climate Stewardship Act	Support McCain/Lieberman Climate Stewardship Act that creates a national "cap and trade" system for power plant operators and major industrial emitters.
Renewable Fuels Standard	Support House and Senate bills calling for mandated minimum fuels content for ethanol in gasoline and biodiesel in diesel.
Flood Control	Support the Green River Flood Control Zone District's request for \$500,000 in the Energy and Water Appropriations bill in Section 205 Continuing Authorities funds for improvements to the Tukwila levee on the lower Green River to protect 500-acre economic development. Support the City of North Bend's request for \$200,000 in the Energy and Water Appropriations bill in Section 205 Continuing Authorities funds for flood risk reduction feasibility analysis of levee improvements on the South Fork Snoqualmie River to protect regional economic development. Allocate \$300,000 of FEMA's Map Modernization Program funds to revise Flood Insurance Rate Maps for 40 miles of the lower and middle Green River. Implements King County high priority floodplain
	mapping program and Washington Dept. of Ecology (WDOE) mapping initiatives.
Energy Efficiency	Support S 680, tax incentives for energy efficient buildings, improved product energy standards and labeling, and clarifications to system

	reliability standards addressed in Part II of the Federal Power Act (18 U.S.C. § 824).
	Support H.R. 3263, the Cornerstone Act of 2005, which increases conservation requirements for business.
Sheriff's Office	Support continued funding for School Resource Officers.
Emergency Management	Support legislation promoting the implementation of E-911 service nationwide.
Health Care Reform	Support the reauthorization of the Ryan White Care Act, which is due for reauthorization in the 109 th Congress. Monitor amendments which may adversely impact King County and its community partners.
	Support continued funding for the Healthy Communities Access (HCAP) Program, which was funded in FY 2005 at \$83 million but has been eliminated in the President's Budget for FY 2006. HCAP increases access to health services for vulnerable populations by enabling healthcare providers to provide better coordinated, more efficient care for uninsured residents.
	Support legislation to increase the Federal Medicaid Assistance Percentage (FMAP) for Washington State.
	Support legislative efforts to increase funding for the Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA).
	Promote legislation, S 1570, to promote employment of individuals with severe disabilities.
	Support legislation to decrease health disparities.
	Support legislation for health plans for reimbursement of evidence-based preventive services.
	Support legislation for continued funding for State Children's Health Insurance Programs (SCHIP).
	Support legislation to increase funding for chronic disease prevention efforts.
	Support legislation to increase funding for local public health

	preparedness strategies. Support legislation to address co-occurring disorders (mental health and substance abuse) eligibility and integration of services.
Repeal Institutions for Mental Disease (IMD) Exclusion	Facilities of greater than 16 beds that are primarily devoted to the care of psychiatric patients are deemed to be Institutions for Mental Diseases (IMD). Persons in such a facility do not qualify for Medicaid and no Title XIX funding can be used for their care. The IMD Exclusion impacts over 400 individuals who reside in King County residential facilities.
