Please explain why you feel you are the most qualified candidate for this appointment.

I have devoted my career to supporting children and their families. Much of my experience with children has focused on supporting underserved populations, particularly children with developmental delays and families experiencing challenges such as homelessness, mental illness, substance use, and trauma. I love my career as an Occupational Therapist, and working in early intervention gives me unique insight into how best to support children ages birth to three in their home environment and how best to give families the skills they need to be the most sensitive, warm, and responsive parents they can be. I am also a trans* person and identify as gender non-binary. My experiences growing up and entering the workforce as a visible minority member have given me unique insights into the ways our system disadvantages many populations, and I hope to be a voice for those who do not feel they have one. My work and personal experiences have given me the insight and tools to be an effective board member, and I hope to use my knowledge and experience to inform county leadership in a broader way than I am able to do in my direct work with families.

How did you learn of this opportunity?

I was informed of this opportunity and encouraged to apply by Kindering's Chief Program Officer, Jennifer Ajumogobia.

In King County, equity is fundamental to the society we wish to build. Our end goal is for full and equal access to opportunities, power, and resources so that all people may achieve their full potential. The Children and Youth Advisory Board incorporates these values and has adopted its own equity statement. The CYAB works to build an inclusive board that includes the voices of underrepresented populations, people of color, immigrants and refugees, LGBTQ individuals, low-income households, youth, the elderly, rural residents, people living with disabilities and more.

Please describe your experience with and/or commitment to promoting equity. What opportunities do you see for the CYAB to incorporate the voice of all communities in King County?

I began my work promoting equity as a teacher at Childhaven, a school-based therapeutic center for children who had experience neglect and abuse. I found while working there that children of color and those with backgrounds of housing instability, mental illness, and intergenerational trauma were much more highly represented than in the general population. These were statistics I had read about, but it was different to experience them first hand. My work there was focused on creating stable, nurturing connections to help children build safe attachments again, and I loved that work. I returned to school for a Masters in Occupational Therapy, and much to my dismay found that most of my classmates were cisgender, straight, and white and from middle to upper-class backgrounds. As someone who looked different. I felt very alone. I found myself more alone when I questioned, continually, the assumptions in our assigned readings and class discussions, assumptions based on a heteronormative and white culture, where families all looked the same. It concerned me that these biases would be passed on to therapists working in hospitals, schools, and homes with some of society's most vulnerable populations. I work now in Early Intervention as part of the Families in Transition team, which supports families experiencing homelessness and housing instability. I love that my work gives me the chance to support families so directly, and I view every day of my work as an opportunity to promote equity. But I would also like to influence change on a broader level and would love the chance to inform the policies that affect these families. I think the best way for the CYAB to promote equity is by recruiting board members from a variety of backgrounds, with a variety of identities, who can represent a diversity of voices in King County, and I would like to be one of those voices.
