20 employees managed by the King County sheriff until a motion accepting a report as  
21 referenced in Proviso P3 of this section is passed by the council.

22 ER4 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

23 Of this appropriation, \$371,000 and 1.0 FTE shall be expended or encumbered  
24 solely for a background check detective position.

25 ER6 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

26 Of this appropriation, \$25,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to support  
27 overtime for special emphasis patrols related to July 4 holidays.

28 ER8 EXPENDITURE RESTRICTION:

29 Of this appropriation, \$25,000 shall be expended or encumbered solely to support  
30 sheriff deputies performing emphasis patrols around the perimeter of the King County  
31 Courthouse in furtherance of the 2017 recommendations from the courthouse security  
32 work group.

33 P2 PROVIDED THAT:

34 Of this appropriation, \$700,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the  
35 sheriff transmits a quarterly letter addressed to all councilmembers describing how the  
36 sheriff's office is complying with the processing and certification requirements under  
37 RCW 7.98.020 related to petitions for U and T nonimmigrant visas.

38 The letter shall include:

39 A. A list of all U and T nonimmigrant-visa certification forms filed with the  
40 sheriff's office in the previous quarter including the date each certification form was filed  
41 with the sheriff's office, and the date each certification form was executed by the sheriff's

42 office; and

43 B. A confirmation from the sheriff stating that the office is compliant with the  
44 processing and certification requirements under RCW 7.98.020.

45 Moneys shall be unencumbered in \$100,000 increments upon receipt of each  
46 quarterly letter, transmitted by the sheriff to the clerk of the council.

47 The sheriff must file the first quarterly letter required by this proviso by April 30,  
48 2019, in the form of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the council,  
49 who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the  
50 council chief of staff and the lead staff for the law and justice committee, or its successor.

51 The sheriff must file the next five quarterly letters required by this proviso no  
52 later than thirty days after the end of each quarter in the form of a paper original and an  
53 electronic copy with the clerk of the council, who shall retain the original and provide an  
54 electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff for the  
55 law and justice committee, or its successor.

56 The sheriff must file a final quarterly letter by December 31, 2020, in the form of  
57 a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the council, who shall retain the  
58 original and provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff  
59 and the lead staff for the law and justice committee, or its successor.

60 P3 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

61 Of this appropriation, \$1,100,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the  
62 sheriff's office, in cooperation with the office of law enforcement oversight, transmits a  
63 detailed in-service training plan and a motion that should acknowledge receipt of the plan  
64 and reference the subject matter, the proviso's ordinance, ordinance section and proviso

65 number in both the title and body of the motion and a motion acknowledging receipt of  
66 the plan is passed by the council.

67 The plan shall include, but not be limited to:

68 A. Descriptions of the specific in-service training curriculum modules, which  
69 shall include the areas of procedural justice, listen and explain with equity and dignity  
70 communication, violence de-escalation and antibias training;

71 B. Description of the method of delivering such trainings to both deputies and  
72 other employees managed by the sheriff;

73 C. The timeline for implementation of in-service trainings in the areas of  
74 procedural justice, listen and explain with equity and dignity (LEED) communication,  
75 violence de-escalation and antibias training to both deputies and other employees  
76 managed by the sheriff;

77 D. An analysis describing how the in-service training curriculum in the areas of  
78 procedural justice, listen and explain with equity and dignity (LEED) communication,  
79 violence de-escalation and antibias training will meet the anticipated state-mandated law  
80 enforcement training requirements; and

81 E. An assessment of the efficacy of the planned in-service training curriculum  
82 modules in the areas of procedural justice, listen and explain with equity and dignity  
83 (LEED) communication, violence de-escalation and antibias training, methods of  
84 delivery and implementation timeline by the office of law enforcement oversight.

85 The sheriff's office should file the plan and a motion required by this proviso by  
86 June 1, 2019, in the form of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the  
87 council, who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all

88 councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff for the law and justice  
89 committee, or its successor.

90 P4 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

91 Of this appropriation, \$100,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the  
92 sheriff transmits a report describing the actions and resources necessary for a community  
93 policing model to be implemented in the unincorporated areas of each of the sheriff  
94 precincts.

95 The report shall include, but not be limited to:

96 A. A description of a community policing model that would best serve the  
97 unincorporated area residents of each of the sheriff precincts, including the organizational  
98 structure and guiding policies that would be employed in the development and  
99 implementation of a community policing model for the unincorporated area of each  
100 sheriff precinct;

101 B. A list of organizations, including, but not limited to, nonprofits, neighborhood  
102 groups, homeowner associations, schools and businesses in the unincorporated area of  
103 each sheriff precinct, identified as potential partners necessary to advance the objectives  
104 of community policing in their respective sheriff precinct;

105 C. A description of the staffing levels necessary to increase the sheriff's office  
106 visibility through neighborhood specific patrols in the unincorporated area of each sheriff  
107 precinct as compared to current reactive policing methods;

108 D. An assessment of the feasibility of establishing a taskforce or roundtable  
109 bringing together representatives from each individual sheriff precinct and those  
110 community leaders within the unincorporated area of the respective sheriff precinct to

111 foster collaboration and trust in furtherance of the objectives of community policing;

112 E. A description of the resources and estimated time necessary to implement a  
113 community policing model in the unincorporated area of each sheriff precinct; and

114 F. An analysis of obstacles to implementing a community policing model in the  
115 unincorporated area of each of the sheriff precincts and methods of overcoming those  
116 obstacles.

117 The sheriff should file the report by June 29, 2019, in the form of a paper original  
118 and an electronic copy with the clerk of the council, who shall retain the original and  
119 provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead  
120 staff for the law and justice committee, or its successor.

121 P5 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

122 Of this appropriation, \$100,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the  
123 sheriff transmits a plan to increase staffing for the sheriff marine unit during the peak  
124 recreation months of June, July and August in order to reduce safety issues by increasing  
125 the number and frequency of river patrols.

126 The sheriff should file the plan by May 1, 2019, in the form of a paper original  
127 and an electronic copy with the clerk of the council, who shall retain the original and  
128 provide an electronic copy to all councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead  
129 staff for the law and justice committee, or its successor.

130 P6 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

131 Of this appropriation, \$100,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the  
132 sheriff transmits a report on the community engagement efforts employed by the sheriff  
133 to prevent and reduce gang participation and violence and a motion that should

134 acknowledge receipt of the report and reference the subject matter, the proviso's  
135 ordinance, ordinance section and proviso number in both the title and body of the motion,  
136 and a motion acknowledging receipt of the report is passed by the council.

137 The report shall include, but not be limited to:

138 A. A list of organizations, including, but not limited to, law enforcement  
139 agencies, nonprofits, neighborhood and community groups, youth organizations, schools  
140 and businesses that the sheriff has partnered with, or has identified as potential partners,  
141 to advance the objectives of preventing and reducing gang participation and violence; and

142 B. A description of the methods and manner through which the sheriff is  
143 partnering with other law enforcement agencies and public entities to increase  
144 coordination and collaboration to advance the objectives of preventing and reducing gang  
145 participation and violence.

146 The sheriff should file the report and a motion required by this proviso by  
147 September 1, 2019, in the form of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk  
148 of the council, who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all  
149 councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff for the law and justice  
150 committee, or its successor.

151 P7 PROVIDED FURTHER THAT:

152 Of this appropriation, \$500,000 shall not be expended or encumbered until the  
153 sheriff transmits a report responding to the office of law enforcement oversight reports  
154 entitled, "Transparency and Media Relations in High-Profile Cases," "Internal  
155 Investigations Complaint Classification Review of the King County Sheriff's Office" and  
156 "Use of Force Complaint Processing in the King County Sheriff's Office," and a motion

157 that should acknowledge receipt of the report and reference the subject matter, the  
158 proviso's ordinance, ordinance section and proviso number in both the title and body of  
159 the motion and a motion acknowledging receipt of the report is passed by the council.

160 The report shall include, but not be limited to:

161 A. A response addressing the methodology, findings and recommendations of  
162 each of the three office of law enforcement oversight reports listed in this proviso;

163 B. A description of all steps taken, or proposed to be taken, by the sheriff to  
164 implement the recommendations offered in each of the three office of law enforcement  
165 oversight reports listed in this proviso; and

166 C. An explanation of the sheriff's rationale for any recommendation found in any  
167 of the oversight reports listed in this proviso that the sheriff does not intend to implement.

168 The sheriff should file the report and a motion required by this proviso by March  
169 31, 2019, in the form of a paper original and an electronic copy with the clerk of the  
170 council, who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all  
171 councilmembers, the council chief of staff and the lead staff for the law and justice  
172 committee or its successor."

173 Renumber the remaining sections consecutively and correct any internal references  
174 accordingly

176 **EFFECT:**

177 *Adds \$25,000 to the Sheriff's Office with an expenditure restriction to continue patrols*

178 *outside the King County Courthouse through the end of 2020. Note to Clerk: This*

- 179 *amendment adds an increment of \$25,000 to the net total appropriated to various*  
180 *general fund agencies in Section 1.*
