1	AN ORDINANCE p	roviding for the submission to the
2	qualified electors of	King County at a special election to be
3	held in King County	on August 3, 2021, of a proposition
4	providing for resider	t oversight and authorizing a property

6	chapter 84.55 RCW	for a six-year consecutive period at a
7	rate of not more than	\$0.19 per one thousand dollars of
8	assessed valuation in	the first year, and limiting annual levy
9	increases to three per	ccent in the five succeeding years, all
10	for the purpose of fu	nding prevention and early
11	intervention strategie	es to improve the health and well-being
12	of children, youth an	d their communities.
13	STATEMENT OF FACTS:	
14	1. In 2015, King County en	acted Ordinance 18088, placing a six-year
15	Best Starts for Kids levy on	the ballot. King County residents voted and
16	approved the Best Starts for	Kids levy to fund programs and services that
17	support promotion, preventi	on and early intervention for King County's
18	children, youth and families	
19	2. The goals of the Best Sta	rts for Kids levy that voters approved in 2015

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20	are to ensure babies are born healthy, King County is a place where
21	everyone has equitable opportunities for health and safety as they progress
22	through childhood and communities offer safe, welcoming and healthy
23	environments that help improve outcomes for all of King County's
24	children and families.
25	3. Since its inception, the Best Starts for Kids levy has funded five
26	hundred and seventy programs and has reached over five hundred seven
27	thousand babies, children, youth and families throughout the county with
28	community-driven programming. Levy programs trained 68,000 child
29	care providers, pediatricians, community health workers and other staff
30	who work with children and youth on healthy child development and
31	racially and culturally appropriate care. The Best Starts for Kids levy
32	distributes resources across the region, focusing investments on those most
33	in need.
34	4. In June 2020, the council directed the executive in Motion 15651 to
35	produce an assessment report to inform deliberations regarding renewal of
36	the current Best Starts for Kids levy. The report includes assessment of
37	early measurements and successes, challenges in launching this first levy,
38	an analysis of the levy's advancement of equity and early
39	recommendations for renewal. Executive staff combined findings of staff
40	research, a community survey conducted in June 2020, community input
41	from ten geographically based virtual community listening sessions as
42	well as five virtual stakeholder listening sessions, and input from ongoing

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43	Best Starts for Kids community partner learning circles. In total, almost
44	seven hundred and twenty community responses informed completion of
45	the report. The council accepted the assessment report in Motion 15769.
46	5. The existing Best Starts for Kids levy will expire at the end of 2021.
47	Renewal of the Best Starts for Kids levy requires voter approval.
48	Acknowledging the importance of the Best Starts for Kids levy in serving
49	the county's children, youth and families with upstream promotion,
50	prevention and early intervention programs, and, in light of the current
51	impact the COVID-19 pandemic, has had on the health and well-being of
52	the children, youth and families of King County as well as the regional
53	economic and human services systems including child care, the Best Starts
54	for Kids levy warrants renewal.
55	6. Over twenty-five thousand babies are born in King County each year.
56	County residents under twenty-five years old comprise thirty percent of
57	the population. Fifty-three percent of the people under eighteen years old
58	in King County are Black, Indigenous and People of Color.
59	7. Research shows that there are significant disparities in the health and
60	well-being of King County residents. The percentage of children five and
61	under living in poverty is as low as five percent in some regions of the
62	county and as high as fifteen percent in other regions. Infant mortality is
63	four times higher for American Indian/Alaskan Natives compared to
64	whites and more than two times higher for African Americans. Thirty-
65	eight percent of toddler and preschoolers are not flourishing and resilient

66	in King County, and that number rises to seventy-one percent for
67	elementary-aged children. Among youth, thirty-three percent report
68	depressive feelings and twenty-four percent report using alcohol or other
69	illicit drugs. Twenty-six percent of youth say they do not have an adult
70	they can talk to and thirty-three percent do not feel strong connection to
71	their family. Two thousand students, disproportionally low income and
72	black, indigenous and people of color, drop out of school each year in
73	King County while research shows that by 2024, almost ninety percent of
74	living wage jobs in the county will require some sort of post-secondary
75	education.
76	8. Child care is unaffordable for many families in King County, and child
77	care for our youngest residents now costs more than in-state, public
78	college tuition. King County's child care workforce is disproportionately
79	made up of women and Black, Indigenous and People of Color, as well as
80	immigrants and refugees. Wages remain low, with providers earning near-
81	poverty-level salaries.
82	9. In 2010, Ordinance 16897 was enacted, establishing the King County
83	Strategic Plan, 2010-2014. In 2015, the council passed Motion 14317,
84	updating and revising King County's vision, mission, guiding principles
85	and goals. Included within the county's goals are improving the health and
86	well-being of all people in King County, implementing alternatives to
87	divert people from the criminal justice system and ensuring that county
88	government operates efficiently and effectively and is accountable to the

89	public.
05	public.

90	10. The county's guiding principles in the King County Strategic Plan,
91	2010-2014 command that pursuit of the county's goals should address the
92	root causes of inequities to provide equal access for all. In 2015, the
93	county established the office of equity and social justice and, the following
94	year, the office of equity and social justice produced the 2016-2022 Equity
95	and Social Justice Strategic Plan. King County actively engages in equity
96	and social justice efforts to eliminate racially and ethnically disparate
97	health and human services outcomes in King County, and this is a priority
98	that shall guide the council and the executive in the process of designing,
99	administering and evaluating the policies and programs related to the
100	renewed Best Starts for Kids levy, if approved by voters.
101	11. In 2014, Ordinance 17738 was enacted, establishing the youth action
102	plan task force and providing policy direction regarding the development
103	of a youth action plan. In addition to their work with the youth action
104	plan, the youth action plan task force members helped shape the current
105	Best Starts for Kids levy. In 2015, the council passed Motion 14378,
106	adopting the completed youth action plan. The youth action plan
107	continues to provide guidance and policy direction for the Best Starts for
108	Kids levy.
109	12. The strategies supported by the Best Starts for Kids levy achieve a
110	variety of outcomes. Headline indicators used to measure these outcomes
111	for children under six include the following: babies born with healthy

112	birth outcomes; children who are flourishing and resilient; children who
113	are ready for kindergarten; and children who are free from abuse or
114	neglect. Headline indicators for children and youth five to twenty-four
115	years old include the following: third graders who meet reading standards;
116	fourth graders who meet math standards; youth who are flourishing and
117	resilient; youth and young adults who are in excellent or very good health;
118	youth who graduated from high school on time; youth and young adults in
119	school or working; high school graduates who earn a college degree or
120	career credential; and youth who are not using illegal substances. Headline
121	indicators for Communities of Opportunity include: adults reporting good
122	or excellent health; youth who have an adult to turn to for help;
123	individuals engaged in civic activities; households paying less than thirty
124	percent or less than fifty percent of their income for housing; local
125	residents who are displaced; youth who eat fruit and vegetables at least
126	four times a day; households with income above two hundred percent of
127	poverty; and youth and young adults in school or working.
128	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
129	SECTION 1. Definitions. The definitions in this section apply throughout this
130	ordinance unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
131	A. "Child care workforce demonstration project" means a strategy to improve the
132	provision of child care in King County supplementing wages of a test group of persons
133	who provide child care in exchange for wages and then reporting out on the effects of the
134	strategy upon the quality of child care, including butr not limited to the strategy's effects

upon workforce turnover, workforce experience of poverty, and workforce experiencelevels.

B. "Children and youth" means persons through twenty-four years old. 137 C. "Communities of opportunity" means the strategy described in Section VII of 138 139 the Best Starts for Kids Implementation Plan, that is Attachment A to Ordinance 18373. 140 Communities of Opportunity is designed to improve equity by addressing the race- and place-based inequitable health and well-being outcomes in King County. Communities 141 of Opportunity supports communities in improving the health, social and economic 142 143 outcomes of those specific communities, and does so by partnering with communities to shape and own solutions. 144 D. "King County child care subsidy program" means a strategy to reduce or fully 145 subsidize the cost of child care to low-income families in King County. 146 E. "Levy" means the levy of regular property taxes for the specific purposes and 147 term provided in this ordinance and authorized by the electorate in accordance with 148 149 Washington law. F. "Levy proceeds" means the principal amount of moneys raised by the levy and 150 151 any interest earnings on the moneys. G. "Limit factor" for the purposes of calculating the levy limitations in RCW 152 153 84.55.010, means one hundred three percent. 154 H. "Strategy" means a program, service, activity, initiative or capital investment intended to achieve the purposes described in subsection 4.B. of this ordinance. 155 I. "Technical assistance and capacity building" means assisting organizations 156 seeking or receiving levy proceeds to enable the organizations to apply for, implement 157

and improve delivery of a strategy or strategies for which expenditures of this levy areeligible.

J. "Youth and family homelessness prevention initiative" means an initiative
intended to prevent and divert children and youth and their families from becoming
homeless.

163 SECTION 2. Levy submittal. To provide necessary moneys for the purposes identified in section 4 of this ordinance, the King County council shall submit to the 164 qualified electors of the county a proposition authorizing a regular property tax levy in 165 166 excess of the levy limitation contained in chapter 84.55 RCW for six consecutive years, with collection commencing in 2022, at a rate not to exceed \$0.19 per one thousand 167 dollars of assessed value in the first year of the levy period. The dollar amount of the 168 levy in the first year shall be the base upon which the levy amounts in year two through 169 six shall be calculated. In accordance with RCW 84.55.050, the levy shall be a regular 170 property tax levy subject to the limit factor as defined in section 1 of this ordinance. 171

172 <u>SECTION 3.</u> Deposit of levy proceeds. The levy proceeds shall be deposited
173 into a dedicated subfund of the best starts for kids fund, or its successor.

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#### SECTION 4. Eligible expenditures.

A. If approved by the qualified electors of the county, such sums from the first year's levy proceeds as are necessary may be used to provide for the costs and charges incurred by the county that are attributable to the election.

B. After the amount authorized in subsection A. of this section, the remaininglevy proceeds shall be used to:

180 1. Promote improved health and well-being outcomes of children and youth, as

well as the families and the communities in which they live, including, but not limited to: 181 182 ensuring adequate services and supports for pregnant persons and newborns; access to safe and healthy food; developmental screening for children and youth; programs that 183 care for children and youth when they are not at home including child care and out-of-184 school-time programs; programs and services that promote a sense of belonging, 185 186 connection and positive identity in children and youth; and programs and services that provide academic support and promote academic achievement; 187 2. Prevent and intervene early on negative outcomes, including, but not limited 188 189 to, poor birth outcomes, developmental delays, chronic disease, social emotional isolation, substance abuse, dropping out of school, homelessness, domestic violence and 190 effects of systemic racism and incarceration; 191 3. Reduce inequities in outcomes for children and youth in the county; and 192 193 4. Strengthen, improve, better coordinate, integrate and encourage innovation in health and human services systems and the agencies, organizations and groups addressing 194 the needs of children and youth, their families and their communities. 195 C. Of the eligible expenditures described in subsection B. of this section, an 196 197 amount of each year's levy proceeds shall be allocated first for the purposes in subsection D. of this section. In the levy's first year, which is 2022, the total amount allocated for 198 the purposes in subsection D. of this section shall be twenty-two and one-half percent of 199 200 the first year's levy proceeds remaining after the amount authorized in subsection A. In the levy's subsequent years, the amount to be allocated for the purposes in subsection D. 201 202 of this section shall be allocated so that the six-year total sum of levy proceeds allocated for the purposes in subsection D. of this section shall be no less than two-hundred and 203

204	thirty-five million dollars. The implementation plan required by section 7 of this
205	ordinance shall describe the annual allocations of levy proceeds that accomplish
206	allocation requirements of this subsection C. of this section. After the annual allocation
207	of levy proceeds required by this subsection C. of this section, each year's remaining levy
208	proceeds shall be divided in the following proportions and used for the following
209	purposes:
210	1. Fifty percent shall be used to plan, provide, fund and administer strategies
211	focused on children and youth under six years old and their caregivers, pregnant persons
212	and individuals or families concerning pregnancy.
213	2. Thirty-seven percent shall be used to plan, provide, fund and administer
214	strategies focused on children and youth age five or older;
215	3. Eight percent shall be used to plan, provide, fund and administer
216	Communities of Opportunity; and
217	4. Five percent shall be used to plan, provide, fund and administer the
218	following:
219	a. performance measurement of levy-funded strategies, evaluation and data
220	collection activities;
221	b. stipends for children and youth serving as appointed members of the King
222	County children and youth advisory board under conditions prescribed by the final
223	children and youth advisory board update report required by section 6 of this ordinance in
224	the final form of the children and youth advisory board update report that the council
225	adopts by ordinance.
226	c. services identified in subsection B. of this section provided by metropolitan

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227	park districts in King County. Of the moneys identified in this subsection C.4.c., an
228	amount equal to the lost revenues to the metropolitan park districts resulting from
229	prorationing as mandated by RCW 84.52.010, up to one million dollars, shall be provided
230	to those metropolitan park districts if authorized by the county council by ordinance;
231	d. services identified in subsection B. of this section provided by fire districts,
232	in an amount equal to the lost revenues to the fire districts in King County resulting from
233	prorationing, as mandated by RCW 84.52.010, for those services, to the extent the
234	prorationing was caused solely by this levy and if authorized by the county council by
235	ordinance; and
236	e. services identified in subsection B. of this section provided by local hospital
237	districts, in an amount equal to the lost revenues to the local hospital districts in King
238	County resulting from prorationing, as mandated by RCW 84.52.010, for those services,
239	to the extent the prorationing was caused solely by this levy and if authorized by the
240	county council by ordinance.
241	D. The levy proceeds annually reserved in subsection C. of this section shall be
242	used to plan, provide, fund, administer, measure performance and evaluate a youth and
243	family homelessness prevention initiative, a King County child care subsidy program, a
244	child care workforce demonstration project and technical assistance and capacity building
245	activities. The youth and family homelessness prevention initiative, King County child
246	care subsidy program, child care workforce demonstration project and technical
247	assistance and capacity building activities required in this subsection shall be described in
248	the implementation plan required in section 7 of this ordinance.
249	SECTION 5. Call for special election. In accordance with RCW 29A.04.321,

250	the King County council hereby calls for a special election to be held in conjunction with
251	the primary election on August 03, 2021, to consider a proposition authorizing a regular
252	property tax levy for the purposes described in this ordinance. The King County director
253	of elections shall cause notice to be given of this ordinance in accordance with the state
254	constitution and general law and to submit to the qualified electors of the county, at the
255	said special county election, the proposition hereinafter set forth. The clerk of the council
256	shall certify that proposition to the director of elections in substantially the following
257	form:
258	PROPOSITION: The King County Council passed Ordinance
259	concerning funding to improve the well-being of children, youth, families
260	and communities. If approved, this proposition would fund promotion of
261	positive outcomes, prevention and early intervention related to: child care;
262	healthy pregnancy; newborn family supports; youth development;
263	community well-being; and crisis prevention and intervention for children
264	and youth, including homelessness prevention. It would authorize an
265	additional six-year property tax levy for collection beginning in 2022 at
266	<b>\$</b> 0.19 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation with the 2022 levy amount being
267	the base for calculating annual increases of up to 3% in 2022 - 2026.

271	SECTION 6. Governance. The King County children and youth advisory board
272	described in K.C.C. 2A.300.510 shall serve as the oversight and advisory board for the

levy and its strategies, except for Communities of Opportunity, if the levy is approved by 273 274 the qualified electors of the county. The communities of opportunity-best starts for kids levy advisory board described in K.C.C. 2A.300.520 shall serve as the advisory body for 275 Communities of Opportunity if the levy is approved by the qualified electors of the 276 277 county. If the levy is approved by the qualified electors of the county, the executive shall 278 by October 01, 2021, transmit to the council for consideration and adoption by ordinance a best starts for kids governance update report that describes and explains necessary and 279 recommended changes to sections of the King County Code and applicable ordinances 280 281 that describe the composition and duties of the King County children and youth advisory board and the communities of opportunity-best starts for kids levy advisory board. A 282 proposed ordinance or ordinances shall accompany the best starts for kids governance 283 update report, which ordinance or ordinances, upon enactment, would accomplish the 284 285 changes recommended by the best starts for kids governance update report. Among the purposes of recommended changes listed and described within the best starts for kids 286 287 governance update report shall be to update the King County children and youth advisory board's duties and composition as needed to enable the King County children and youth 288 289 advisory board to oversee and advise on the levy and to extend the existence of the 290 communities of opportunity-best starts for kids levy advisory board to coincide with the 291 levy. The executive shall consult with the King County children and youth advisory 292 board and the communities of opportunity-best starts for kids levy advisory board in 293 preparing the children and youth advisory board update report.

#### 294 <u>SECTION 7.</u> Implementation plan.

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A. Not later than July 31, 2021, the executive shall transmit to the council for

296	review and adoption by ordinance a proposed Best Starts for Kids implementation plan
297	that identifies the strategies to be funded and outcomes to be achieved with the use of
298	levy proceeds described in section 4 of this ordinance. The Best Starts for Kids
299	implementation plan shall also include a framework to measure the performance of levy
300	strategies in achieving their outcomes. The executive shall develop the proposed Best
301	Starts for Kids implementation plan in consultation with the King County children and
302	youth advisory board and the communities of opportunity-best starts for kids levy
303	advisory board. In developing the Best Starts for Kids implementation plan required in
304	this Section 7., the executive shall consider and promote harmony with the previous Best
305	Starts for Kids Implementation Plan that is Attachment A to Ordinance 18373,
306	specifically describing which strategies from the previous Best Starts for Kids
307	Implementation Plan shall continue in the proposed Best Starts for Kids implementation
308	plan. In developing the proposed Best Starts for Kids implementation plan, the executive
309	shall also to the maximum extent possible take into consideration the King County Youth
310	Action Plan, adopted by Motion 14378.
311	B. Levy proceeds may not be expended for the purposes described in section 4 of
312	this ordinance until the effective date of the ordinance with which the Best Starts for Kids
313	implementation plan is adopted.
314	SECTION 8. Exemption. The additional regular property taxes authorized by
315	this ordinance shall be included in any real property tax exemption authorized by RCW
316	84.36.381.
317	SECTION9. Ratification and confirmation. Certification of the proposition by

317 <u>SECTION9.</u> Ratification and confirmation. Certification of the proposition by
318 the clerk of the county council to the director of elections in accordance with law before

- the general election on August 3, 2021, and any other act consistent with the authority
- and before the effective date of this ordinance are hereby ratified and confirmed.
- 321 <u>SECTION 10.</u> Severability. If any provision of this ordinance or its application

- to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance or the
- application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.
