## Ordinance 19313

	Proposed No. 2021-0246.1 Sponsors Zahilay
1	AN ORDINANCE relating to the public safety advisory
2	committee; and amending Ordinance 19249, Section 1,
3	Ordinance 19249, Section 2, and Ordinance 19249, Section
4	5.
5	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF KING COUNTY:
6	SECTION 1. Ordinance 19249, Section 1 is hereby amended to read as follows:
7	A. The King County public safety advisory committee is hereby established.
8	B. The purpose of the committee shall be to:
9	1. Engage with and receive input from community stakeholders directly
10	impacted by the department of public safety and provide guidance to the council and the
11	executive in the selection, appointment and confirmation process for appointment of the
12	chief officer of the department of public safety in accordance with Ordinance 19249,
13	((s))Section 3 ((of this ordinance)); and
14	2. Engage with and receive input from community stakeholders directly
15	impacted by the department of public safety regarding the values stakeholder
16	communities hold on how law enforcement services should be provided and ways the
17	county could improve the delivery of law enforcement services to preserve and enhance
18	public safety, and to provide guidance to the council and the executive on those matters
19	in accordance with Ordinance 19249, ((s))Section 4 ((of this ordinance)).

C.1. The committee shall include thirteen members of the public, who represent
the geographic, ethnic and economic diversity of the department of public safety's service
area. Two members of the committee shall represent overpoliced communities. Two
members of the committee shall represent rural unincorporated communities. Two
members of the committee shall represent urban unincorporated communities. Two
members of the committee shall represent cities which contract with the department of
public safety for police services. Two members of the committee shall have knowledge
of, or experience related to, law enforcement reform work. One member of the
committee shall represent the Puget Sound Police Managers Association. One member
of the committee shall represent the King County Police Officers Guild. One member of
the committee shall represent the community advisory committee for law enforcement
oversight.
2. The executive and the council shall each select one member representing the
following communities or expertise:
a. overpoliced communities, which for the purposes of this ordinance, are
those communities that have simultaneously experienced the greatest infringement of
personal liberty and the greatest under-protection from law enforcement.
b. rural unincorporated communities, which for the purposes of this ordinance,
are those areas located in the rural area of the county;
c. urban unincorporated communities, which for the purposes of this ordinance
are those located in the in the urban growth areas of unincorporated King County; and
d. a person with knowledge of or experience related to law enforcement reform
work.

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3. The oversight committee, established by the interlocal public safety services
agreements with the cities, shall select two members to represent the contract cities on the
advisory committee. The Puget Sound Police Managers Association and the King
County Police Officers Guild shall each select one member from their respective
organizations to represent their organizations on the committee. The community
committee for law enforcement oversight shall select one member to represent it on the
advisory committee.

4. Committee members selected by the executive and those members selected 50 51 by the council to represent the communities as described in subsection  $((1, \cdot))C.2$ . of this 52 ((ordinance)) section and those members selected by the organizations as described in 53 Ordinance 19249, subsection ((1-))C.3. of ((Ordinance 19249 are included in Attachment 54 A to Ordinance 19249)) this section are included in Attachment A to this ordinance. 55 5. Once fully constituted, the committee, with assistance from the facilitators described in Ordinance 19249, ((s))Section 6 ((of this ordinance)), shall determine its 56 57 rules and operating procedures, including but not limited to, frequency of committee meetings and method by which the committee will determine what to include in the final 58 report required by Ordinance 19249, ((s))Section 5 ((of this ordinance)), as amended. 59 SECTION 2. Ordinance 19249, Section 2, is hereby amended to read as follows: 60 In accordance with K.C.C. 2.28.006, members of the committee who are neither 61 62 employees of King County nor employees of other municipal governments shall receive compensation of one hundred fifty dollars per meeting of the committee. The maximum 63 64 compensation that a committee member may receive is ((two thousand five)) three thousand nine hundred dollars. The purpose of the compensation is to compensate those 65

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66 nongovernmental employees for their experience and expertise contribution to the

67 advisory committee.

68	SECTION 3. Ordinance 19249, Section 5, is hereby amended to read as follows:
69	A. The committee shall provide a chief of the department of public safety report
70	to the executive and the council by no later than (( <del>July 1,</del> )) <u>September 30,</u> 2021. An
71	electronic copy of the report shall be transmitted simultaneously to the executive and to
72	the clerk of the council, who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all
73	councilmembers and the lead staff of the law and justice committee The report shall
74	include, but limited to, the following:
75	1. A description detailing the principles that should guide the solicitation of
76	candidates for the position of the chief officer of the department of public safety;
77	2. A description of those qualities, experience and other characteristics the
78	committee would like to see in a candidate;
79	3. A description of the committee's efforts to engage with, and receive input
80	from, community stakeholders;
81	4. A description of the community stakeholder groups providing input to the
82	committee; and
83	5. A description of community stakeholder input, categorized by general
84	themes, pertaining to the guiding principles on selection of a chief officer of the
85	department of public safety and the qualities a successful candidate should have.
86	B. The committee shall provide a law enforcement services report to the
87	executive and the council by no later than ((July 1,)) September 30, 2021. An electronic
88	copy of the report shall be transmitted simultaneously to the executive and to the clerk of

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89	the council, who shall retain the original and provide an electronic copy to all
90	councilmembers and the lead staff of the law and justice committee. The report shall
91	include, but limited to, the following:
92	1. A description of those values stakeholder communities expressed, categorized
93	by general themes, regarding how law enforcement services should be provided;
94	2. A description, categorized by general themes, of those ways the county could
95	improve the delivery of law enforcement services to preserve and enhance public safety;
96	3. A description of the committee's efforts to engage with, and receive input
97	from, community stakeholders;
98	4. A description of the community stakeholder groups providing input to the
99	committee; and
100	5. A recommendation on whether a future advisory body should provide

- 101 continued public engagement and guidance to the executive and the council pertaining to
- the matters described in subsection B.1. and 2. of this section.
